I must confess to some bewilderment at Since funding for the athletic program has neighbors to vote yes on November 9. generated such passionate debate-a debate, incidentally, in which both sides have valid arguments-it appears that the coupling of that proposal with one to fund transportation is, to say the least, illadvised. Transportation and athletics are two entirely different, unrelated categories of activity, are they not? And surely, they are not of equivalent value to the children of this school district. Yet they appear together as Proposal III while Proposal II which is generically related to an athletic program appears as an entirely separate item. Now one really hates to think that the Board of Education would stoop so low as to try to railroad through the athletic issue by tying it to the transportation proposal. Regardless of the position one takes on either issue, one is forced to conclude that while such a tactic may be legal it is a clear violation of the spirit of popular self-government in which Thomas Jefferson, for one, placed his trust. Such a maneuver must clearly be below even the

peculiar variety of Christianity to which Mr. Broucek subscribes. Since a similar maneuver last spring had nearly catastrophic consequences, one would expect a responsible Board to avoid such a pitfall again-less than six months later. Yet one shuns the conclusion that the Board is, as a body, stupid.

Could there perhaps have been a temporary lapse of consciousness somewhere? Could there be perhaps a secretarial or printing error? Am I naive in expecting better than this from the "Good Friends of Our Youth "?
