

Manchester Bus **Drivers Demand** 10.25% Increase

Negotiations between the Manchester Community School bus drivers and the Board of Education have apparently stalled. Current driver demands are for a 10.25 percent increase in hourly salary. The drivers are currently working under the terms of their previous contract with the Board which calls for an hourly salary of \$5.43.

During negotiation sessions which have been going on for several weeks the Board of Education, through Superintendent Eugene Thompson, has reached an offer of 7.5 percent. This increase would provide an hourly salary of \$5.84.

"An hourly increase of over 10 percent will not fit into our budget," said Superintendent Thompson. "School district overall revenues increased by 6.5 percent. The financial condition of the school district simply does not have room for increases considerably over this figure. While we are pleased that the drivers have come down from their initial position of a demand for an 18 percent increase we feel that there is a long way yet to go."

Additional negotiations are planned for the week of October 12. At that time the Board of Education team made up of Superintendent Thompson and High School Principal James Kappler will meet with driver representatives Evie Seegert, Joann Clark, and Karen Leach in an effort to resolve the differences.

Township Removes 1% Collection Fee

The Sharon Township Board voted unanimously to remove the 1% collection fee on 1982 property tax. The 1% penalty fee will still be applied for taxes paid after the February 15 tax deadline. Taxes paid after that date are paid to the Washtenaw County Treasurer.



Section 2501 MOBILE HOMES A. PURPOSE

NASA explains that they use a practical and orecise language, even if it isn't English. They say they don't use the word "weightlessness" any more because nowhere in the universe is there a spot totally without gravity. Their substitute is "a microgravity situation".


The shuttle launch recently broke down because of a troublesome computer, no NASA spokesman admitted it in English. They merely said that the shuttle had "gone into a temporary malfunction mode' and this is an example of their plain

And also the astronauts do not leave their ship. They regress the orbitor. They do not go to the john, they go to a "waste management area."

I like Mr. Rooney's theory. To befuddle is perhaps the most important function of an agency like NASA. It is a patriotic service. To put to sleep the members of the House and Senate appropriations committee is surely a patriotic service. And so for doing so such things like space shuttles are evolved.

Malcolm Baldridge, Commerce Secretary urges plain English and had banned such favorite Washington words like "orient", "finalize", "viable", and "priorize". He also resents turning adjectives into verbs such as to interface, and to impact.

But all in all perhaps we had better in the not too far distant future, teach courses in "Bureaucratize". We're going to need it to find out just what is now going on in Washington-I wish I did.



Weight Reduction Classes Offered

Chelsea Community Hospital is pleased to once again offer a series of ten weight reduction classes that will begin the week of October 4, 1981. The classes are 10 weeks in length. Topics to be covered during the 10 weeks include low calorie cooking tips, exercise and weight reduction, shopping tips, eating out on a low calorie diet, normal nutrition, and information on fad diets. Particular emphasis will be given to assessing behavior modification techniques helpful to each person's weight reduction program.

The course will be taught by Julie Say, R.D., Community Nutritionist and Karen Pyett, R.D., Clinical Distition.

Each registrant will receive a personalized diet, knowledge of using behavioral techniques useful in controlling weight, and increased knowledge in nutritional aspects of weight reduction.

Community members who attended the spring series of weight reduction classes enjoyed learning about topics offered in the program. Class members were also pleased with their success in weight loss. The average weight less for each participant was 1 pound per week.

A registration fee of \$35.00 is charged to cover costs of the ten class series. Afternoon classes will be held at Chelsea Community Hospital, 775 South Main Street at 4:00 p.m. each Tuesday. Evening classes will be held at The Methodist Church of Chelsea, located at 128 Park Street on Thursday evenings at 7:00 P.M.
