For example, camping in the Upper Peninsula is up 25.1% over 1981: historic Fort Mackinac on Mackinac Island reports a 61.4% increase in attendance over last year at this time, while seroes the Straits at Fort Michilimackinac at Mackinaw City reports a 41.8% increase. The U.S. Travel Data Center had predicted a 9%-11% drop in tourism this year in Michigan.

Kinross-Michigan's Newest Community The old Kincheloe Air Force Base in the Upper Peninsula's Chippewa County has become Michigan's newest community, Kinross Township. The converted base and its surroundings are home to 1,500 Michigan residents.

Death Penalty Petitions Filed-Petitions carrying over 300,000 signatures requesting a constitutional amendment allowing the death penalty for first degree Detroit, July 16-18. murder have been filed with the Secretary of State in Lansing. If the Secretary of State approves the signatures, voters will be able to vote on the issue during the General Election November 2. Michigan abolished capital punishment over 100 years ago, and previous attempts to June 28, 1962 reinstate capital punishment have failed. ther Ballot Proposale-On November 2, Michigan voters will not only elect a new Governor, U.S. Senator, State Senators. State Representatives, U.S. Congressmen and most statewide offices, but they will have a chance to vote on a number of constitutional amendments other than the death penalty question. Expected to appear on the ballot are amendments for minimum funding of the State Police, egislative immunity, the prohibition of de-on-sale clauses on mortgages, nuclear irms freeze, and the abolition of automatic stility rate increases. For the first time in

During the past several years, the number of reported cases of Herpes Simplex II has risen at an alarming rate. Recently, a significant medical breakthrough in the treatment of this disease was announced.

A new drug called Zovirax, which provides an anti-viral action, is now available. TEL-MED, a free telephone health information service available to Manchester residents, offers a tape describing the new treatment for Herpes II. Zovirax should only be used for the first outbreak of genital herpes and not for recurrent infections. Its use shortens the duration of the attack, lessens the pain and reduces the infectious period.
