The law, to go into effect April 1 of this year, requires all infants under four years of age to be protected when riding in

Two ways-with child restraints or with seat belts.

The new law requires all infants under four to be placed in infant restraints when carried in front seats. Children between one and four in the back seat may be put in seat belts, but children under one must always be held in a restraint device whether carried in the front or back seat.

In 1980, 26 children under four were killed and 3,331 injured in Michigan highway accidents. The new law is expected to substantially reduce these deaths and injuries.

Giving blood to help a neighbor, or oftentimes unexpectedly to a member of your own family is not a new experience in Manchester This area has been affiliated with the Red Cross Blood Program since its inception in Washtonew County in March 1951.

There are still many people in the area however who don't really understand a Bloodmobile's function. It means free blood at all hospitals in the Southeastern Michigan five county area and also most parts of the United States for accident and surgery victims. When one is due to have surgery, indicating that blood is needed, the Red Cross is notified and the blood is there and ready at the right time. Regular Bloodmobiles throughout the area usually keep this supply in proper control. If however there is a short supply for a certain type, extra requests are sent out by TV, newspapers and phone calls to known donors to be sure the right kind of blood is on hand for the surgery. When you give blood you help keep this process flowing smoothly. For this reason the March 29th

Bloodmobile is urged to collect 200 to 250 pints of blood or more to meet the regular schedule. If you have never donated blood before you may just want to come by and see what goes on. You are welcome.

In this by refusing an election, they have clearly denied our rights under the first Amendment of the Constitution of the United States which states that we "may petition the government for a redress of grievances". Is this how a Board who claims to be interested in public inpu

Regardless of how you as an individual may feel about the 3 proposals the Board has refused to place on the hallot, it should be obvious that the Board by their actions. are more concerned with their own ideas about the future development of Bridgewater, then the concerns and input of the people they supposedly represent. Even if you are against the 3 proposals. you should vote in favor of the re-call in order to obtain township representation concerned with and unafraid of the Democratic process.

The communications on zoning have occeeded through two channels, the Planning Commission and the Township Board. The actions and re-actions of the public have once again been overlooked. The taxpayer has brought their views to the Board only to have the Board turn a deaf ear and pacify the public by saying one thing and doing another. Because of their recent actions, I feel that the Township Board is keenly interested in a development plan which will eventually result in a high density population. realize that each position has its pros and cons. The taxpayers in Bridgewater have tried to deal with the Board in an open and honest manner in order to resolve the issues, using the Democratic process.





### Life After Life



On Sunday. March 21, 1982, at 7:30 p.m., Dr. Thomas P. Neilsen of Ann Arbor, will speak on the subject "Life After Life". His lecture will examine the extradorinary phenomenon of survival of life after bodily death: Dr. Neilsen will use material from books by Dr. Raymond Moody Jr.; 'Life After Life' and 'Reflections On Life After Life'. In addition, he will also use the Holy Scriptures, so one may obtain both the secular and religious points of view. This lecture will be held at Rebekah Hall at 1194 M5Z (directly across from Village Chrysler-Plymouth). It is free to the public.

Dr. Moody remarks in his Reflections on Life After Life', "with respect to more recent times, it is noteworthy that members of the Church of Joseph Christ of Letter Day Saints (Mormons) have been aware of accounts of near death experiences for many years..." (pg. 76). Such accounts have been written from the time of Tolstoy to the time that

Ernest Hemingway laid pen to paper.

Dr. Neilsen has had a distinguished career as an educator and humanitarian. He received his B.A. Degree from Brigham Young University in History and Asian Studies. He received a Ph. 





constitution and tax laws require assessments to keep pace with "actual cash value" of property.

2.- The size of a building lot does affect taxes. When initially split, 10 acre parcels are treated and assessed as farms. This causes both the residential user and the farmer to pay more taxes as 10 acre parcels are sold at increased prices. 2 acre lots are not treated as farms and do not have the same effect on assessments.

3. Taxes have gone up in nearby townships which have in force the 10 acre building lot minimum. The increases there have been comparable if not greater than those in Bridgewater.

4. The size of lots when stated in acres (as opposed to 66 x 132 foot lot size, for example) does not force construction of sewers. Normally septic tanks and wells are very acceptable on two acre lots which

5. Bridgewater is protected from its expanding neighbors by its new sewer ordinance adopted on September 20, 1981.
Article 3, Sec. 3.14 states: "It is the intent of Bridgewater Township to remain rural and agricultural in character. For that reason no extensions of Public water or sewer shall be permitted INTO (emphasis supplied) Bridgewater Township without annexation."

This provision is intended to meet the problem of urban sprawl from a neighboring township or village. Normally it does because the area involved does not want to lose tax base, population or its own identity. The ordinance doesn't say Bridgewater would annex to Clinton; it says exactly the opposite if sewer and water are involved.

6. It is difficult to see how the Board encouraged development by adopting a new zoning ordinance. The language in the ordinance is accompanied by a zoning map.

old map (with existing areas identified on it) was kept under the new ordinance. No development areas were provided; no other areas were changed to move toward development of residential property. We still believe development is going to take place in Bridgewater (with or without the support of our opposition) but will be spread out in small parcels which will leave

more land for farming. This is the key to staying rural. In summary, the lot size argument, the sewer argument and the zoning ordinance argument all fail to meet the test of logic as far as increased taxes are concerned.

That leaves personalities and personal pinion to be discussed. I don't want to get involved in the personality problem referred to regarding planning commission appointees. I was not intimidated into making appointments. I voted to retain an incumbent who could continue to bring the benefit of his

experience to the Commission. No township board, school board or city council can ever do everything every citizen may ask of it. We deel with what is good for the greatest number of people, with due consideration for the rights of minority groups. I believe we have done that for Bridgewater. Most of the present board members have lived here all our lives and may even be third and fourth generation Bridgewaterites. If failing to do what one vocal group demanded of us constitutes cause for recall, then we need to know that.


