

As a married woman Mrs. Fletcher no longer qualified for the \$180.90 monthly payment from Social Security that she had received since the death of her father.

But that didn't stop the U.S. Treasury Department in San Francisco and they just kept mailing the checks.

Mrs. Barnes who lives in Bennington, Nebraska said she notified Social Security officials before the wedding that her daughter was going to be married. She filled out forms and sent them to Lincoln, Nebraska, to have the checks stopped. But the checks arrived on time in July and

Mrs. Barnes called the Social Security offices in Omaha and they advised her to mail the checks back to San Francisco, which she did.

Then when another \$180.90 check arrived at the beginning of September. Mrs. Barnes decided to take action. She returned the check in an envelope with this emphatic message written on the back flap: "SHE IS MARRIED. PLEASE DON'T SEND ANY MORE CHECK."

And in the mail that Friday was-you guessed it -- a check for \$180.90.



#### School Releases Five Year History Of

Finances

In an effort to explain the true financial picture of the school district to voters the Manchester Board of Education has prepared a five year historical record of the school district's finances. The data are illustrated in the following chart.

During the five year period the total revenues available to the school district have increased by 22% or an average of less than 5% per year. "This concept is difficult to understand." said Manchester Superintendent Eugene Thompson. "During this period all of us have seen our property taxes rise at an incredible rate. Most of these taxes come to the school system however, during this period State support of education declined at an even greater rate. Even though revenues from property taxes increased other sources of revenue declined sharply. The result was a percentage rate of increase in revenue much lower than the rate of inflation."


Thompson reported that during the same period expenditures increased by 30% or about an average of 6% per year. "We have kept our expenses closely in line with revenues." said Thompson. "Our cash balance has enabled us to balance the budget each year."


During the five year period the district's millage rate has generally been at 29 mills or less. In 1978 voters approved a .6 special millage for maintenance purposes, however, the next year the district was forced to roll back millage in order to







Based upon information currently available it is estimated that the millage levy for proposition I will be 2.9 mills. Six-tenths of a mill would be required to retire the debt from Proposition II.

A third proposition will seek permission to levy 1 additional mill for operating purposes. The Board of Education has adopted a resolution stating that these monies would be used to restore athletic programs and transportation services until

#### Hit or Miss by farley

Author Betty Friedan says that women have a problem-s nameless one that she first noted in the 1960's. She says they have feminine battle fatigue. She says women don't really know what they want.

They have a job. They have their own bank account. They have a relationship with a fellow. They have a relationship with NOW. They subscribe to MS. They have an ERA button. You belong to a conscious - raising group. You don't have to get married or stay married to anyone or have children or stay at home with them if you don't want to.

But there is still something wrong. There are days when your job drags

horribly but you have to keep working because you need the money (who don't). You are still stuck with most of the work at home after office hours. There are days when you wish you were married if you aren't and single if you aren't. Or you want children if you don't have any. But you are supposed to be free-to-be-me and you aren't. You are, she says, exhausted trying to be "me" but you secretly ask yourself "Is this all there is?"

Betty says this disease has as yet no name but she saw her first case of it in the early 1960's and it has since been getting worse and worse. You have been a part of hammering out the most significant movement of the decade-and now you aren't at all sure you want what you have. You just don't like the looks of it, do you? Maybe what you have gotten isn't what you wanted, is it?

Too there seems to be a backlash to all this. The faltering economy may give the establishment males a chance to take away from you your job or your promotion. Nobody is going to provide day care centers or a guarantee of unlimited maternity leave or always equal pay for women's work that is comparable to that of the men.

The new equal rights amendment would like to take away from you your right to an abortion and see you back on the suburban cul-de-sac although no one can afford it nowadays.

stage of the women's movement is rapidly ending in discouragement, disillusionment, a lack of leadership and a lost of direction so what next?

Ms. Friedan has written a new book The Second Stage, which is a mishmash of generalities, utopian cliches and women's movement revisionisms.

She says the women's movement went very wrong in pushing so hard to escape the bondage of housework and "second-sex" status that it ignores the need of women for husband and children and a home. She says that reconciliation with the anti-ERA forces who turned "family" into a buzzword for reaction and where "family" is the new frontier for the feminist.

It was the feminist's failure to resolve the "insoluable problems of child bearing and child rearing" that lost them the following of millions of women who consider them a threat to the stake they have in motherhood and traditional family life, the author says.

In the second stage of the feminist movement, she says, women will have to work out the unresolved problems of how to divide up the housework and job work
