Wildlife rabies is increasing and along with it is an increasing risk to people and their pets, according to the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association. Last summer as young girl in Dearborn, Michigan, was bitten by her own dog. The dog was confirmed as having rabies and the girl was successfully treated. A Tucson, Arizona, man was less fortunate. The same summer he was bitten by his dog, but testing for rabies on the dog's brain was negative. The man did not undergo treatment. Subsequently, he developed signs of rabies and died.

The Center for Disease Control in Atlanta reports the incidence of confirmed rabies has increased from 3,298 in 1978 to over 7,000 in 1981.

Last year rabies was more common in cats than in dogs. Part of the problem is that most areas do not require cats to be vaccinated. The most common source of exposure is the growing skunk population. Other high risk wild animals are foxes, bats, and raccoons.

What happens if your dog or cat is bitten by a confirmed rabid animal? If your pet isn't currently vaccinated against rabies, you can choose between a six-months locked-enclosure quarantine or humane euthanasia. If your pet is currently vaccinated against rabies, a three-months Hoover Universal Inc. of Manchester. quarantine is required. Your pet will be vaccinated at the beginning and the end of Hospital Week

-You can protect yourself and your pets by: (1) keeping your pet's vaccinations current. (2) avoiding wild animal contact by not letting your pet run free, (3) avoiding skunks, raccoons, bats, and foxesthese are not recommended pets, and (4) continuing. knowing that rabies vaccination is available to people but is generally only given to people who are at high risk.

Volunteers from the Unit will once again take part in this nation-wide program in memory of the citizen soldiers who gave their lives in the cause of freedom.





CENTER FOR ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SCIENCES

There is one subject that arouses interest in all segments of society and in almost all ages. That's toxic substances and how they may possibly harm our health. For much of the country, you can date this interest from the New York State problem of "Love Canal." For Michigan, the intensified interest dates most generally from 1974 and the PBB episode.

Regardless of what it may have taken to spark public concern, the interest is there. In response to that interest, and to make sure there is some one place to which the public can turn when they perceive something may be wrong with their environment, our department has created a new unit within it that we hope will be an answer to this need. We call it the Center for Environmental Health Sciences.

We wanted to create a place that would be highly visible where you, the public, and local governments could go with your environmental health hazard concerns. If for some reason you are worried about possible contamination of the water or air around you, we encourage you to bring that concern to our CEHS, We guarantee you'll get a hearing. If we are not the proper people to help with your problem, we'll help you get to the people who can

One of the most important functions of the CEHS will be to coordinate among key environmental activities in the state, not just those within our own department, but those of the other state and federal agencies and service groups which share responsibility for public health protection through their regulation of chemicals.







During recent budget negotiations, many plans have been proposed by both Democrats and Republicans to attempt to reduce the federal deficit projected for the coming year. Included in some discussions Rose Festival has been talk of delaying or eliminating the 7.4 percent cost-of-living increase scheduled to be given to Social Security recipients starting in July.

It would be unfair to ask the elderly to accept reductions in benefits they have been counting on. They have contributed their hard-earned dollars to the system and the federal government now has a responsibility to provide some measure of economic security for them. It would be discompassionate of the American government to strip the elderly of money that they have been expecting, particularly without more advanced notice.

A look at some statistics helps to show how crucial the scheduled cost-of-living increase is. Ninety percent of all elderly Americans roly on Social Security benefits for all or part of their income. For million: of people the cost-of-living increase is the only means of enabling them to remain above poverty level.

The poverty rate among elderly Americans is the highest of any adult age group and is escalating dramatically. The average Social Security benefit is \$385 per month for a retired worker and \$643 per month for a retired couple. In 1980, over 50 percent of persons age 65 and older had incomes below \$5.000. And elderly spend a larger proportion of their income for food, fuel, medical expenses and utilities.





Better Speech And Hearing Month

The middle and junior high students should be well on their way to mastering the speech and language skills of the adult. The caseload of the speech and language pathologist at this school level is usually smaller than at the elementary school. This is due in part to emphasis on early diagnosis and treatment of speech and anguage problems

Some children at this level may still have persistant articulation problems (usually with s.r., and l). These children may b enrolled on a regular basis each week, or may be seen at intervals throughout the year as determined by individual need.

The child who is exhibiting signs of vocal buse is mature enough at this level to benefit from direct voice therapy. This therapy stresses proper vocal hygiene and teaches the child to take responsibility for developing correct vocal habits.

The middle school child who is non-fluent (stuttering) can be taught any one of several different methods to achieve more fluent speech. A program is selected and developed which meets the individual needs of the child.

The effects of early age hearing and/or language problems may still be evident at this time. These students will often show lags in the ability to express themselves adequately. Not only are the effects noted in listening and speaking skills, but also in reading and in written language. When necessary, the child can be taught to develop strengths which will help to

voted against the regressive tax increase five times, warned that investors were seeking a balanced budget through sound All A's - Todd Haselschwerdt, Kathryn fiscal management, rather than just another tax increase.

"I would say Moody's dropped our bond rating because we increased the taxes on the people of this state. Effectively, when we increase taxes on people, we take away job opportunities. Michigan is going to have a tougher time surviving and getting its people back to work," Welborn told his colleagues in the Senate.

Welborn said that when the Legislature changed the direction of the bill from one that would grant property tax relief to increasing the income tax from 4.6 to 5.6 percent, it violated the Michigan Constitution.

Welborn, who has consistently voted against any tax increase, also maintains the tax violates the constitutional prohibition against an ex post facto law. The measure sent to Governor Milliken on May 11 imposes the tax retroactively to

Welborn said. "Rather than pass the tax, would have cut government spending. Everyone knows there are two ways to balance the budget. One is to increase taxes. The other is to live within our means. I submit to you that the, Legislature and the Governor took the easy way out by passing the tax increase, rather than going in and making the tough, hard decision of cutting the budget," he


