ELECTION DATE SET FOR MANCHESTER SCHOOL DISTRICT

Education action was taken to set present time the athletic site has an all electon which will give voters in the Manchester School District an opportunity to make a decision regarding three financial proposals. The last date of voter

Proposition I which will be presented to the voters asks whether or not the school district should sell bonds totaling \$1,620,000 in order to finance renovation and repair of the district's buildings. Superintendent Eugene Thompson notes, allowed to deteriorate over a period of many years. 

News Of Good Things Growing

One of the pleasures of the football season, I think, is the opportunity it affords for tailgate picnics in Michigan's beautiful autumn weather. Best of all, it gives us a chance to take advantage of some of the good things growing in Michigan.

Tailgate picnics can be as simple or elaborate as you choose, but check the weather forecast before you plan your menu. If it's going to be a cool, crisp afternoon, a thermos of soup will be especially welcome.

Chili is a favorite, and variations in chili recipes are almost endless. I like it made with fresh Michigan ground beef and sausage, in proportions of three parts beef to one of sausage. Michigan onions, green pepper, and celery add flavor; chopped tomatoes and red kidney beans provide texture and taste. If you're in a hurry, use canned kidney beans. If time is plentiful, it's nice to soak and simmer a package of dried kidney beans.

As everybody in this state must know by now, Michigan produces one-third of all the dry edible beans harvested in the United States, and 91 percent of all navy beans. Varieties include, besides navy and kidney beans, cranberry, pinto and black beans.

With hot chili, you can forget the sandwiches and offer pre-buttered French or rye bread, an assortment of crackers. Instead of salad, take along crisp

relishes, such as carrot and celery sticks, cauliflowerets, raw broccoli, cucumber and zucchini spears. For dessert, offer a basket of fresh colorful apples, some late peaches, sweet plums and pears, but be sure you have plenty of paper napkins to catch the

And for beverages, Michigan wine, apple cider or cold refreshing Michigan milk. After a winning Michigan meal like that, maybe you won't mind quite so much if the parking spaces to MDOT's existing 5,000 home team doesn't win.

Carpoolers save wear and tear on the family automobile, driving in peak traffic and finding parking spaces near their jobs.

Like many of the lots, the Portland facility is paved and landscaped. A few of the largest, busiest lots in the state have telephones and newspaper racks. Most of the lots have gravel surfaces.

All are maintained by the department and parking is free.

Michigan's statewide carpool parking lot program began seven years ago, in August, 1974, following the 1973 oil embargo and increased concern with energy conservation. MDOT district engineers were reporting that numerous commuters, an order to share rides to work, were parking their cars along state

highways, sometimes on private property.

Reports of this and its possible safety
problems prompted the department to select potential sites for controlled parking

property taxes. "I consider the Governor's proposal to be a cruel hoax which he intends to play upon the people of the State of Michigan. His proposal amounts to little more than the old carnival shell game. I don't believe the citizens of the Manchester Community Schools will swallow more of his smooth

The fact is that since 1979 State contributions to the Manchester budget have declined from \$376,000 to an estimated \$40,000 for the current school year. The latter figure is subject to additional reductions ordered by the Governor. In short, he has simply shifted the state problem to local school districts while proclaiming that we have not been properly managing our budgets.

The proposal for a \$45% reduction in property tax over the next three years is very appealing on the surface. It is not until one reads further and discovers the proposal also contains a provision for the state to make up only 65% of the revenues lost by local school districts does the truth become evident. This provision layered with another category of bureaucracy which is seductively labeled as accountability amounts to a boax upon local

This proposal would result in another \$50,000 loss in revenues to the Manchester Community Schools. For a school district already hard pressed by reductions from Lansing the results could be disastrous.

It is interesting to note that the Governor chooses to reduce local property taxes with no provision for full replacement without reducing taxes paid to the state. The state does not benefit in any way from local property tax. Instead of

2.7 Million Dollar Budget Adopted

Revenues in the Manchester schools increased by 6.5%. The bulk of this increase, of course, came from local property taxes. Almost every other revenue category in the budget reflected a decline. The most serious of these was in the area of categorical reimbursement money from the Michigan Department of Education. The district is projecting approximately \$40,000 of revenue from this source. This figure reflects a decline from \$376,000 three years ago and \$64,000 last year. The sharp decline in reimbursement money from the State has largely been responsible for the financial problems the school district has experienced.

The school district managed to balance the budget with a cash equity left over from the previous year of \$155,000. A balance of \$56,000 is projected for the





Manchester Bus **Drivers Demand** 10.25% Increase

Negotiations between the Manchester Community School bus drivers and the Board of Education have apparently stalled. Current driver demands are for a 10.25 percent increase in hourly salary. The drivers are currently working under the terms of their previous contract with the Board which calls for an hourly salary of \$5.43.

During negotiation sessions which have been going on for several weeks the Board of Education, through Superintendent Eugene Thompson, has reached an offer of 7.5 percent. This increase would provide an hourly salary of \$5.84.

"An hourly increase of over 10 percent will not fit into our budget," said Superintendent Thompson. "School district overall revenues increased by 6.5 percent. The financial condition of the school district simply does not have room for increases considerably over this figure. While we are pleased that the drivers have come down from their initial position of a demand for an 18 percent increase we feel that there is a long way yet to go."

Additional negotiations are planned for the week of October 12. At that time the Board of Education team made up of Superintendent Thompson and High School Principal James Kappler will meet with driver representatives Evie Seegert, Joann Clark, and Karen Leach in an effort to resolve the differences.

Township Removes 1% Collection Fee

The Sharon Township Board voted unanimously to remove the 1% collection fee on 1982 property tax. The 1% penalty fee will still be applied for taxes paid after the February 15 tax deadline. Taxes paid after that date are paid to the Washtenaw County Treasurer.


Hit Or Miss by farley
