Voters Approve **Operational Millage Defeat Proposition** II And III

The Manchester Community went to the polls on Monday, August 10, 1981.

Proposition I for Millage Renewal was passed with 749 yes votes and 347 no votes. Proposition II for tax rate limitation increase for operating purposes was defeated with 510 yes votes and 570 no votes. Proposition III for tax rate limitation increase to support a reduced athletic program was also defeated with 482 yes votes and 601 no votes.

News Of Good Things Growing

Thirty-five million pounds of peaches would make a mound of peach sundaes or peaches and cream! Good things are growing in Michigan and our state's peach growers are estimating this harvest of peaches this summer, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Due to adverse weather conditions, thi year's production is forecast at 12 percent less than last year. Peaches are picked when 'firm-ripe'. Because of this, they're very perishable and require special

Unlike peaches, Michigan pears are picked when not quite fully ripe and still firm. To ripen pears, store tham is a dark days. Our state's pear production is forecast to drop 10 percent, with an estimated 18,000,000 pound harvest this summer. Michigan was fifth in the nation in total pear harvest, according to MDA.

Most of our state's pears, primarily Bartletts, go to canners; however, fresh Michigan pears are available mid-August through October.

Prune plum production in Michigan was fourth highest in the nation in 1980. despite an 11 percent crop decline. Growers harvested 25 million pounds with a total-market value of about \$2.6 million.

Two-thirds of the prune plum crop goes to processors for making Jams, jellies, reserves and other products. Michigan olums are also excellent in cakes, tarts, pies, salads or for out-of-hand eating.

All three fruits are excellent for snacks and preserving, but check your cookbooks for new recipes, too. Rolled or baked peaches compliment ham or duckling main courses. And here's a great recipe for plum sauce, to use with spareribs at a backyard picnic or with roast loin of pork.

One and 1/2 pounds fresh Michigan olums, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup cider vinegar, /s cup horseradish, 'A cup chopped onion, 1 clove garlic (crushed), 1 tablespoon salt. Combine all ingredients, bring to boil and simmer until plums are tender. Put in blender and pures (half the mixture at a ime). Reheat. Makes 2 cups.
