Dear Editor:

Tuesday, May 19th, is an important day for property taxpayers in Michigan. May 19th is your chance to vote a tax cut

effective immediately. Michigan voters last November sent state officials a very clear message which was twofold. First, taxpayers want cuts in property taxes and state spending. Second. while they want tax relief they are concerned that adequate revenues are provided so as not to cripple our schools, our police, and our human services. On two occasions taxpayers have rejected more radical approaches.

State lawmakers and the Governor have responded to that message by placing on a special May 19 ballot a proposal that will cut taxes while maintaining essential state services. Proposal A is a responsible approach to property tax relief.

Proposal A will cut property taxes on operating millage by 50 percent up to a maximum of \$1400 per homestead. That \$1400 figure will rise annually with inflation. The proposal also limits the growth of property tax revenues to 6 percent a year. The 6 percent cap will continue to protect homeowners from the effects of soaring assessments. The 6 percent level of Proposal A is far below the 1981 average statewide increase of 14 percent and well below projected increases for the decade ahead.

Proposal A would also require all lottery revenue to be used exclusively for schools,

residents and non-residents, and cut state Youth Art spending a quarter of a billion dollars. That's another quarter of a billion dollars

in addition to the billion which the Governor and the Legislature have already removed from the budget during the past two years. The state would be required to reimburse local governments and school

districts for all revenue lost from the tax cuts, using all of the revenue from the one and one-half cent increase in the state sales

If you don't vote or vote "no" you lose the only opportunity you have for a tax cut this year. We, as Co-Chairs of the Citizens for a Tax Cut Now Committee and as private property taxpayers, urge you to study carefully the proposal, get all the facts, and then vote on May 19.

Board Of Education Urges Yes Vote On May 19

The Board of Education of the Manchester Community Schools has adopted a resolution urging all registered voters in the school district to vote YES on Proposal A which will be on the Township ballot on May 19. Proposal A is designed to reduce property taxes by 50%. In addition state equalized valuation will be permitted to increase at a rate of no more than 6%

The official resolution adopted by the Board of Education at its regular meeting on Monday, April 20, is as follows:

Whereas, the Board of Education of the Manchester Community Schools recognizes that the State of Michigan is at a "crossroads" with respect to the issue of tax relief: and

Whereas, Proposal A will be submitted to a vote of the people of this State on May 19, 1981; and

Whereas, Proposal A represents significant progress towards achieving property tax relief for the taxpayers of Michigan without totally disrupting governmental programs and services by:

1. Providing genuine tax relief to taxpayers. Reduction in property tax payments and city income tax payments, together with expanded homestead property tax credits, will offer net tax relief, even though the sales tax is

2. Providing for 100% replacement to school districts for revenues not collected because of reductions in homestead property taxes and city income taxes.

3. Providing for a waiver of the revenue growth limitation. Although school districts generally will suffer a reduction in anticipated revenues because of the 6% revenue growth limitation, the people will be able to vote to raise or waive the limit to maintain and improve educational programs and services.

4. Returning funds to school districts in a manner which will encourage people to tax themselves to the extent necessary to provide responsible public school programs, while at the same time balancing the burden of state and local taxation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Manchester Community Schools declares its support for Proposal A as a responsible, reasonable, and realistic tax

MAY IS HYPERTENSION MONTH

We use a lot of phrases in everyday speech that everyone understands. There's the "sweet tooth", the "soft touch", and the "Saturday night special". Without explanation we know the reference is to someone who likes sugar, someone who can't say no, and to a cheap hand gun.

In the field of health care there's another phrase: the silent killer, which refers to hypertension, or high blood pressure as it sometimes is called.

In its own way the silent killer can be as dangerous as the Saturday night special. It can lurk within its victim for years before exploding as a heart attack, stroke, or kidney disease.

There are no early outward signs of hypertension. It cannot be seen or felt; but there are inward signs that can be detected. A simple blood pressure test can show whether or not your blood pressure is high. If it is, daily medication for the rest of your life (with some exceptions) can keep it under control. Hypertension can be controlled, but it cannot be cured. Once you have hypertension, you always have it.

May is High Blood Pressure Month. It's reminder that you should have your blood pressure checked at your doctor's office or local health department.


There are about 1,769,000 adults in the state who have high blood pressure. Of that number 278,213 know they have hypertension, but are not treating it. They are living at high risk. Another 622,720 have high blood pressure and don't know it, so are not treating it. This month is a good time to learn whether or not you're in that category.

With a test so simple and control so easy it's difficult to understand why so many people take chances with stroke, heart disease, and kidney disease. Heart disease is the number one killer in this country. and it could be reduced by hypertension

Michigan Food Facts Available

The 1981 edition of Michigan Food Facts has been published by the Michigan Department of Agriculture in time for Michigan Week festivities, according to Dean M. Pridgeon, MDA director.

Pridgeon said the 16-page booklet describes about 50 food crops grown commercially in our state and displays some of the "good things growing in Michigan" on the four-color cover. Major crop growing areas are identified in Food Facts, as well as crop volume and value. The state's production rank in comparison o other states is also listed.

"Our state leads the nation in production of five food crops and ranks fifth or higher in 19 others," Pridgeon said.

"Each Michigan farmer produces enough food to feed himself and 67 other people, on some of the best agricultural land in the world, a resource we must protect, since it cannot be replaced."

Agriculture is the state's second largest industry, worth \$16.5 billion to Michigan's conomy. Farmers received an estimated \$3.3 billion in 1980. Addition of transportation, processing and marketing costs brought the total retail value to \$16.5


