To The Voters Of The Manchester School

At it's regular meeting on April 20th, the Board of Education set the milage request for the June 8th election. The request is for 21.78 mills or a 4 mill increase over last year's voted operating milage of 17.78. This Board decision was a unanimous one and I believe based on sound financial and operational judgements. The process started in early January and both revenues and expenses were reviewed in depth. In addition, a great deal of consideration was given to

the existing needs of our district. The Governor's proposal for property tax reductions and an increase in State sales tax also had a great deal of impact on our decision for an increase in our

As voters in the Manchester School District, you should be aware that we have been losing state aid at almost the direct proportion of our local effort increase in tax dollars. If you take inflation into consideration, it's easy to understand why it's been very difficult to run the schools without experiencing some program reductions.

As a Board, we went on record of supporting the Governor's proposal, because it will mean a substantial reduction in property taxes to us all and it will put our school district back into a state formula that will return many of our tax dollars to us.

Our request is for operational milage only, so a 4 mill increase is truly only a 2 mill one. Your property tax bill will still be substantially less than last year.

We hope that everyone gives the Governor's proposal support on May 19th and that we all support the milage request on June 8th.

Mechanic Tests Offered

Written automotive mechanic certification tests will be given in 25 cities on June 6, 13, 20 and 26, Secretary of State Richard H. Austin announced.

Deadline for applying to take the tests is May 1. No applications will be accepted after that date.

Because current Michigan law now requires all mechanics doing major repair work in registered Michigan repair facilities (shops) to be certified, Austin said many mechanics are expected to take the tests. Currently, approximately 35,000 mechanics are certified in at least one category of major repair. Certification is also required for individuals who repair and service motorcycles and recreational

Tests will be given in Detroit, Kalama zoo, Lansing, Grand Rapids, Saginaw, Traverse City, Alpena, Sault Ste. Marie. Escanaba, Marquette, Houghton, Gaylord, Flint, Ironwood, Pontiac, Mt. Pleasant, Ypsilanti. Caro, Coldwater, Lapeer, Ionia, Battle Creek, Newberry, Muskegon and Iron Mountain.

The new facility consists of seven rooms, mostly therapy spaces. They include an "activities of daily life" lab with kitchen and other stations for training patients in arthritis, heart attack or strokes have restricted their actions. 
The Manchester Township Library has recently acquired a 16mm film projector which may be borrowed by any registered library patron in good standing.



Rubella (German measles) is a common childhood disease that's often overlooked misdiagnosed because its symptoms vary. The most important consequences of rubella are birth defects that result if a pregnant woman develops the disease within the first three months of her

Preventing fetal infection and the birth defects that result in the major purpose of rubella immunization programs.

Since many young children now receive rubella vaccinations, epidemics have been prevented. However, outbreaks have been reported in junior and senior high schools, colleges, the military, and places of employment, especially hospitals. In fact, since 1976, more than 70% of persons with rubella have been over 15 years of age, and about 1 in 7 women of childbearing age is still susceptible to the disease.

To eliminate the congenital rubella syndrome, researchers recommend that susceptible adolescents and young adults, as well as children, be vaccinated.

How do people know if they are susceptible? The only reliable evidence of immunity to rubells is the presence of an antibody. It is generally accepted that a rubella vaccination provides this antibody. Women, especially those of childbearing level tested.

Rubella immunization programs significantly reduce the incidence of the disease. Vaccinating children protects them against rubella and prevents their spreading the virus. Vaccinating susceptible females who have reached childbearing age provides individual protection against rubella-induced birth defects. Ah, the lovely tender green asparagus! Each year I watch and wait for the arrival of asparagus season. I'm tempted to follow the harvest from southwestern Michigan all-too-brief season by a few weeks. season is at hand!

Instead, I buy asparagus in quantities at

our farmers' market and freeze it, so we can have a taste of spring with winter

Asparagus is one of the good things growing in Michigan, and our farmers harvested 21,800,000 pounds in 1980 from 17,300 acres. The crop, valued at \$11 million, was third largest in the nation, the Michigan Department of Agriculture

A member of the lily family, asparagus is a "kissing cousin" of the feathery asparagus fern, the robust garlic, and the graceful gladioli. Asparagus has been cultivated for more than 2,000 years.

When choosing asparagus, look for fresh straight stalks with compact tips. Store your treasure in the coldest part of the refrigerator, and use as soon as possible. Rinse thoroughly to remove any clinging sand. Then cook briefly, to preserve the valuable Vitamin C and other vitamins and minerals contained in asparagus.

Asparagus should be cooked crisptender, and never, never over-cooked, or the bright green begins to fade.

Cookbooks say one pound will feed two or three people, but at our house, it barely suffices for two. We like it best served simply, with butter and milk. The milk holds the heat while you're getting the asparagus from stove to table.

Hot cooked asparagus spears are also delicious wrapped inside a plain or cheese omelet for breakfast or brunch. You may wish to create an asparagus and meat casserole or combine with cooked spaghetti, cheese and canned soups for an north along the lakeshore to prolong this oven dish. Whatever your choice, the

How To Fight Food Spoilage

1. When shopping for food, pick up meat, poultry and dairy items last - get them home and into the refrigerator or freezer

2. Never buy food in leaking, bulging, or severely dented cans, cracked jars, or jars

with loose or bulging lids. Report such containers to the store manager

3. Maintain refrigerator temperature at 35 degree to 40 degree F and freezer to 0 degree F or lower. Check frequently.

4. Thaw meat and poultry in the refrigerator or, for faster results, in a waertight package under cold water. 5. Wash hands before preparing food.

6. After handling raw meat or poultry, wash hands before touching other food

7. Wash utensils, containers, and work surfaces before and after they come into contact with raw or cooked meat or

8. Always keep hot foods hot, and cold foods cold, until served.

Refrigerate leftovers immediately. 10. Never keep perishable food at room emperature any longer than two hours (including time to prepare, serve and eat). Promptly refrigerate leftovers.

Learn About High **Blood Pressure**

What do you know about high blood pressure? In the last 8 years, Americans have become more aware that high blood pressure is a dangerous disease. In 1973, only 13 percent of Americans knew that high blood pressure is a major cause of heart disease. Today, almost twice that many, a quarter of our population, relate high blood pressure to heart trouble. A growing number of people also now know that high blood pressure leads to strokes and kidney failure.

The dangers of high blood pressure are better known. But some people still have our people still do not know all the facts the wrong ideas about this common illness. Some people confuse high blood pressure "control" with a cure. There is no cure for high blood pressure. To keep it under control, doctors usually use medication to bring down the pressure. People with high blood pressure can bring their pressure of putting high blood pressure "under into the normal range if they follow their doctor's advice and take medicine every day. If they stop taking their pills, however, their blood pressure will go up

Another wrong idea about high blood Senior Citizens Meals pressure is that it only affects nervous and tense people. The medical term for high blood pressure is "hypertension." So some people wrongly assume that only anxious or tense people have high pressure, while calm and relaxed people have low or normal pressure. This isn't true. High blood pressure can affect anyone. It is a physical condition in which the heart and blood vessels are strained by blood pumping with too much force through the body. Lawyers, housewives, farmers, executives, students, nurses-anyone can program and decide upon the June closing have high blood pressure.

Some people think a headache, dizziness, or feeling bad are telltale signs that blood pressure is up. These, too, are wrong. High blood pressure has no symptoms. In fact, you can feel fine even though your blood pressure is high. Or, you can have a headache (for some other reason) when your pressure is normal. That's why you should take medicine each day at prescribed times. The medicine must be taken just as the doctor says for it to lower your pressure. Ask your doctor what to do if you miss a dose. Make sure your prescription doesn't run out. You should treat your high blood pressure every day,

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regardless of how you "feel." In addition to medicine, doctors sometimes tell their blood pressure patients to watch their weight, cut down on salt, exercise more, and stop smoking. Some people think they can choose either to take the medicine or to follow the other advice. This isn't usually true. The advice is meant to be followed in addition to taking medication. The two types of therapies go together. If you watch your weight, cut down on salt, exercise more, and do other things your doctor asks, it will help the medication to work better. 
