For years the most dreaded of shots have been those given for rabies. Imagine having 23 injections in the abdomen and thighs to counteract the bite of a rabid animal. What's more, the reactions to the vaccine are often severe.

Rabies is a disease of the central nervous system, and almost always is fatal without treatment. Effective intervention is by means of vaccine to create immunity to the

The future holds promise for a better way to treat people bitten by rabid animals. Our health laboratory may soon be ready to market a new vaccine which will be effective with just six injections and cause no severe side reaction. This is good news to everyone, including veterinarians and veterinary students who work with large and small animals.

At the moment, the new drug is not on the market. It's being tested on human clinical volunteers, and this spring will be further tested in what is called a simulation trial, which simulates use of the vaccine as though exposure to rabies had

After the final simulation tests, the test information will be sent to the Food and Drug Administration. When the vaccine is licensed, in about a year, it will be provided to local health departments and physicians in the state. It will also be offered to other state health departments with a demonstrated need, at a cost of about \$20 per dose.

Last July a similar French vaccine was licensed for use in this country, but its cost is higher than ours will be. The French vaccine costs \$42.50 per injection, plus \$100 to \$150 for the immune globuling injections that must accompany them.

Michigan hasn't had a rabies case in humans since 1948, but the fear is always present. Thus, when a person is suspected of having been bitten by a rabid animal, the injections are given.

Soon they will be painless, less expensive, and without significant side effects. Another achievement for our State Dealoris E. Richardson, clerk Health Laboratory.
