#### July 1st Deadline For **Reporting 1981 Crops**

Michigan farmers have until July 1, 1981 to report their 1981 crops to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Dorn Diehl, Acting State Executive Director of the Michigan ASCS says farmers need to report their crops to establish eligibility for benefits of the 1981 Wheat and Feed Grain Programs. Since there are no sit-aside requirements or normal crop acreage limitations, all farmers who file an accurate acreage report will qualify for any program payments which may be made.

The 1971 Agricultural Act, which expires after 1981, provides for disaster payments and deficiency payments which could be very important to agricultural producers in case of crop losses or low market prices in 1981.

Diehl added that crop reports are valuable in establishing proven yields on individual farms and may be used as a historical acreage base in future farm



#### Western Washtenaw **Community Council**

Chelsea Community Hospital Social Services Department recognized a need for better coordination of community services for patients being discharged from the hospital. It was often difficult to arrange for service delivery to begin on the date of a patient's discharge. As a result, in

March, 1979, the Social Services Department contacted various service providers from community groups in an effort to more clearly define what services were being currently provided and how could we better provide and coordinate

The group called itself Chelsea Area Community Services and three task groups evolved to work on community linkage, services for adults and seniors, and services for children. It was the consensus of the task groups that the community of Chelsea is currently depending upon Ann Arbor for certain services that can be provided by the community itself in a way that will be more responsive to the community's needs.

The group expanded to include Dexter and Manchester. In October, 1979, the group voted to change the name to Western Washtenaw Community Council and agreed that it will be in the best interest of the community to become a formal organization. The purpose of this organization is to enhance communication and provide linkage among direct service providers in service organizations, social service agencies, schools, law enforcement agencies and churches servicing the needs of Western Washtenaw area residents. In December, 1980, the group incorporated as a non-profit corporation and expanded to a membership of 43.

Today's economy is creating havoc for small communities such as Chelsea. In the last year and a half, 1500 jobs were lost here; families are moving out which is hurting our town's economy. Those that are staying don't know where to turn to for help with unemployment, stress counseling, children's services, and so on. Western Washtenaw Community Council is a community organization that could help the community to help their residents with information and referral services, counseling, etc. and possibly attract new residents to this area.

To date, an information/referral system is being worked on in the Senior Citizen's Activity Center on Middle Street. This system would give information and referrals to anyone who called needing assistance. Also, an alcohol/drug awareness program is being given to the fifth graders at North and South schools this year. These are only two programs being implemented so far, others are in the



#### Observation In Stop **Smoking Clinics**

The likeliest candidates seem to be between 30 and 50, and men have a slight edge. Women under 30 have the hardest time. Couples who enroll together tend to light up quicker.

These are casual observations of Robert Gunn, Ph. D., psychologist at the Ann Arbor Veterans Administration Medical the EMU Alumni Association and Center, who over the past two years has seen nearly 200 local residents take part in directors. As a faculty member at Eastern the VA's series of stop smoking clinics. for 31 years. Anderson contributed Gunn leads the clinics with Karen Berglund, R.N., M.S., a psychiatric nurse

According to Gunn, 92 percent of those who finish the four-week clinics have stopped smoking by the last of the eight

"Three months later, three-quarters of these people still are not smoking or at least they are smoking drestically less than they did before they went through the

Gunn and Berglund have conducted 16 serves the Ypsilanti community as a clinics, most of them at the VA Medical precinct delegate. Also, she is secretary to Center. A few have been held at local schools. Participants have ranged from 19 to 68 years old.

"I hesitate to generalize, but we do see some patterns," Gunn said. "I've noticed that those who succeed in stopping tend to have less turmoil in their lives right now then those who can't stop. How often a person has tried to stop smoking before or how much he or she has been smoking seems to have little to do with success in our groups," he continued. "You would Last fall Bidwell spent three months in think that heavier smokers would have a

more difficult time giving up their habit but it's no harder for them to stop than for lighter smokers.

Gunn commented that one of the most interesting patterns he has observed is that younger women tend to drop out of the clinics.

"Women under 30 usually began smoking when there was a stronger 'you've come a long way, baby' attitude than there is now. Smoking seemed to be part of getting ahead and becoming career. oriented. Nobody told them equal rights also included equal rates of lung cancer and heart disease. Now they have a hard time disconnecting smoking and success.

"This does not mean that younger women can't stop, just that it's a bit rougher going. We encourage them to come to the clinics," Gunn said.

Gunn is also curious about why couples enrolling in the same clinic do not have a higher success rate. "Rather than helping each other, some couples seem to trigger off each other's starting again, especially if they get a bit irritable while stopping," he

The clinics, which are co-sponsored by the American Cancer Society, cost only \$5 for eight one-hour sessions. All of the sessions are held on Mondays and Thursdays from 4 to 5 p.m. at the VA Medical Center, 2215 Fuller Road, Ann

The Schedule for upcoming clinics is: June 1-25; July 13-August 6; Sept. 14-Oct. 8 and Nov. 16-Dec. 10.

Americans owe a tremendous debt to the men and women who served our nation during the Vietnam war. And we now have an opportunity to

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund is a non-profit organization established in 1979 to establish a memorial to Vietnam era veterans. It is one way to say thank you for their service.

The Vietnam Veteran Memorial's purpose is not only to honor the war dead, but to serve as a symbol of reconciliation and unity after the years of anguish that our nation suffered during the war.

There is broad support for the memorial from people of widely differing views about the war itself. Backing the project, for instance, are former South Dakota Senator George McGovern, who ran for president in 1972 on an anti-war platform, as well as retired General William C. Westmoreland, former commander of American forces in Vietnam.

This project should be more than just a memorial. It should symbolize our national unity; that we, as a nation, have recovered from the domestic turmoil that existed during the Vietnam era.

Legislation to provide two acres of land for the memorial near the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., was signed into law July 1, 1980. More than 2.500 architectual teams submitted plans for the memorial in the largest design competition ever held.

The winning design consists of two elongated reposing walls that meet to shape an open V. The back of the black granite memorial will be level with the ground, while the front will gradually slope down to a depth of 10 feet where the walls meet. The names of the 57,692 men and women who died in the war will be inscribed in the memorial in chronological order, beginning with the first fatality of the war and ending with the last.

The construction of the memorial, expected to begin in the spring of 1982, will be funded through non-governmental, private sources. The Memorial Fund organization so far has raised more than \$1 million of the' \$7 million needed by the end of 1981. If you wish to make a contribution,

Washington, D.C. 20098 The memorial will be one way to recognize the debt we owe all Vietnam veterans. I recently had an opportunity to personally honor a Michigan Vietnam veteran by presenting him with an Army

Commendation Medal that he earned 12 years ago. The veteran discovered the original recommendation for his medal, submitted by his commanding officer 12 years ago, as he was going through some papers in a drawer at his home late last year. He assumed that he did not receive the medal because, he concluded, he was not worthy of it. But he asked one of my state officers to check with the Army,

The Army informed me that his recommendation was in its files and he was well worthy of the medal. The Army had just let it slip through the

As a 19-year-old draftee, he was given the responsibility for the supervision and control of combat personnel from June through December 1968. During a period in November, he assumed command of the entire unit due to the emergency leave of its commander.

His award read, in part, "...His leadership ability, technical knowledge and pride of accomplishment served as an example to his men, thereby contributing to the successful mission of his unit.'

As we honon our war dead on Memorial Day, we should not forget the debt that we owe the Vietnam veteran, as well as the veterans of other

Bedding plants are some of the most colorful good things growing in Michigan. and last year our state produced almost six million flats. Three-fourths of them were flowering plants to add brilliant hues to gardens and lawns all across Michigan. Combined, the flowering and vegetable bedding plants were worth more than \$22 million last year, about half the total \$44.3 million wholesale value of Michigan floriculture, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Michigan continues to rank second among the states in bedding plant production, and fifth in floriculture, which includes chrysanthemums, hybrid and sweetheart roses, and a variety of other cut and potted flowers. Last year, Michigan growers produced 6,648,000 pots of geraniums, enough to brighten a great many paties, planters, balconies and gardens.

Right now is a particularly delightful time to visit your city farmers' market or a roadside stand so you can feast your eves on the remarkable riot of color. It seems each year the growers bring forth new varieties or new colors of old favorites to compete for your attention.

The same is true of the vegetable plants. and isn't it nice to have someone else worry the seeds into sturdy, healthy seedlings ready for your home garden. fugure just preparing the soil beds is enough work, without having to germinate the seeds, too. And I wonder, sometimes, how many tons of tomatoes, how many bushels of green beans, sweet peppers. how many cabbages are harvested in backyard gardens from those flats of bedding plants.

Flowering plants can lift the spirits. but preparing those lucious fresh vegetables for the dinner table later this summer gives a boost to both the budget and the ego. What prouder words than. "I grew it

CANCER/COFFEE DRINKING

Some of us are newspaper scanners. We don't have time to read more than the headlines; and if the article doesn't appear to affect our lives directly, we don't read it. Take the news story a month or so ago about the suggested relationship between coffee drinking and cancer of the pancreas.

We read the report on the suggested relationship the The New England Journal of Medicine and we reviewed Michigan statistics to see if the suggestion of the linkage between pancreatic cancer and coffee drinking could be supported in this

Our statistics show that the death rate due to pancreatic cancer has not increased in the past ten years. The age-adjusted death rate from the disease was 6.5 per 100,000 people in 1970, and 6.4 per 100,000 Michigan in 1979, cancer of the pancreas accounted for 5.2 percent.

At the same time we took a look at some data for lifetime risks in Michigan, and found that pancreatic cancer causes comparatively few deaths when compared with other causes of death. Specifically, we noted that for every 100 babies born this year, 43 will eventually die of heart disease, twenty from some form of cancer, ten from stroke. four from an accident, and

With this kind of information some people might think, "Where there's smoke, there's fire," and give up coffee. Just the suspicion of a relationship will cause some to hand up their mugs and retire them like old varsity jerseys. Others will pour a

While we can only say that pancreatic cancer may be related to a variety of causes, we know that moderation in all things is a maxim of good health. We don't need an excess of anything, and that







#### **Board of Education** Reduces Millage Levv

At a special meeting following the Academic Awards Program on Wednesday, May 27 the Manchester Board of Education took action to indicate to the voters that the full millage tax levy on the ballot at the June 8 election will not be

The Board noted that it had been necessary to adopt the millage proposal prior to the proposal A vote. It had been necessary to set the millage proposal according to the demands of Proposal A. Since the proposal was defeated it became possible for the Board to reduce the levy

Proposal A provided for a 6% limitation on revenues. Since this limitation is not in effect the Board concluded that it would be possible to provide a "Full Educational Program" for approximately one mill less than the 4 additional mills which are part of the ballot proposal.

By official resolution the Board indicated to the voters the Board's intention of levying only approximately 3 mills of the 4 additional mills for operating purposes.

The Board has stated that this action is intended to indicate to the voters the serious attempts being made to contain property taxes while providing a full educational program.

# GIRL'S SOFTBALL TEAM 1981 L.C.A.A. CO-CHAMPIONS


