The very successful Bloodmobile in Manchester last week, with 216 pints donated, was the thirtieth anniversary of the first Manchester Red Cross Blood Club Bloodmobile visit to this area on March 19, 1951. There were other similar blood collecting clinics from 1942 to 1951 for military needs supervised by Michigan State Board of Health and the Red Cross combined. The first of these was held October 30, 1942 with Mrs. Raynor Haeussler as Chairman-of-the-Day. Last week's clinic pushed the record of 218 made just a year ago. Only 15 persons were temporarily deferred for medical reasons which is also an excellent record. Only the anticipated 15% of those registered were unable to attend.

State Carpet Displayed At Library

Two sections of a unique and beautiful carpet, formerly used in the State Capitol, are on display through April 30 at the Manchester Township Library.

The carpet was a custom design by the late Claude D. Sampson of Jackson, Michigan. It was manufactured by the Bigelow Co., using 100% wool fibre. It was used in the House of Representatives chamber from 1964 through 1979.

The two sections displayed at the library show the central motifs of the design: an outline map of the state, and a detailed representation of the state seal. The rich, vibrant colors include royal blue, maroon, green and brown.

When the carpeting was scheduled for replacement, those sections still in good shape were trimmed out and offered for sale as mementoes. The portions displayed in Manchester this month were purchased by Representative Mary Keith Ballantine of the 23rd District.

"The Great Chili Cook-Off"

Registration for a competition to select Michigan's best chili cook is now underway.

The event which is being billed as "The Great Chili Cook-Off" will take place on Saturday, May 2 at the Farm Council Grounds in Saline, Michigan. It is being held as a benefit for the national Kidney Foundation of Michigan.

Cook-Off Chairman John Kirkendall of Ypsilanti said, "Participants won't be able to use beans or spaghetti in their recipes, but according to the rules it's okay to add almost anything else to the tomato sauce, meats and chili peppers."

He said, "The winning cook will receive air fare for two to California and a chance to compete in the International Chili Society World Championship Cook-Off next fall. Last year's world champions shared \$30,000 in prize money donated by a brewery."

Kirkendall said, "Registration is open to any individual or group interested in preparing an official entry."

Prizes will also be awarded for best showmanship, most unusual chili recipe and best ethnic chili and contestants are encouraged to bring support teams to cheer them on," he said.

The deadline for entering is April 17, but planners of the event are suggesting that interested contestants register as soon as possible because space is limited. A similar benefit held last year for the Kidney Foundation attracted over 35 cooks and some 3,000 spectators.

Kirkendall said, "The event isn't just for cooks. They'll be plenty for spectators to do. We're hoping people will bring their families and plan on staying to visit with the cooks, taste their chili and enjoy the entertainment we have scheduled throughout the day."

News Of Good Things Growing

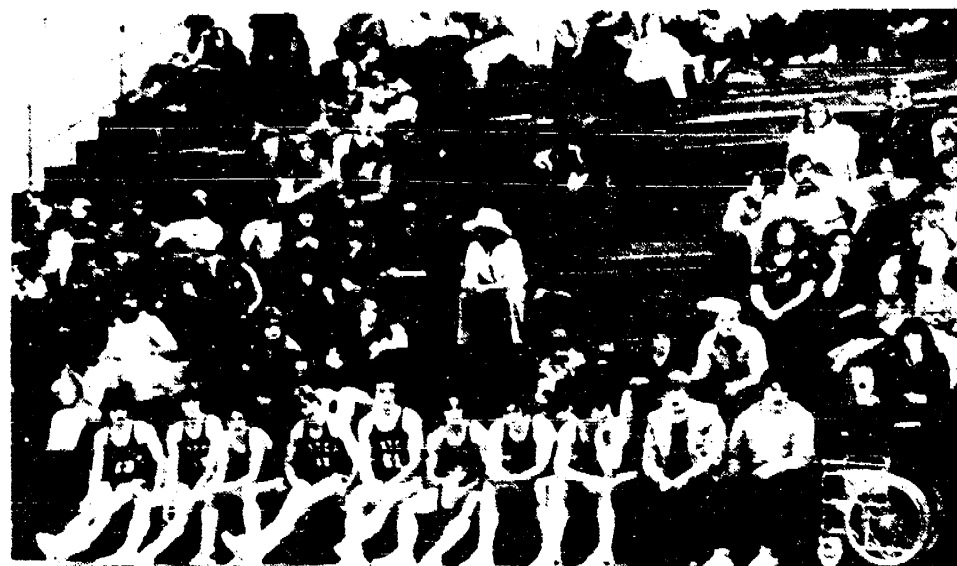

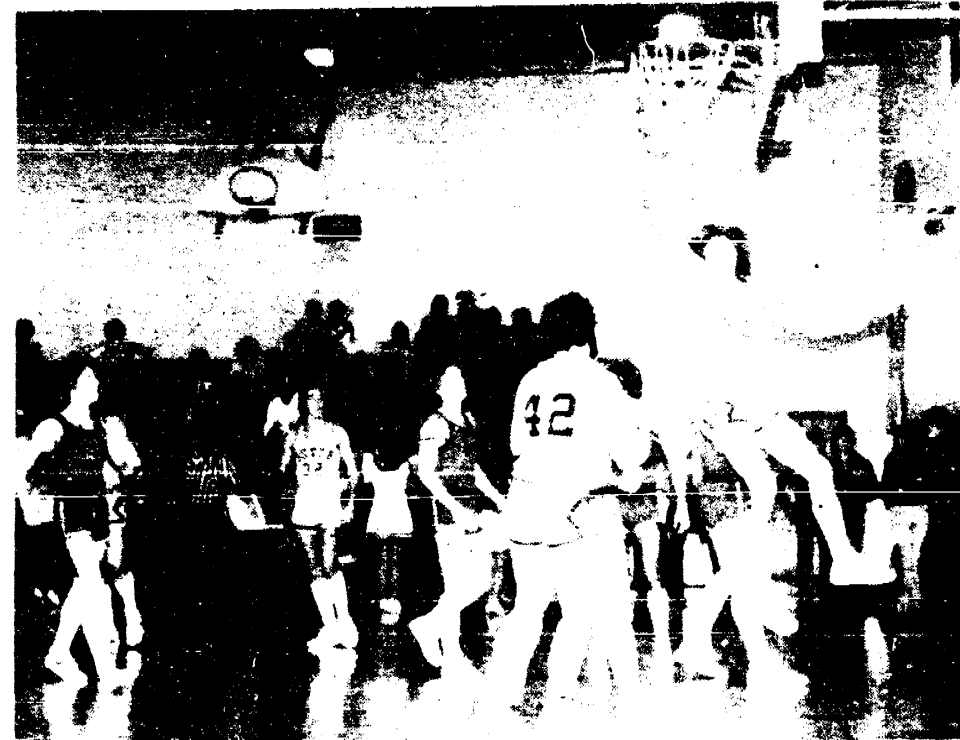

Coffee Break News

Prison Overcrowding - Under a new law, nearly 1,000 prisoners may be released from Michigan prisons in the next three months. The Governor must declare an emergency if prisons remain overcrowded over 30 days. If the prison capacity falls to 95% after 90 days, the emergency can be lifted.

Minor Working Restricted - A law to prohibit minors from working after sunset or 8 p.m. in businesses where money changes hands, unless an adult is present, took effect March 31. Under the law a youth can, for example, collect for a paper route but is unable to work at a grocery store unless an adult is present. The law amends the Mich. Youth Unemployment Standards Act.

Economic Education - Legislation to require the teaching of the free enterprise system in Michigan high schools has been introduced by State Representative Edgar Geerlings (R-Norton Shores). The bill would require the State Board of Education to develop a curriculum for local school districts in teaching a one-semester course in the essentials and benefits of a free enterprise system.

Loan Program - An \$80 million loan program utilizing Michigan retirement funds to finance home mortgages in Michigan is being established, Governor Milliken recently announced. The program, developed by the state Department of Treasury, is expected to boost Michigan's housing and construction industries. Through its retirement funds, the Department of Treasury will loan money to financial lending institutions in the state, who will in turn loan money for the purchase of existing home mortgages and the financing of new ones.

Hiring Freeze - In an effort to cut \$80 million from the state budget, Governor Milliken imposed a six-month freeze on hiring in state agencies. The freeze will last at least until September 30 and could reduce the 66,800 member state work force up to 7.5 percent.

Handgun Control - Tougher handgun controls should be seriously considered, Governor Milliken said recently in response to the shooting of President Reagan. Milliken, who had not taken a specific stand on the control issue in the past, has supported stiff penalties for crimes committed with guns and feels more stringent measures may be required if that does not prove effective.

Tornado Actions

The Manchester Township Fire Department and the Manchester Police Department advise the residents of Manchester that a 3 minute blast of the fire siren will be blown if a tornado has been sighted nearby and that you should go at once to a shelter area. If you see or hear the tornado coming, do not wait for the Warning Signal - go to your shelter area if there is time, if not, curl up on the floor and protect yourself as much as possible.

The danger signs of a tornado are severe thunderstorms-thunder, lightning, heavy rains, and strong winds, hail-pellets of ice from dark-clouded skies, roaring noise-like a hundred railroad locomotives, a crashing thunderous sound, funnel-dark, spinning "rope" or column from the sky to the ground.

When a tornado threatens you should:
• Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. Protect your head.
• In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level. Get under something sturdy.
• In schools, hospitals, and public places, move to pre-designated shelter areas.

Interior hallways on lowest floors are best.
• In mobile homes or vehicles, leave them and go to more substantial shelter.
• If outdoors, with no shelter available, lie flat in nearby ditch, and shield head with arms.

TORNADO WATCH: Tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are possible.
TORNADO WARNING: Tornado detected; take shelter.

An all clear signal will not be blown, only the warning alert.

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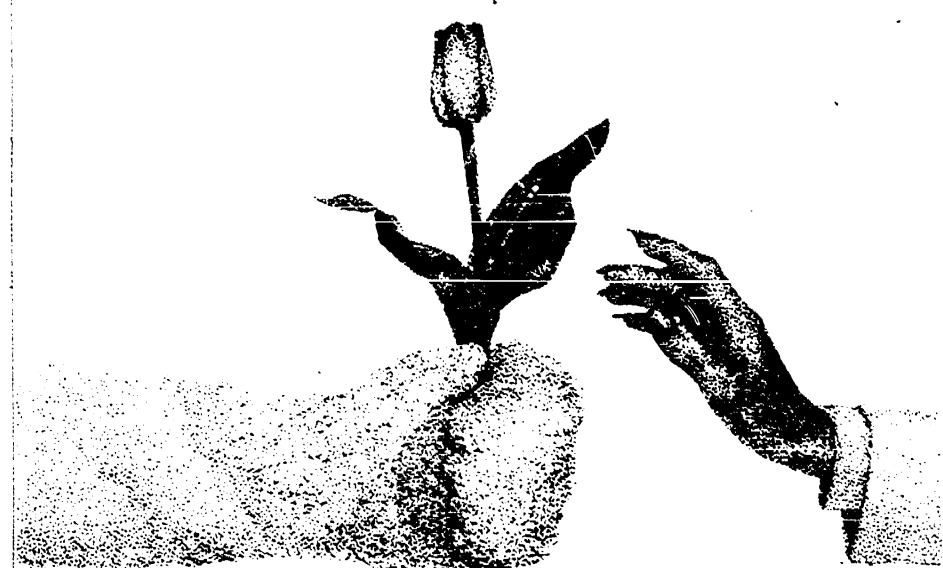

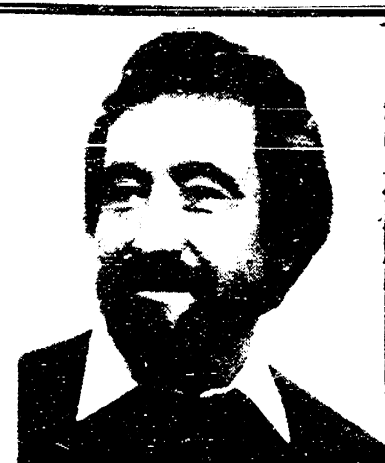

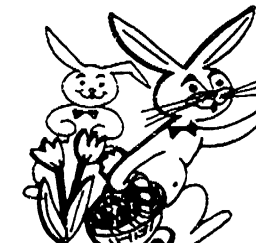
