I voted NO on Proposal Three on August 10. My vote was one of the more than 600 that cancelled athletic programs---"the things that make school fun", as you

said—in the Manchester schools. I did not vote No because I thought the miliage would be an excessive financial burden nor because I am selfish and do not like to see you have fun. The amount asked for could have been six or seven or ten or twenty times more-or less-than what was asked for and I still would have voted No. As I perceived it, the issue was not money but educational priorities in that a child is in a particular school then Manchester. And here, two major points that child's values-and perhaps those of

during the school term our kids have come home after shivering the whole day in a building that cannot supply them with adequate heat. In addition, two years ago, your teachers had to strike in order to get a decent wage from the Board of Education. Yet there has always been enough money and community support for football, basketball, volleyball, and enough money for the superintendent, who has yet to prove he is of any value to this district. to be supplied with a new leased car. Granted, the repairs to the school have finally been budgetted and granted too that state funding is drying up and granted that inflation has increased school operating costs. But the amount of taxable property in Manchester has also increased and inflation has also increased the total amount of local revenue. Now I may be ignorant or badly informed but I have yet to read or hear a convincing argument which accounts for the expenditures of local monies. 

It was moved by Little, Supported by DuFresne, that the Superintendent of make application to the Municipal Finance Commission to borrow the sum of \$415,000 in anticipation of the collection of the unpaid operating taxes for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1982 to meet payrolls and other operating expenses.

Johnson, Director of Environmental Health Services at the County Health Department, involves the use of a machine which emits a fine mist into the air and kills mosquitoes while in flight. "Ground fogging provides added protection to people in an area, however, everyone should avoid unnecessary exposure to mosquitoes," Johnson said.

Boating, fishing, camping and hiking should be avoided where these activities present a high risk of exposure to mosquitoes. It is also recommended that insecticides be used to kill mosquitoes. When unavoidably exposed, use repellents and wear long sleeves and long pants to reduce the risk of being bitten.

A flood elevation determination under section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the flood plain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts flood plain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the flood plain and do not proscribe development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of


