The following is a memorandum received from the Michigan Department of Education.

SUBJECT: Preliminary Qualification of Bonds for Manchester Community Schools.

The application dated September 8th, 1981, received from Manchester Community Schools for Preliminary Qualification of Bonds in the amount of \$1.920,000 is to be voted as two propositions as follows:

Proposition I - \$1,620,000 - for the purpose of erecting, furnishing and equipping an addition or additions to. remodeling and partially re-equipping existing school facilities; constructing and equipping a bus maintenance facility and developing and improving sites.

Proposition II - \$330.000 - for the purpose of constructing and equipping improvements to the Booster's Athletic

Field and acquiring additional land for site Senior Citizens

renovating and remodeling the school at the Methodist Church on Wednesday, buildings for energy conservation and also September 30 at 12:30 p.m. Bring a dish to provide for a new bus garage and pass and your own dishes. improved athletic facilities. Enclosed All area Senior Citizens are welcome. studies entitled "School Facility Report" and "Study of Manchester High School 1979" document the need for the projects to be financed by the bond issue. An on site inspection of existing conditions supports the needs assessments for the proposed projects.

The main thrust of the issue is primarily remodeling and rehabilitation of the high school with new construction being mostly non-instructional ancillary space which does not impact student capacities. According to MSU projections, the District will experience a decline of approximately 100 students in the next five years with only 10 being lost at the high school level. The ratio of debt to valuation will be

3.3% if the bond issue is successful. A bond issue for remodeling elementary school facilities and improving the athletic acility was defeated in 1974.

The proposed bond issue meets all of the requirements of Public Act No. 108, as mended, for the qualification of school bonds, and it is our recommendation that Preliminary Qualification be granted so that the District may hold its election on

### A Reason For The **Postal Increase**

We at THE MASONIC WORLD are very conscious of postage costs - it's one of the largest expenses in our business. We're all conscious of the fact that we are now paying 18 cents for a first class letter - and soon it will be 20 cents. In fact, Postmaster General Bolger is considering a 23-cent stamp for a first class letter! There must be a good reason.

We think we found one of the reasons. It came to our attention from Mr. Robin Ficker, a member of the Maryland House of Delegates. Ficker points out that the Post Office Department made a \$61/2 million land purchase in his district in October, 1980, just before the national elections. The reason? There are plans for a "training resort" for postal employees at a construction cost of \$28.3 million. With the financing charges over a period of years, that figure is hiked to \$50 million.

This "Tara" resort will include a cocktail lounge, swimming pool, gymnasium, jogging trails, eight tennis courts, golf course and other "Taj Mahal" amenities to help "train" 500 postal employees at one time over a six-week period.

Now you know why those extra pennies are needed for every first class letter. It would appear to be government waste in its purest form.

### Students Participate In Michigan **Educational Program**

Manchester students in grades 4. 7. and 10 will be participating in the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) during the next few weeks. The MEAP is a series of tests designed to measure student ability in the basic skills of math and

The identification of very specific skills in these two areas has been carried out by the Michigan Department of Education. Tests to measure these specific skills were then developed by private educational research firms. For each specific skill a student is asked to respond to 5 separate questions in order for it to be determined that the student has mastered the skill he/she must answer 4 of the questions

Manchester students for the past few years have scored among the leaders in the county in the Michigan Educational Assessment Program. Results of the test are expected to be available in the schools by mid-October. The results will be available to parents and will be used by teachers in the development of specific programs to meet the needs of each

Parents having questions regarding the tests should contact the building principal. Test results will be made available to parents as soon as possible after they are received in the schools.

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### Manchester Village Planning Commission

August 11, 1981

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was called to order at 7:38 p.m. by Chairman Hinkley. Members present: Tracy. Walton. Grossman, Kallewaard, Alber, Smith. Leeson, Hinkley, Krauss. Members absent: none. A quorum was present.

Minutes of the Special Meeting of July 21 were read and approved on a motion by Grossman, seconded by Alber. Minutes of the Regular Meeting of July 14 were approved on a motion by Leeson, seconded by Alber.

Mr. Gene Smith of Pinnacle Engineering was present to apply for an amendment to the conditional use permit under which Pinnacle presently operates a machine shop at 617 City Road, in an area zoned R-1B, Single-Family Urban Residential District. A letter from Smith (copy attached, and hereby incorporated by reference) was read, in which he stated that the change is requested in order to allow construction of an enclosed storage area at the rear of the building.

Smith presented a site plan and architectural drawings of the east, west and rear elevations of the existing and proposed structures. He stated that the addition would be built of brick to match the existing building, and that brick planter boxes would be constructed along the east and west exterior walls. He also stated that there would be one overhead door and one man door in the addition, but no windows: that footings already exist under the concrete slab which would serve as the floor of the addition and therefore the slab would not be altered or enlarged; and that all trucks would continue to unload at the front of the building, not at the rear. He also stated that, in an effort to eliminate a drainage problem now existing. Pinnacle would be willing to install a drain from the back of the property to the drainage ditch running along City Road. and to repave in order to achieve a higher level at the rear of the building, with runoff to the front


The Planning Commission reviewed two petitions previously submitted (copies attached and hereby incorporated by reference): one with the names of 45 area residents in opposition to the Pinnacle addition, and another with the names of 65 area residents in support of the addition. It was noted that many individuals had signed both petitions, and that the petition in support of the addition was more recent than the petition in opposition.



607 City Road, was present to state his opposition to any amendment of Pinnacle's conditional use permit. He stated that, while he could understand why neighborhood residents would support a proposal that promised to improve the appearance of Pinnacle's property and cover up the "mess" at the rear of the building, he felt that the heart of the matter was that Pinnacle was not observing the conditions set out in their original conditional use permit. He felt that the terms of that conditional use permit should be retained, particularly the items stating that, "Business activity and storage shall be confined inside the building" and "Existing structure cannot be enlarged". He expressed doubt that Pinnacle would adhere to any new conditions granted, since the company was already in violation of one of the original conditions.

In discussion, several Commission members stated the opinion that Pinnacle's proposals would improve the property by eliminating a problem of standing water in the rear yard, and enclosing the storage materials which now are an eyesore to neighboring residences. Various members also noted that Pinnacle employs three Village residents: that the company has organized a work training program; and that no complaint was made when the rear

concrete slab began to be used for storage. It was moved by Krauss, and seconded Grossman, to recommend to Village Council the approval of an amendment to the conditional use permit granted to Pinnacle Engineering Co., to allow construction of an enclosed area, to be used

for storage, over an existing 20' x 55' concrete slab at the rear of the existing building, according to the details contained in architectural drawings submitted by Pinnacle, and subject to the following eight

1) After completion of this addition, there will be no exterior storage.

2) No other additions will be requested. 3) The addition will be faced with brick to match the brick of the existing structure. 4) An 8" PVC storm drain will be installed from the rear of the property to the drainage ditch running along City Road. 5) A pitched roof will be constructed. similar to the roof on the Manchester Township Hall.

6) There will be landscaping around the entire perimeter of the building, including brick planter boxes, containing evergreens, along the east and west elevations.

7) Pinnacle will conform to the items contained in Section 56.07 of the Manchester Village Zoning Ordinance. concerning establishment of transition strips between residential and commercial

8) Planning Commission members Hinkley and Alber will review with Pinnacle, and with Building and Zoning Inspector Claran Knauss, the final selection of architectural details and building materials.

On a roll-call vote, the motion was passed, with members voting as follows: Alber, yes: Smith, yes; Leeson, yes; Krauss, yes; Tracy, no; Walton, yes; Grossman, yes; Kallewaard, yes.

Hinkley reported that Village Council had approved the proposed new mobile home ordinance drafted by the Planning Commission and Village Attorney, and also a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance that would require that any single family dwelling erected in the Village have a minimum square footage of 1,000 feet, and scheduled a Public Hearing on both items for August 24 at 7:30 p.m. at the Village Hall. Mrs. P.J. White, of 236 Grove Street, was present and stated that she wanted to remove the mobile home now located at that address and replace it with a newer, larger mobile home. The Commission requested Mrs. White to postpone such action until after adoption of a new mobile home ordinance by Village Council.

Alber reported that, based on his preliminary research, cost of installing access roads and sewer lines to the proposed Industrial Park could be in the neighborhood of \$15,000 per acre. Alber and Hinkley were appointed to meet with realtor and developer Carl Brauer of Ann Arbor, who had expressed an interest in discussing the general question of private vs. public development of an Industrial Park for the Village of Manchester.

Hinkley reported that Village Council is in the process of reviewing all Village ordinances and making revisions where necessary. He stated that at the next Regular Meeting of the Planning Commission Zoning Ordinance changes proposed in October, 1980 by the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission representative would be



The Manchester Jaycettes have been in action since 1970. The purpose has been twofold: first to serve our community and second to promote the personal growth of its members.






