

nearly a quarter ton of baggage which was for our personal needs and for the school nàries' children at Tambo. We had seep the need for extra helpors when we made a month's visit here five years ago. Tambo is a school for American children in grades one through twelve whose parents are doing missionary work in areas where there are no schools. It is a part of New Tribes Mission whose adquarters is in Sanford, Florida and has works in many countries around the world. The main emphasis is to reach NEW tribes who have never been evangelized by other evangelical missions.

We flew via Miami over the West Indies which were beentiful in the night when lights of cities were visible. We had a brief layover at Caracas, Venezuela, flew over Brazil and landed at Santa Cruz, Bolivia about 6:80 a.m. on December 8th.

Our first day was spent at the Mission Guest Home which is operated for the convenience of anyone coming or going. Then, after some business and legal papers were taken care of, we made a 6 hour trip, covering 130 miles of mountain roads by an old VW micro, arriving at the school just as the supper bell rang. We were greeted warmly by old friends and several new folk. How wonderful to be among our relatives again-sister Mabel Hurst, nephew Cameron with Mary and their 7

We were there in time to enjoy the Christmas season-programs, caroling and all, done in the ways of which we are familiar except that instead of snow and sleigh belis we were in the midst of sun, flowers in full bloom and birdsongs,

However the TRUE purpose and message of Christmas, honoring the birth of our Lord Jesus is the same around the world. Here at Tambo there are about 100 persons, staff and students, all living in fellowship and enjoying the same conveniences that we were more or less accustomed to, and accepting the few undestrable situations, the result of being in a country somewhat below the standard lifestyle of most Americans. We are also involved in Spanish classes daily.

Vacation began on December 17 and all the children were transported by bus, truck or plane to be with their parents for three weeks. Many of the Staff also went to the city for shopping, doctor, or dentist. Santa Cruz is 180 miles S.E. and Cochabamba, 170 miles N.W. We went to Cochahamba to be with Cameron and Mary who had been there for intensive language study, the Indian tongue "Quechua". There we had many contacts with the Bolivian people as we attended their Christman program, church services, ate in their homes and observed their customs. We looked with awe on their way of life, all levels of civilization from the poor country people selling their produce on the streets and in stalls in the open markets, to the fine homes and modern conveniences of the more well-to-do. Since our understanding of Spanish is very limited, we could only nod or smile, but the Bolivians were very gracious to us and with our interpreters being Mabel and Cam, we found pleasure in being with these folks.

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



The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clark who shall transfer such veter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Villago has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clork to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it simil not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect therete in order to be eligible to vote.

Singles may solve the problem of having enough boxes to go around by pairing up in advance - one to provide and one to buy - so everyone can participate.

One gets an auction buying number when couple enters the hall and turns in their box. To be real secretive, the Snack Box is enclosed in a paper sack until time for display and auctioning!

### IRS Encourages— Do Your Own Returns

Taxpayers who plan on filling in their own 1040A federal income tax returns this year may discover it's not as difficult as they thought, the Internal Revenue

The 1040A return is a two-page form which contains 18 lines on the first pare. and comes with step-by-step instructions on how to complete it, the IRS said. On page two of the form is a section that should be completed to declare any interest and dividends amounting to more than \$400. The IRS added that any interest from qualified "All Savers" Certificates should be declared as well, regardless of

Although the 1040A form is shorter than the standard 1040 form, the IRS points out it's not for everyone. Form 1040A can only be used by taxpayers whose income consists of wages, salaries, tips, interest, dividends, and unemployment mpensation for the taxable year. Form 1040A filers must also have taxable comes of less than \$50,000, the Service

If the taxpayer is planning on itemizing deductions, claiming adjustments to income tax, or taking advantage of most


By letting taxpayers declare interest and dividends on their 1040A forms, the IRS said more people will now be able to take advantage of the shorter format. Also, the IRS explained, taxpayers using Form 1040A can claim Earned Income Credit and Credit for Contributions to Candidates for

The IRS has over 90 free publications available to taxpayers on various tax matters. Taxpayers desiring further nformation on the 1040A form or any other tax subject should contact the IRS.

This enlightenment comes from the D.C. and psychologists say these peculiar to northern climates and are prevalent when it snows and the winds blow and the mercury falls below the zero mark. They call it "cabin fever".

Dr. Vitosky of the Institute of Psychiatry at Northwestern University said, "some people forced to stay indoors alone or nearly so, become upset and try to escape by using drugs or alcohol."

"When people have a hard time getting out they become depressed", said Dr. Vitosky. "Depressive personalities can become suicidal" he continues.

Doctors tell of treating patients with these problems and they advise to talk Patients with these problems are being or the symptoms of "Cabin Fever". asked to visit with close neighbors or talk with them on the phone.
