\$145.00 per month. Currently this option is tied to full family health insurance premiums. In conjunction with this recommendation it was also recommended that the dental program provided to administrators be improved. 





The proposal which was developed by Mrs. Nondus Buss and Mr. Brian Schick, principal of the Manchester Middle School will provide a one-half time staff person for the second semester of the current school year along with extensive materials and specialized staff development. In addition to the amount of the grant the Board of Education has voted to allocate \$3,000 to this program. It is anticipated that approximately 10% of the students in the middle school will be served by the

Dr. Eugene Thompson, Superintendent of Schools, expressed his pleasure to the Board of Education. "This proposal and grant is the result of two years of hard work by many persons. It began when the Board of Education adopted a philosophical position in support of talented and gifted education two years ago. The fact that only five grants were awarded throughout the entire state demonstrates to me that there is recognition that we have a very sound school system and that we are moving in the right direction. All of the staff and parents who worked so hard for this project should be justifiably proud of their efforts. with a tight fitting lid. If you haven't a lid. several thicknesses of foil securely tied

with string will do. Most molds have Here's my recipe for Plum pudding. which uses several of the Good Things Growing in Michigan.

Chop or grind two cups suet (ask your butcher for this). Add 1 cup light molasses or 1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups peeled. chopped apple, 1 cup seedless raisins and 1 cup currants. Stir in 1 cup cold water and 2 well-beaten eggs.

Sift 11/2 cups flour with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, and a half-teaspoon each of cloves and allspice. Stir in 11/2 cups fine dry bread crumbs. Add this mixture to the suet mixture and blend well. You may add one-quarter cup brandy if you like.

Grease the mold and sprinkle it with sugar. This is necessary to give your pudding a glossy surface. Fill with batter, not more than two-thirds full. Cover

Energy Programs Announced

Saving energy and creating new industry are the goals for a new Energy Technology Development Program announced today by Michigan Energy Administration Director Joann Neuroth. The program will provide financial assistance for development and demonstration of innovative energy devices or systems.

The Energy Administration intends to spend \$200,000 for projects which have the potential for commercial scale production. individuals, non-profit organizations, state and local government agencies, and small businesses may apply for funding.

"This innovative program responds Michigan's priorities of reducing energy consumption and dollars spent on energy imports, as well as diversifying the state's economic base," Neuroth said.

Projects which are at the prototype development stage and which are technically fessible may be eligible to receive funds. Applicants must share a portion of the project's total cost.





TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 9

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN DISTRICTS WITHIN MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP. WASHTENAW COUNTY.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP. WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Article III is amended by adding the following Section:

Section 3.10 Mobile Homes

A. Purpose - This section of the zoning ordinance is designed to establish regulations under which mobile homes may be used as single-family dwellings on lots outside of mobile home parks. It is hereby recognized that other forms of manufactured housing, commonly referred as prefabricated, modular, or sectional housing, among other names, are and have been permitted in Manchester Township. on individual lots, in a zoning district in which single-family dwellings are permitted, provided such units comply with the adopted building code and zoning requirements. This section intends to treat mobile homes in a similar fashion, while recognizing the unique features of their similar fashion, while recognizing the unique features of their construction. The regulations contained in this section are specifically designed to:

1. Insure compliance of mobile homes on individual lots with all zoning regulations applicable to all other single-family dwellings permitted in Manchester Township.

2. Insure compliance with the National Mobile home Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974 (Title VI of PUB.

L. 93-383, 88 STAT. 700. 42 U.S.C. Section 5401, et seq) and all Township codes, in addition to the zoning ordinance, for the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare.

3. To be aesthetically compatible with other single-family dwellings in the

B. Standards and Requirements - A mobile home may be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot outside a mobile home ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING ZONING park, if the following standards and requirements are met. These standards and requirements shall not apply to a mobile home located in a licensed mobile home park.

> 1. The lot shall be located in a zoning district which permits single-family

> > 2. The lot and the mobile home shall district in which located.

> > 3. The mobile home shall meet all requirements for residential mobile units, as provided in the National Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974 (Title VI of PUB. L. 93-383, 88 STAT. 700, 42 U.S.C. 5401,

> > 4. The mobile home shall be placed onto a permanent foundation wall. The wall shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction Code and shall completely enclose the area under the mobile home. The area so enclosed shall not be less than the ground floor area of the mobile home. The mobile home shall be anchored and meet all State of Michigan requirements.

> > 5. The wheels, tongue and hitch, or other towing appurtenances, shall be removed before attaching the mobile home to the foundation wall.

6. The mobile home shall be connected to public water and sanitary sewer lines. where available, according to Township standards and specifications, or to a well and septic tank approved by the County Health Department.

7. The mobile home shall be aesthetically compatible in design and appearance with conventional on-site constructed housing, and other types of approved manufactured housing. Compatibility shall be determined by the following 12. Outdoor storage shall be prohibited.

a. Exterior walls shall be finished with natural or simulate natural materials. common to single-family dwellings, such as but not limited to beveled siding, vertical siding, board and batten siding, or brick.

b. Front and rear or front and side exterior doors.

c. A roof drainage system which will collect, and concentrate the disc arge of, roof drainage, and will avoid roof drainage along the sides of the dwelling.

8. A building permit shall be required for

construction of the foundation wall, for placement of the mobile home on the lot. and for any addition to the mobile home. A building permit shall not be issued until a health permit has been issued by comply with all regulations of the zoning the County Health Department, where applicable and until a certificate of zoning compliance has been issued in accordance with Article XX, herein, and is in effect. The mobile home shall not be occupied until a certificate of occupancy has been issued as provided in Article XX. herein and is in effect. Any addition to a mobile home shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction (stick built). If the addition is constructed by the mobile home

The mobile home, prior to any additions, shall have a minimum floor area of 1,000 square feet, a minimum exterior width of 24 feet for at least one side elevation, and a minimum floor-toceiling height of 7.5 feet. 10. Not more than one mobile home shall be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot. nor shall a mobile home be placed on any lot on which another single-family dwelling is located. A mobile home shall not be used as an accessory building in any residential district.

11. A mobile home shall not be removed from a foundation until a permit therefore has been issued by the building official, in accordance with the Michigan State Construction Code.

Section 18.11 - Single-Family Dwelling Floor Area

All single-family dwellings constructed or erected in Manchester Township shall have a minimum floor area of one thousand (1,000) square feet and a minimum exterior width of 24 feet for at least one side elevation.

Section 3. That Section 4.03 - G. 5.03 - K. 6.03 - G and 7.03 - F are amended by delection of the language therein and substituting the following therefore:

"Temporary occupancy of a mobile home other than permitted under Section 3.10 of

Section 4. That Section 2.02 is amended by deletion of the language therein and substituting the following therefore:

MOBILE HOME: A structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a chasis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without permanent foundation, when connected to the required utilities, and includes plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems contained in the structure. Mobile home does not include a recreational vehicle.

Section 5. That Section 2.02 is amended by adding the following definition thereto:

RECREATIONAL VEHICLE: A vehicle primarily designed and used as a emporary living quarters for recreational, camping or travel purposes, including a vehicle having its own motor power or a vehicle mounted on or drawn by another

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its publication.

Legislative Update

CAPITOL DAMAGED - The Capitol Building's glass floor, the brass railing circling the rotunds, second and third floor balconies overlooking the rotunda, woodwork throughout the Capitol and the portrait of former Governor Kim Sigler all sustained damage after an estimated 8,000 workers' compensation reform protesters left a rally co-sponsored by the UAW and the AFL-CIO. It will cost \$5,000 alone to repair the painting that was ripped, but the brass railing cannot be repaired, nor can the famous glass-tiled floor.

MANDATORY RETIREMENT BAN Legislation prohibiting mandatory retirement at any age has passed the Michigan Senate and now goes before the House for further action. If passed, workers would be allowed to stay on the job as long as they wish, providing they are still able and fit.

WHAT MIGRATION? - A study conducted by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments negates previously held beliefs that residents of Southeastern Michigan moving away, end up in the Sun Belt. The SEMCOG study shows that they end up in, of all places, Michigan! The study also indicated that while hard times have hit that corner of the state, not that many people are leaving the area. Of those who did, 30.6 percent moved to other

mmunities in Michigan, 12.6 percent left for Florida and only 4.5 percent of those moving from Southeastern Michigan packed their bags for Texas.

GROUND PORK STANDARDS SET -Michigan has become the first state in the nation to enact a law that provides that ground pork shall contain not more than 25 percent fat. The landmark law is expected to give Michigan pork production a boost, since we now have the strictest pork standards in the country.

HOUSE DEALS WITH WELFARE -The House Committee on Social Services will complete work soon on the overhaul of the General Assistance program within the Department of Social Services. Expected are tighter rules governing eligibility, including the elimination of non-U.S. citizens and those people who have lived in Michigan less than six months. Currently, there are 110,000 GA recipients in Michigan receiving a total of 1200 million

each year. ENERGY EFFORT BEGUN - The Michigan Department of Commerce's Energy Administration has unveiled a new Energy Technology Development program and will spend \$200,000 for projects which have the potential for commercial scale production. Individuals, non-profit organizations, state and local government agencies and small businesses may apply for the funding until January 30, 1982. 

Portable Kerosene heaters can be efficient units for providing temporary heat in chilled, well ventilated areas. But they should not be used as a substitute for conventional heating systems for several hours at a time, particularly in weathertightened homes. Used improperly, kerosene heaters can turn into killers, primarily because of carbon monoxide

Although the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) denied a petition to ban these heaters as unsafe, they have been banned by 11 states (not including Michigan) for residential use. While these units are not banned

Depending on the type of fuel used, the operating condition of the heater and the area in which it is used, carbon monoxide may reach toxic levels in minutes or over

Early symptoms of poisoning include dizziness, headache and nausea. Lifesustaining oxygen is replaced by carbon monoxide to the extent that suffocation

There is a potential hazard with the type of fuel used. The quality of American fuel differs significantly from fuel quality in other countries where these heaters are popular. For instance, Japanese kerosene used in unvented heaters has a sulfur content below .01 percent. American standards allow five times more suiter, and 10 times or more is not unusual.

High-quality (clear white) kerosene purchased from a bulk distributor will cost about \$1.35 a gallon. Based on this price, it costs about \$1 per 100,000 BTUs of heat. The cost of running a kerosene heater will be higher, however, if kerosene is purchased from a hardware store, which may charge as much as \$4.50 a gallon. Never substitute fuel oils, diesel, any type of gasoline, or yellow (regular) kerosene. high-quality (clear white) kerosene.



Shared Academic Resources Study To Begin At Schools

The Manchester Community Schools along with other consortium school districts have begun a study of the potential for sharing academic resources with other districts. The members of the consortium are the Chelsea, Dexter, Milan, Saline and Manchester school districts.

A committee with two members representing each school district will be appointed to study the problems of high school management and curriculum development on a shared basis. The task is to assess the impact of declining financial resources and declining pupil populations on the ability of the school districts to deliver high quality academic programs.

The charge to the committee by the five superintendents is to recommend alternative delivery systems for academic programs. It is expected that the recommendations will include overall feasibility, program impact, cost efficiency, timelines, and mitigated costs accuring to each of the five school districts.

New Tax Law Expands Retirement **Benefits**

Expanded eligibility for Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) plans and increased ceilings for Keogh plans are among a number of tax changes affecting retirement savings beginning in 1982, the Internal Revenue said.

For the first time, workers who are already covered by company pension plans may qualify to set up an IRA or to make voluntary tax-free contributions to the company plan. Under the old law only noncovered taxpayers qualified.

An IRA is a savings program that allows participants to set aside money for their retirement. Contributions to an IRA are tax deductible and the earnings accrued are not taxed until they are distributed, generally upon retirement when income is

The new law has also doubled to \$15,000 Schedule the deduction for yearly contributions to a Keogh plan. Under a Keogh plan, selfemployed persons such as doctors, architects, farmers and the like, can set aside money for their retirement. Contributions to it are tax deductible and savings accrued by the plan are exempt from tax until they are distributed, generally upon retirement.

Under the old law, self-employed taxpayers could deduct 15 percent of their earned income to a maximum of \$7,500. Now they can deduct 15 percent of their earned income to a maximum of \$15,000. Special rules apply if income in excess of \$100,000 is used to determine the

In addition, the new law allows a penalty-free correction of an excess contribution to a Keogh plan if the excess is withdrawn before the return-filing due date. Previously, such a grace period was available only to IRA contributors.





* Push-ups for arms and shoulders. * Sit-ups and side jumps for the waist and

Leg lunges and squats for buttocks. Toe lifts for calves and ankles.

Squats and side jumps for thighs. "Warm-up exercises are essential to relax muscles which naturally tense in cold weather," explained Zeiler. "Tensed muscles mean greater risk of injury, especially during the first few minutes of activity, and a lowered level of skill.

Experts recommend a few minutes of mild, large-muscle activities gradually increasing in intensity before strenuous workouts. Muscle stretching also will help increase limberness and flexibility. Stretches should be part of both warm-ups and cool-downs after sports activities





It's Flu Season -Should You Be Vaccinated?

Do you need a flu shot? It's flu season again, and people at "high risk" should check with their doctors or local health department about a vaccine against influenza. Dr. Paul Kvale, a member of the American Lung Association of Michigan's State Board and president of the Michigan Thoracic Society (American Lung Association of Michigan's medical advisory group), says that vaccination against the

flu is a strongly recommended annual preventive measure for the elderly and persons with chronic heart, lung or kidney

"These people stand an increased change of complications following an attack of the flu because they are much more susceptible to bacterial pneumonia or other fatal secondary infections. The Christmas Seal people hope that they will protect themselves through vaccination." Dr. Kvale explained. The vaccine is 70 to 90% effective, but not enough people in the high risk category take advantage of it.

The vaccination is effective for about a year. This fact, plus the annual a pearance of different strains of influenza virus, mean that people need revaccination every year. If you get a flu shot, make sure it's the new 1981-82 serum.

Influenza, or flu, can range from a mild upper respiratory infection to severe pneumonia and death. The disease strikes a large portion of the population every year, even without the presence of an epidemic. Its incidence is highest in the five to nine and 25 to 35 age groups. But people in what Dr. Kvale called the "high risk group" are often so weakened by the flu that other infections can easily attack. The most common complication is bacterial pneumonia, a disease that kills thousands each year. Viral pneumonia, encephalitis. kidney failure, and other serious diseases

Anyone who contacts influenza is urged to keep away from infants, the elderly and the sick. If the symptoms persist or return after a week or so of rest and proper treatment, patients are advised to get in touch with their doctors.


