Still very appropriate is the often used phrase that "One rotten apple spoils the barrel."



C.A.T. Results Received

At its regular meeting on August 16 the Manchester Board of Education received a report from the Superintendent of the results of achievement tests which were administered to all students in grades 2, 4. 6, 8, and 11 near the end of last school year. The California Achievement tests measures basic skills in reading, math, language and spelling.

Manchester students, once again, scored above grade level on all of the basic skills in each grade. The report shows that for the third year in a row Manchester students read above grade level by the time they are in the second grade and that they continue to widen the range so that by the time they are in the 8th grade the average student is reading 1.6 years above grade level. Over 50% of the 8th graders read significantly above grade level with

Dr. Thompson reported that students were showing outstanding gains from year to year. For example, students who were 6th graders in 1980 showed a gain of 2.6 years when tested two years later as 8th graders. Second graders who were tested in 1960 reported a four year gain in language skills within the same two year

Thompson expressed his great satisfaction with these data and stated that in his opinion, "we have conclusive evidence of the excellent nature of the educational program being offered in the Manchester Community Schools. Our emphasis on basic skills together with the work of coordinating the curriculum and the purchase of textboks and equipment made possible by downsizing the organization has produced significant results. Manchester students are receiving a basic skill education which is the equal of any school district in the county. Our students leave school with the skills necessary to compete."

Thompson also expressed feelings regarding cooperative efforts between the home and school. "While our teachers are doing an unquestionably excellent job in the classroom the credit for our outstanding educational program should go not only to the schools. Manchester students who apply themselves and work hard at obtaining a good education are to be greatly commended. It is obvious that the parents in our community take time to read and play math games with their children. Educational research is very clear that a good education can only be obtained when principals manage well organized, child centered buildings, teachers are dedicated and have high expectations. parents value education and work with the schools and students are serious about their efforts. We are a unique and fortunate community to have achieved all of these factors while many districts around us are struggling to continue their programs.", said Thompson.

Students were tested in the 7th month of the 5 listed grades. It should be noted that Manchester students are shove grade level at every point with 11th graders scoring at the highest possible point. misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space of signature certifying that all the information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, it should contact the school.

Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free or reduced-price meals if total family income include welfare payments, unemployment compensation and sub-pay benefits fall within the prescribed family income guidelines.

One of the chief concerns had been: what happens if an accident occurs involving a truck while it is crossing one of our major bridges, such as at Sault Ste. Marie, the Straits, Port Huron, or Detroit? The new regulations address that problem. They require that containers used to ship radioactive waste must meet rigorous testing safeguards. This fact should ease the concerns of those who had questions on what would happen if a container fell into the water from the Big Mac Bridge, for instance - questions such as: could it withstand the fall and would it remain intact in deep water? The testing

standards are an answer to those concerns. There also are other requirements shippers must meet before they can dispatch a truck through the state.

Each shipment must have prior approval from us. The application for approval must contain information on the route of travel and a travel schedule.

Evidence must be furnished that the firm's vehicles are provided with adequate communications capability.

Proof must be submitted that the transporting truck has undergone an acceptable safety inspection within the last

There must be an emergency plan which would be activated by the shipper if an accident involving the truck occurs. In addition, inspection of shipments by
