





"Say Yee To Michigan!" - Thermofil, Inc. of Laurens, S.C., is moving back to Michigan to relocate its plastic resins operation, because of our "superior work force." Livingston County is the site for

"Stay! Yes To Michigan" - Steelcase, Inc. is spending \$53 million to expand its Grand Rapids base of operation. The new plant will initially create 500 new jobs for Kent

"Sagen Sie Yah Zum Michigan! KUKA Robbi Corp. of West Germany is opening its first American facility in Macomb County. The addition of KUKA to Michigan means that our state has quickly become a leader in automated systems production, as well as robotics manufacturing.

Big Mac - Over 2,000.000 Served Annually - What's five miles long, weighs 66,500 tons and cost \$100 million to build twenty-five years ago? Why, it is the Mackinac Bridge and it's almost paid for. The Mackinac Bridge Authority has paid for all but \$25 million of its construction and maintenance debt. It should own the bridge outright by 1987, seven years ahead of schedule. And Watch Out What You Food Thom The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is recalling all lots of "SMA" infant formula. The FDA beleves the products may lack vitamin B-6. Without vitamin B-6, infants suffer serious health problems, cluding convulsions, so this is an important warning. The recall includes 32-ounce cans of SMA Ready-to-Feed. 13-ounce cans of SMA concentrate, and one-pound cans of SMA powder. The lots involved have code numbers from A25M through A31M or B1M through B15M. which appear on the top of the cans. If you have some of these on your shelf, return them to the store where you purchased

Flood Aid Request - Now that Michigan's worst winter in recent memory is over, new troubles have begun - the worst flooding in recent memory. Governor Milliken has asked President Reagan for emergency federal relief. If approved by Washington, hard-hit victims in Bay. LATE SPRING RUNS SHOULDN'T HINDER STEELHEADING IN STATE

Michigan's spring steelhead fishing season may peak later than usual because of this winter's heavy snows, but the excellent runs expected should be worth the extra 7 - to 10-day wait, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Anglers should watch for peak runs in early to mid-April in West Michigan, mid-April to mid-May in East Michigan, late April through mid-May in Southeast Michigan and in mid-May across the Upper

"The snowmelt which helps trigger the steelhead's spawning urge could be later in parts of northern Lower and Upper Michigan because of the heavy snowfall," stated James Drury, Auto Club Travel Operations manager. "The melting snow would keep rivers cold, meaning a longerthan-usual period of stream temperatures below the optimum 40- to 45-degree range needed for spawning activity and best

Some 300,000 six- to 15-pound silvery fighters planted as 6- to 10- inchers in 1979 and 1980 will enter the 36 streams listed on Auto Club's Spring Steelhead Guide. There also should be a good run of immature 'skippers" weighing 2 to 4 pounds.

"Best West Michigan fishing should be on the St. Joseph River up to Buchanan and the Grand River system," Drury said "Both streams have received heavy plantings and the Grand will have runs nearly within sight of the state Capitol because of new fish ladders between Grand Rapids and Lansing's Moore's Park Dam." Other productive spots along the western shore include the Muskegon and

Manistee rivers. Lake Huron standouts should include the Ocqueoc River near Huron Beach, the Au Gres River's East Branch, and the Au Sable near Oscoda, which should peak in late April or as late as mid-May because colder water released from upstream dams will delay runs.

Pier fishermen should find good results at the Pigeon River's mouth at Caseville in the Thumb

In Southeast Michigan, best steelheading should be on the St. Clair River for trollers and on the Huron River for shore and

wading fishermen. Upper Peninsula anglers should find peak action at Thompson Creek's mouth and on the Big Cedar along Lake Michigan, the Ontonagon, Little Gariic and Two

Auto Club advises steelheaders to check specific rules for individual rivers in the DNR's Michigan Fishing Guide. Some rivers are open year-around while others open April 1 or April 24, the start of general trout season. The guide is free to anglers purchasing license passbooks.





Mortgage Money Available

New mortgage money is available for many Michigan renters who want to buy or build their first home, the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) has announced.

MSHDA recently sold \$25 million bonds to private investors to reopen it : single family home mortgage program, according to Richard K. Helmbrecht, executive director.

The MSHDA loans are for new homes or builders' models that have not been previously occupied. For the first time, certain condominiums and manufactured houses also will be eligible for MSHDA mortgages.

Helmbrecht said the program offers mortgages of up to \$60,000 at a fixed interest rate of 14.25 percent on homes costing no more than \$69.750. The borrower's annual household income must be under \$31,748, although up to \$4,000 in overtime earnings can be excluded from the total. Federal rules require that in most instances the borrower must not have owned a home in the last three years.

The new loans, called Equity-Builder mortgages, are structured in a novel way. Payments are lower than a conventional loan in the first three years and higher by 3 percent annually - in later years when the buyer's income is likely to be higher. Because the interest rate stays the same. the increase in monthly payments goes entirely to reduce the principal of the loan, thus paying it off in 17 years and saving the homeowner thousands of dollars in

For example, Helmbrecht said, interest payments on a \$45,000 Equity-Builder loan would be approximately \$66,000 less than on a 30-year mortgage at the same interest

Because Equity-Builder payments are significantly reduced in the first year. buyers can qualify with a lower income than would be required for a standard loan,

MSHDA was established by the state egislature to address the housing needs of Michigan's low and moderate income citizens. Since 1971, it has financed more than 10,250 single family homes, as well as thousands of rental units and home mprovement loans.

To make one gallon of maple syrup, about 40 to 50 gallons of sap must be collected. Holes are drilled into a tree and a 'spile', allowing the sap to flow into a Each tap will yield 15 to 20 gallens of sap during a season, depending on the size of the tree. "Good Old Davs"

When the Manchester Area Historical Society took a look at the "Good Old Days" at their monthly meeting on March 14, the question proved to be not so much whether there had been better days as when those halcyon days really were. With 38 persons. (fourteen men and twenty-four women), ranging in age from 19 to 85, casting their ballots, only four (all women) were unequivocal in preferring the 1980's, although another five (3 women and 2 men), while disavowing any preference for an earlier period, admitted to a wistfulness for certain aspects of an earlier day.

Five (3 men and 2 women) looked back only ten to twenty years to the 1960's and 70's to find better days - when inflation seemed temporary and the "future looked

Reasons given by 9 voters (5 men and 4 women) for looking with longing at the 1940's and 50's were: prosperity, less government and a "unity of national purpose" during World War II. Three of the number (2 men and one woman) all in their early sixties identified the good old days with a period in their own lives when their families were growing up.

Two men chose the 1930's: one relishing happy days on the farm and the other noting that the period had been characterized by less violence. greater personal ambition, and cooperation between management and labor.

The single decade of the 1920's received 6 votes, from two men and four women. Three mentioned the fact (or necessity) of greater family closeness as an important factor in their choice. Another felt the 20's to have been a time of progress and exciting change, and another found a challenge in the hard work and responsibilities of that period. Two women

offered no explanation for their choice. Two (one man and one woman) chose the decade of WWI but only one gave a reason: it was a time of predominantly rural and uncomplicated society. Another pair chose the period 1900-10, the woman noting that life was simpler and it was "before WWI". mid-fifties) saw the "Gay Nineties" as a bring a friend.

simpler, pleasanter time, particularly if one had "a lot of (domestic) help."

Looking further back in the previous century each of five women found a longed for period. The ones choosing the 1850's and 1870's gave no reasons for their selections. The youngest respondent, a girl of 19, chose the 1860's because it seemed to her a time when both school and family life was freer of problems and also she admired the "long pretty dresses they wore" then. The woman choosing the 1880's cited family closeness and the fact that it was "a period between wars" as reasons for her

Finally, one woman would like to have experienced the many good things happening" throughout the country's whole history from 1776 to 1876, but admits "life must be easier today".

One voter added an obvious but important observation to his ballot: "The good old days are better because it is human nature to remember the pleasant more than the unpleasant."

Thirteen (7 men and 6 women) of those voting were born in the Manchester area with six of that number claiming ancestors who settled here before 1900. Another five were brought here as children by their parents. But almost half (18) of those attending had moved into the area since
