
**KLAGER ELEMENTARY OPEN HOUSE**



THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

"Ther is in oir languag, very mane leters used unnecessarily. Ther use merely makes our speling mor difficult. Many times we do wast letters and tim unnecessarily and our variabl rule of spelling make it difficult for a lerner to memorize these variables. The English languag is a fantastic jumbl of rule and exceptions that r bewildering to anyone who if from another country and who strives to lern the English language.

Writing our language might be interesting if done just the way it soundsit might eliminate a great deal of mispelling, and perhaps, at times, give a clue to the meaning of a word that we are not familiar with but is it worth all the consternation it would cause?"

Anyhow there is a committee over in Bloomfield Hills that evidently represents at least several colleges who think their efforts worthwhile and are busily engaged in trying to add to our confusion, it seems to us let's get many of our other more pressing problems out of the way first. Maybe we better go back to teaching the fundamental three R's in our high and middle schools, the ones we used to hear so much about but which we don't seem to nowadays.

There are surely many more things wrong with our country besides our archaic spelling. For example may be quote a chap who the other day said that there were too many Democratic Congressmen and to many Republican Congressmen and to many Democratic Senators and to many Republican Senators in Washington and far. far to few United States Congressmen and Senators. Perhaps we had better change these before we tamper with the language.

After years of dramatic increases, 1981 showed a drop in rural crime, according to Michigan State Police. Police officials are giving credit to rural crime prevention efforts on the local level that have made it harder to steal farm equipment and livestock

UNEMPLOYMENT DEBT SOLUTIONS UNVEILED

Governor Milliken has made several recommendations to the State Legislature to retire the nearly \$2 billion unemployment compensation debt that Michigan owes the federal government. Included in his plans are: a freeze on the maximum employee benefit (\$197/week) until 1986; increasing from 18 weeks to 20 weeks the qualifying period a worker must work before benefits can be received; and allowing new businesses to take a single business tax credit for any penalties they may have to pay the federal government for the outstanding debt. These and many more recommendations, if approved, would expire as soon as the debt is paid. TRAFFIC FATALITY STATISTICS

The Michigan Department of State Police has released its report on 1981 traffic related fatalities. Statistics showed that occupants in fatal accidents not wearing seat belts totaled 85.5%. Those wearing seat belts accounted for 5.4% of the deaths, with the remainder unknown. From 1977 to 1981, bicycle deaths increased 2.3%, and injuries increased 7.1%. In 1981, 73% of the fatalities occurred in rural areas and 73% of the injuries occurred in urban areas. In addition, the report stated that between 1979 and 1980, 28 people were killed in snowmobile accidents in Michigan. MICHIGAN RANKS THIRD IN WINE

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



Before all our summer garden goodness disappears, I suggest you process and freeze some of it for the winter ahead. Think about all the fresh produce still available in gardens and markets that can be stored - it's like simmering a bit of summer for the snow season.

For starters, you could make a rich spaghetti sauce, using about a dozen of the good things growing in Michigan. If you're going to freeze a batch or two, you can add cooked ground beef if you like.

Use the prepared sauce with spaghetti, in lasagna, in chili, or to make cream of tomato soup.

Start with a large heavy Dutch oven. Saute in 1/2 cup olive or vegetable oil, one large chopped onion, two chopped green peppers, and 3 cloves minced garlic. Cook over low heat about five minutes, then add one pound sliced fresh mushrooms, and eight cups peeled, seeded and chopped tomatoes, Add a half-cup fresh chopped parsley, 1 tablespoon fresh sweet basil. chopped, 1 tablespoon of salt, one of sugar, and a pinch of black pepper. Add 1 cup chopped celery and a cup of shredded carrot. If you have zucchini, shred a cup and add that, too.

Simmer all this slowly, uncovered, until vegetables are very tender and sauce is guite thick. Check for seasoning, and keep it light if you are freezing the mixture. (Flavors intensify in the freezer.)

For spaghetti sauce, brown a pound o ground beef, drain well and add to the vegetable mixture. You may also want to add a few slices of pepperoni, or combine a quarter-pound of hot Italian sausage (casings removed) with your beef when you brown it. A bay leaf adds to the flavor.

If you want to use this for tomato soup, puree the mixture in a blender or food processor. Then heat, thicken slightly with a mixture of equal parts of flour and butter (about 2 tablespoons each). If you are using

PRESCHOOL NUTRITION

The way a preschool child eats - or doesn't eat - can be frustrating for parents. But, our nutritionists tell me, the years from one to six are frequently marked by changing or finicky appetites. By age six, appetite usually improves again as the need for food increases in response to

another rapid growth period. Still, it's important to develop good eating habits in the preschool years. You can help do this by encouraging your child to eat for fun as well as for health.

Here are ways to make food fun. First of all, serve foods that look good, taste good, and have bright colors, interesting shapes, textures, and temperatures. Discuss how foods look shapes and colors; feel smooth, soft, hard; smell - minty, fruity; taste - sweet, bitter, sour; and sound crunchy, squishy, snappy.

Let the child help prepare meals and snacks. Children tend to eat food they fix

Praise your child for good eating habits; don't criticize. Your child should not be forced to eat. It is better to encourage a taste and if rejected, try another time. Children will eat when hungry. Don't use food to bribe, reward, or punish, or serve dessert as a reward for a clean plate. This can lead a child to use food to meet emotional needs, which can lead to overeating and possibly obesity.

Remember that play and exercise stimulate an appetite, but exhausting exercise will cause a child to eat poorly. A planned quiet time within an hour before meals can help your child settle down before eating.

Finally, set regular times for meals and snacks. Children need to eat more often than adults. Serve nutritious snacks at least two hours before meals. Meals need to be a family time where your child learns about food, good food habits, table manners and conversation skills. It is important to be casual about what, how much, and the way a child eats. Expect spills and have a towel handy. Little children are usually messy eaters.

If you follow these tips, chances are your child will develop good eating habits eating for health and for fun.



Geverner: You have touched on a very serious problem that has stirred public outrage in recent months. We certainly must increase our efforts to deter drunk drivers with previous arrests. It is even more important to deter those who have not yet been arrested. Drivers with prior drinking drivers involved in traffic crashes. A recent report on recommended drunk driving counter-measures states that an estimated 80 percent of drinking drivers involved in fatal crashes are first Elementary offenders-that is, they never have been arrested for drunk driving before. This P.T.O. Meeting statistic makes it clear that it especially is important also to deter drivers who drink but have no prior arrests for drunk driving.

Among several findings, the report

revealed that: -In 1980, 58 percent of the total highway fatalities in Michigan involved drinking drivers. As a result 1,025 lives were lost, 37.996 people were injured, and there were 28.917 property damage crashes. The estimated total annual dollar cost in Michigan was \$580 million.

--Intoxicated drivers represent a very small percentage of the driving population but they are extremely over-represented in traffic fattalities. Of Michigan's more than six million drivers, approximately 10 percent is involved in traffic accidents. Only about 1 percent is involved in alcohol-related crashes, yet more than half of the traffic fatalities involve intoxicated

-Seventy-six percent of the drinking drivers involved in fatal crashes in 1980 were under the age of 34; 47 percent were 24 or younger and 87 percent of the drivers involved in all alcohol-related crashes were

U.S. Rep. Jim Dunn of East Lansing has announced that young men and women from Michigan's Sixth Congressional District who are interested in seeking nomination to the U.S. Naval. Air Force. Merchant Marine and Military Academies must apply no later than Nov. 15 for the class entering in June 1983. ### "Toys Past and Present"



This 18" x 24" Christmas Miniature Tin Village was handmade by Mr. Louis A. Kuebler, a master tinner, for his children Bertha Kuebler Huber, William, Minnie, Herman and Hilda Kuebler Kappler, well before the turn of the century, perhaps after the birth of the first child, Bertha, in 1887, or 1900.

Herman, now 89 years old lives in Saline, told me the story of the little Christmas Village his parents would decorate during the Christmas season, and one part of the story has never left his memory. Herman said his father told the children "to leave the little gate open, so the Angels could go in and out at night," and now nearly a century later, the little gate remains open, guarded by Angels.

Louis A. Kuebler came from Stuttgart, Germany in 1858 to Chicago, Illinois with his brother. The brother, August went to Atlanta, Georgia and Louis came to Ann Arbor, then to Manchester. He married Barbara Kalmbach, born in Wurtenberg, Germany, who came to the United States with her parents at age two, went to Pennsylvania, but then to Manchester. Louis started his tinning business in Manchester in 1895 and was known as "Tinner Kuebler".

Son, Herman went into the business with his father in 1910 at age 17. The shop was located where the Parr Electric is

The Village had been stored in the attic of the original Kuebier nome on Furnace Street and was re-discovered at the household sale of the late Hilda K. Kappler in May 1980. It was suggested to Herman, rather than selling the village, would be give it to the Manchester Historical Society to which he gladly agreed.

The Village has been repaired, cleaned and painted, same as the original.

The cone shape in the center, once held a live Christmas tree, kept fresh by water held in the cone, which is now rusted out so a 20th century plastic tree must be substitutéd

Isn't it fun to imagine the beautiful tiny antique village miniatures that once upon a time made the Kuebler children happy? Now, in 1982 the village has the 1950's
