IRS Encourages— Do Your Own Returns

Taxpayers who plan on filling in their own 1040A federal income tax returns this year may discover it's not as difficult as they thought, the Internal Revenue

The 1040A return is a two-page form which contains 18 lines on the first pare. and comes with step-by-step instructions on how to complete it, the IRS said. On page two of the form is a section that should be completed to declare any interest and dividends amounting to more than \$400. The IRS added that any interest from qualified "All Savers" Certificates should be declared as well, regardless of

Although the 1040A form is shorter than the standard 1040 form, the IRS points out it's not for everyone. Form 1040A can only be used by taxpayers whose income consists of wages, salaries, tips, interest, dividends, and unemployment mpensation for the taxable year. Form 1040A filers must also have taxable comes of less than \$50,000, the Service

If the taxpayer is planning on itemizing deductions, claiming adjustments to income tax, or taking advantage of most


By letting taxpayers declare interest and dividends on their 1040A forms, the IRS said more people will now be able to take advantage of the shorter format. Also, the IRS explained, taxpayers using Form 1040A can claim Earned Income Credit and Credit for Contributions to Candidates for

"When people have a hard time getting out they become depressed", said Dr. Vitosky. "Depressive personalities can become suicidal" he continues.

Doctors tell of treating patients with these problems and they advise to talk Patients with these problems are being or the symptoms of "Cabin Fever". asked to visit with close neighbors or talk with them on the phone.

"Cabin fever is usually a temporary problem with the young folk", says Dr. endemic among older people who feel to noon on Saturday.

I'm very glad to see that taxpayers in Bridgewater are finally taking an interest in what's going on in that township by expressing their opinions to the Editor. I only wish they would do some research before they are so quick to condemn BAC's motives. Members of BAC and their attorneys have been involved with what has been happening in Bridgewater Township for the past 11/2 years, It's true brought to the Boards attention by means of petition, but it is definitely not the reason for the re-call and the township board knows it. BAC wanted the taxpayers of Bridgewater (if they lived here I year or 100) to decide if they wanted this minimum lot size requirement by means of a PUBLIC vote. After accepting the petition and saying they would hold a public vote, the Board has now reneged and refuses us our Constitutional Rights. What are they afraid of? The Board and the Planning Commission have seen fit to formulate and pass an Ordinance that could open Bridgewater to development. The Chairman of the Planning Commission refuses to consider any public opinion unless its the same as his own. He even saw fit to hold a questionable election of officers while his term was expired and new people were applying for positions on

that commission. The Board also saw fit to use our tax dellars and hire Washtenaw County to come out here and help them draft this new ordinance and new soning maps. BAC's main objective has always been to keep Bridgewater Township as agricultural and rural for as long as possible. All they want is to keep the New Ordinance in line with the Old Ordinance by leaving the definition of Rural Residential the way it was in the Old Ordinance and by deleting entirely the definition for an A-2 soning district, which is defined as being strictly temporary agriculture. We are the only township in this area with an A-2 definition in our ordinance. Ask yourselves why.

I personally agree with Mr. Glen DeClair's opinion that the Board should consider a 30-40 acre minimum. It would be far better than 10 acres. The only reason 10 acres was used is because it stuck with the guide lines of the Plat Land Law. That law allows 10 acre splits and it is the law under which the Kies Rd. area was split. Also Sharon and Freedom Township have 10 acre minimums and BAC felt we could form some kind of an aliance. If people would open their eyes, they could see that there has been a great deal of development in Bridgewater in the past 4 years besides the Kies Rd. area. It won't take long for small parcels of land to out number the

Come on neighbors, be fair. Get the facts before you start condemning. Don't just listen to gossip and hearsay. Listen to both sides of the issue. Be fair enough to listen to the people who have only lived here for a short time also. Just because the Board members have lived here most of their lives does not mean they are always right in the decisions they make. The new residents may have good reason for their opinions. They may have been run out of places because of re-soning and high taxes. and don't want the same to happen again. Let's stop drawing that line between the new comers and the old timers. Pet Care

Old man winter is with us and aren't you glad you got the summer gear stowed away and the cars and pets winterized? What? You forgot to winterize your pet-well, take some notes as there is still time advises the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association. First, get out the comb and brush, or call the groomer, and take care of your pet's coat. Those mats, tangles and dead hairs drastically reduce the insulating ability of the haircoat and if not removed, will have a chilling effect. Call your veterinarian and have your pet checked for worms. Dogs and cats are most likely to get infected during the warm months and if untreated, may severely stress your pet during the long cold winter. This is also a good time to make sure all vaccinations are current as the stress of winter may lower your pet's

Open Meeting Act

The Open Mostings Act, 1976 PA 267; MCLA 15.261 at seq, requires all meetings of a public body to be open.

A public body is one exercising governmental or proprietary functions and includes boards and committees but does not include the workers' compensation appeal board, employment security appeals board, teachers' tenure commission, an arbitration panel of the employment relations commission, or a medical malpractice arbitration panel. Every person may attend a public meeting and may address the meeting pursuant to rules of the body.

Exceptions to the requirement that meetings of public bodies be epen are partisan caucuses of the state legislature and meetings to discuss: (1) dismissal or discipline of a public officer or employee or a student when the person involved requests; (2) collective bargaining; (3) purchase or lease of realty; (4) legal strategy with an attorney; (5) review of applications for employment or appointment when the applicant so requests (however, interviews for employment or appointment must be held at an open meeting); (6) material exempt from public disclosure.

Minutes must be kept and minutes of open meetings must be available for public inspection. Proposed minutes must be available within eight business days after a meeting. approved minutes must be available five days after approval.

In addition to the posting of notices of meetings a public body must mail notices to person who request such notices on an annual basis upon payment of a reasonable cost. Media are entitled to mailed notices without charge.

If the act is violated, the Attorney General, prosecuting attorneys or any other person may sue to challenge the validity of the action within 60 days after the minutes are made available. For certain business transactions, the suit must be filed within 30 days. A suit may also be brought to enjoin violation of the Act. In addition, a civil or criminal action may be brought against an official who violates the Act. Where a civil action is brought and the plantiff prevails, actual attorney fees and court costs may be requested.






