It's not surprising that almost everyone knows someone with these conditions because the diseases affect about one in seven persons. Overall, more females than males are affected and the chance of occurrence increases in each decade of life. Over age 65, about 45 percent of women and 20 percent of men suffer from arthritis and rheumatism, compared with 22.5 about 286,000 people suffer from percent of all persons in the 45-to-65 age rheumatoid arthritis. About 704.000 suffer from osteoarthritis, the "wear and tear" type of arthritis. This kind is related to age, and is quite common. Almost everyone over the age of 60 years shows some X-ray evidence of osteoarthritis; and although the cause is unknown, it appears to be related to repeated injury or the persistence of other pre-existing rheumatic diseases. Sometimes treatment and physical therapy and even surgery - can relieve the


symptoms of this disease. Although definitive cures are not available at this time, mobility can be maintained through corrective exercises under professional supervision, thereby reducing deformities, crippling, and disability that might otherwise occur. The treatment of arthritis and rheumatism requires teamwork among patient, physician, and physical therapists.

There are a number of certified

rheumatologists and arthritis specialists in Michigan, and referral centers at three of the state's teaching hospitals.

Arthritis and rheumatism victims must be aware of quack medicine, promising cures that don't exist. You can minimize permanent damage by being prepared to deal with flare-ups of these diseases and the ways to protect the joints from injury, but still the pain cannot always be avoided. There will be days when you can only hear

The board's adoption of a new zoning ordinance in September prompted BAC's

reappointment of Roger Hardenbergh to the township Planning Commission. The recall petitions say Hardenbergh has violated the state's Open Meetings Act.

The petitions also charge the four board members "refused to listen to the requests of the public made at township meetings and through correspondence."







## **Planning Commission**

The Regular Meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was called to order at 7:32 p.m. by Chairman Hinkley.

Members present: Hinkley, Kallewaard,

Commission members expressed general Alber, Grossman, Tracy, Walton and Leeson. Members absent: Smith and Krauss. A quorum was present.

The minutes of the Regular Meeting a motion by Leeson, seconded by

Mrs. Sue Hamilton was present to request the Commission's approval of a sign to be placed at the business office of Manchester Travel, 154 East Main Street. She submitted a sign permit application and a check for the permit fee. She presented an artist's drawing of the proposed sign, and stated that it would be 6'8" x 3' in size, constructed entirely of wood, painted in two colors, and would not be lighted. In discussion, the Commission noted that the sign as presented meets the requirements of Article 53 of the Village Zoning Ordinance, pertaining to signs in commercial districts. A motion was made by Tracy, seconded by Walton, that the

Mr. Howard Parr was present, representing the Manchester Historical Society, to advise the Commission of the potential purchase of the former Schneider blacksmith shop by the Historical Society. In his presentation he stated that the building would be used as Historical Society headquarters, a site for meetings. and also for storage and display of historical materials that could safely and appropriately be housed in the building. He noted that the forge has been restored and is fully operable, and the ability to use the entire building including the forge is an integral part of the Society's plans for the building. He also stated that, should the Society purchase the building, a request would probably be made to Village Council to authorise use of parking spaces on Village property, for people attending Historical Society events. In order to facilitate this parking at the far end of the property, the Society would build a stairway up to the former railroad trackbed.

Mr. Parr answered numerous questions from Commission members, stating that the Society anticipated possible use of the building by as many as 60 people inside plus 60 or more outside at special events; that the Society has been asked to investigate using the forge for demonstrations and for instruction in blacksmithing; that the Society has until December 31, 1981 to act on the purchase; that if purchased, the Society would apply for removal of the property from the tax roll as a non-profit educational

In regard to the proposed Industrial Park, Hinkley reported that Village Manager Zsenyuk, Tom Fegan of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission and a representative of the State Department of Commerce were to meet 12-16-81 to discuss application for a grant to initiate development of an


