For a smaller crowd, you can barbecue one or two whole pork loins on a rotisserie, and feed from 20 to 35 people. Figure about three servings per pound, and one or two six-pound boneless pork loins. Ask your butcher to remove the bones and tie the roasts. (Save the bones for spareribs.)

Insert a rotisserie rod through center of roast, and test for balance on the spit before you begin operations. It's a good idea to use a meat thermometer, which should not touch bone or rest in fat. Roast on the spit until well done (170 degrees), at a low temperature. Allow about 21/2 hours total cooking time. Baste with barbecue sauce during the last 45 minutes. If you have only one rotisserie, you can prepare one loin roast ahead and keep warm in a low oven (basting occasionally) while the

Here's my favorite barbecue sauce for pork. It was given to me back in 1968 by a friend from Alabama who used to barbecue whole hogs a couple of times a year, and it's really delicious.

Combine the following ingredients, heat and use to baste meat. Have plenty of extra in a bowl for dipping or to ladle over individual portions at the table.

One gallon apple cider vinegar, 1 pound brown sugar, 1 pint lemon juice, 12 oz. bottle Wercestershire, 1 pint prepared mustard, 1 to 2 tablespoons salt, 1 quart catsup, and Tabasco to taste (I use about 1/2 teaspoonful). Keeps well refrigerated.

Summer Health Hazards Are A **Product Of The Heat**

Along with the fun of summer and the enjoyment of the great out of doors comes the health and accident hazards that have their highest risk in hot weather, according to the Michigan State Medical Society Sun strokes and heat strokes are life-

threatening emergencies which occur from too much exposure and too much exercise in the hot sun. Prolonged excessive heat, either in or out of doors, can cause heat stroke. These emergencies are disturbances in the body's heat-regulating system and are caused by extremely high body temperatures due to exposure to heat. The body temperature can be 106 degrees or higher. The skin is red. hot and dry, and there is no sweating. The pulse is rapid and strong. The sufferer may be confused or lose consciousness.

In such cases, the victim should be draped with a wet sheet or towels to rapidly cool the skin. In certain cases the victim may be placed in a tub of cold water. The victim's skin may also be cooled by sponging it with cool water or rubbing alcohol, or by applying cold packs. The process should be continued until temperature drops to 101 or 102. Medical help should be sought immediately.

Heat exhaustion can also occur after prolonged exposure to high temperatures and high humidity, either indoors or outdoors. Body temperatures may be normal or only slightly elevated, the skin is pale and clammy and there is heavy sweating. The victim is tired, weak, dizzy and has a headache. He or she may be nauseated and have stomach cramps.

To help victims suffering from heat exhaustion, move them into shade or a cooler area. He or she should lie down so

that the feet are elevated 8 to 12 inches. Wet cloths should be placed on the forehead and body. The best preventative for this type of risk begins with two words-moderation and gradualism. Go moderately when temperatures and humidity are above normal and gradually acclimate your system to the more intense exposure that


Senate Candidate Walks 1,000 Miles





The basics include iceberg lettuce, broken into bite-size pieces, chopped onion and celery, fresh peas, and the toppings. Add chopped green pepper, sliced radishes and fresh mushrooms to your layering for variety. Include sliced carrots and cucumbers as the season progresses. If you assemble your salad in a wide shallow bowl, it's easier for each person to get a portion of the dressing along with the vegetables. Surround the rim of the bowl with cherry tomatoes, and you've added another colorful Michigan product. Sprinkle a little dill weed over your lettuce for flavor variation. In autumn, add cauliflower or broccoli bits to the bowl.

It's fun to see what combinations you find most appealing, and fun to count the

number of layers. Altogether, these products represent more than \$75 million in value to Michigan growers. I'm sorry we don't have a price breakdown on fresh peas, broccoli or bacon, but we can provide statistics on these salad items: Fresh cucumbers, valued at \$3.3 million; celery, worth \$15.7 million: cauliflower, \$2.3 million; lettuce, \$7.2 million; green peppers \$3.3 million; fresh market tomatoes, \$9.6 million: carrots, \$12.4 million; mushrooms, \$16.3

Obviously, certain infants and children should not get the vaccine those who are sick, those who have a history of convulsions, and those who have had serious reactions to previous shots. All our health clinics screen for these conditions and tell parents about risks and benefits in a fair and understandable way. And any parents may have immunization requirements for school waived for medical, religious, or other reasons.


