





Manchester Schools Free Of Asbestos

A recent inspection of the Manchester Schools for evidence of loose asbestos indicated that schools were free of the substance in all student areas.

Samples were taken throughout the buildings of all suspected loose fiber materials. Laboratory analysis has reported that the school district is free of ashestos fiber throughout student areas. "We did identify a small amount of loose asbestos in one of the boiler rooms." said Superintendent Eugene Thompson. "No students were ever in these areas. The problem was very minor and has now been corrected according to the guideline of the State Department of Education. I am pleased that we are able to announce to parents that no asbestos hazard exists in any of our schools."

Anne Ballew, Executive Director, Flospice of Washtenaw, was the featured speaker. Hospice is now a participating agency of Manchester United Way. Mrs. Ballew outlined the agency's program of assistance to the terminally ill and stressed the importance of services by volunteers to

"Toys Past and Present"



This 18" x 24" Christmas Miniature Tin Village was handmade by Mr. Louis A. Kuebler, a master tinner, for his children Bertha Kuebler Huber, William, Minnie, Herman and Hilda Kuebler Kappler, well before the turn of the century, perhaps after the birth of the first child, Bertha, in 1887, or 1900.

Herman, now 89 years old lives in Saline, told me the story of the little Christmas Village his parents would decorate during the Christmas season, and one part of the story has never left his memory. Herman said his father told the children "to leave the little gate open, so the Angels could go in and out at night," and now nearly a century later, the little gate remains open, guarded by Angels.

Louis A. Kuebler came from Stuttgart, Germany in 1858 to Chicago, Illinois with his brother. The brother, August went to Atlanta, Georgia and Louis came to Ann Arbor, then to Manchester. He married Barbara Kalmbach, born in Wurtenberg, Germany, who came to the United States with her parents at age two, went to Pennsylvania, but then to Manchester. Louis started his tinning business in Manchester in 1895 and was known as "Tinner Kuebler".

Son, Herman went into the business with his father in 1910 at age 17. The shop was located where the Parr Electric is

The Village had been stored in the attic of the original Kuebier nome on Furnace Street and was re-discovered at the household sale of the late Hilda K. Kappler in May 1980. It was suggested to Herman, rather than selling the village, would be give it to the Manchester Historical Society to which he gladly agreed.

The Village has been repaired, cleaned and painted, same as the original.

The cone shape in the center, once held a live Christmas tree, kept fresh by water held in the cone, which is now rusted out so a 20th century plastic tree must be substitutéd

Isn't it fun to imagine the beautiful tiny antique village miniatures that once upon a time made the Kuebler children happy? Now, in 1982 the village has the 1950's





News Of Good Things Growing

By: Margaret G. McCall Cauliflower, with its snowy white clusters and deep green leaves, is such a pretty vegetable I have trouble deciding whether to use it as a centerpiece or eat it.

Usually, I do both. It's a smashing centerpiece surrounded by a few other Michigan fall vegetables and fruits. It's equally smashing served raw with your favorite dip - and deliciously low in calories. Or forget the calories and enjoy french-fried cauliflower

Michigan ranks seventh in cauliflower production among the states, and last year our crop nearly doubled, to 6.2 million pounds worth more than \$2.3 million, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Harvest usually begins in Michigan about the first of August and continues to

Probably the most familiar cooked cauliflower recipe features a cheese sauce, but there are many other ways to serve this nutritious vegetable. A whole cauliflower cooked until crisp-tender can be covered with buttered bread crumbs. dusted with grated Parmesan cheese, and tucked under the broiler to lightly brown. It's an attractive addition to your dinner

Here's another recipe I think you'll

just tender, drain well and chop

Then, make a medium white sauce, using half chicken broth and half cream for the liquid. Season with salt, pepper and a pinch of nutmeg. Cool slightly, then add three well-beaten eggs.

Fold in the chopped cauliflower (and half-cup of cooked chopped mushrooms if you like), pour into a well-greased ring mold which has been dusted with dry bread crumbs. Set the mold in a pan of hot water, and bake at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes, until set. Unmold on a warm platter and fill the center with mashed cooked squash, sliced buttered carrots or green peas, for a colorful presentation at

Do you remember the story of the City Mouse and the Country Mouse? It's one of Aesop's fables, a pseudo-sermon on the virtue of self-reliance. I'm not crazy about the story itself, but the images suggested by the title send my thoughts off on a delightful tangent of their own.

Big Rock Point Nuclear Plant "A good friend and neighbor"

Since the years when Indians inhabited the wilds of northern Michigan the Big Rock-they called it Kitchi-ossining-has been an important landmark.

Then, it was the gathering place for spring and fall meetings of Chippewa Indians from all over northern Michigan, Several hundred years later, near the rock--Kitchi-ossining is still there --sits the electric generating plant that pioneered Michigan's nuclear era

Big Rock Point Nuclear Plant, owned and operated by Consumers Power Company, is celebrating its 20th anniversary this month.

Built on the threshold of a new technology, Big Rock Point was Michigan's first, and the nation's fifth, commercial nuclear power plant Construction started in 1960, and finished 21/2 years later at a cost of nearly \$27 million--a bargain by today's

In the 20 years that have followed scientists have watched the nuclear plant with interest So, too, have the local residents in nearby Charlevoix and Petoskey, many of whom call it a "good friend and neighbor." The plant generates enough electricity to serve 100,000 people annually.

"We like Big Rock," says Josh Barnes, president of Lexalite Corporation, which is located 1,200 yards from the nuclear plant "If Big Rock were not to operate, we would not be competitive in our marketplace."

The plant has become valuable to local residents in other ways, too. It provides a big boost to the local economy-at least \$5 million in 1981 alone through things like payroll purchases, taxes and lodging. The plant employs about 160 people; many of them are involved in area religious, civic and governmental activities.



The plant also has been important scientifically. As only the nation's fifth commercial nuclear standards for any type of generat-plant, its operations have been studied closely. In fact, Consumers Power, General Electric and the former Atomic Energy Commission conducted a research and development program at the plant. The successful program was designed to achieve increased fuel economy and greater electric generating capacity from nuclear power.

In 1977, the nuclear plant set a world record for boiling water reactors by operating 343 consecutive days. Last year, the plant fell five days short of breaking its own record. It generated electricity 91 percent of the time in

Although 20 years old, Big Rock Point is only halfway through its design lifetime.

Now, don't get me wrong. My husband's homemade sauerkraut is wonderful, and like most home-prepared foods, doesn't even bear comparing to its factory-canned counterpart. The end result is, in the long run, worth putting up with the periodic smell in the necessary course of its aging. And in the last couple of weeks we've collaborated on delicious apple pies and homemade applesauce that will be a nutritious addition to our children's diets in the months to come. But there's something about having two pails full of apples commanding me to run to the kitchen and be creatively productive that makes my spirit rebel. And when it was three pails full of pears waiting to be canned, actually began to lose my appetite for my favorite fruit.

Happily, I've found that I'm not alone in my predicament. A few days ago when I made an emergency trip to the grocery

there and we had a mutual pep-talk about canning tomatoes and zucchini until we couldn't look at a tomato or zucehini without feeling ill, until about February, It. sure helps to know that another presumably sane person shares your idiosyncrasy about too much of a good thing. Now all I need is to find another person who can be intimidated and made to feel quilty by a pail full of apples, and survive the experience - conscience intact.

Fortunately, the presence of the pie apples doesn't prevent me from munching on a crunchy, tart red "eating" apple and thoroughly enjoying the treat. Moreover, can use the sauerkraut crock as an excuse to get out of the house and take a bicycle ride or retreat into my study for an hour or two. And I think I can survive the pumpkin and squash season by making the required number of jack-o'-lanterns for our family and maybe canning some pumpkin for pies.

But I'm beginning to appreciate a comment made to me by a friend a couple of months ago. According to Mary, "A farm wife is always glad to see winter coming on - because she knows that means that there won't be any more food to put up!"

One of the common diseases we face each winter in Michigan is influenza, or the flu. Flu is a respiratory illness, similar in many ways to a cold, but potentially much more serious. It's caused by a virus and A and Type B.



Ask The Governor

Question: Instead of cutting education. why doesn't the State lay off more employees to cut costs?

Governor: Michigan has dropped to 40th in the nation in terms of state employees per 10,000 population because of the thousands of state workers we have been forced to lay off. With 128 employees per 10,000 population, we are 11th among the 13 states with populations of 5 million persons or more. These Census Bureau calculations include our college and university employees.

Question: The State keeps cutting back on everything, but I read recently where Michigan gave \$425,000 to Battle Creek Township to develop a shopping mall. Where does it get the money?

Governor: The Small Cities program grant to Battle Creek Township is one of several projects which will be funded by \$30.5 million in federal funds-previously

administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and now the responsibility of the Michigan Department of Commerce.

The state took over administration of the economic development program in May and preliminary reports indicate that processing time is shortened and the primary goal of job creation is carried out more efficiently. It had been projected that the funding-jobs ratio of the program would be at a level of about \$5,000 per job, but the per-job average has actually been \$1,216, extending the funds well beyond original expectations.

The specific grant you referred to-\$425,000 for the first stages of a major shopping mall near Battle Creek-will assist development of water and sewer facilities for the \$45 million Lakeview Square. it is expected that there will be approximately 800 jobs during construction and an employment of about 1,200 at completion of the project.

Of the total cost of the mall, \$40 million is privately financed and about \$5 million will come from Calhoun County, in keeping with the private-public sector cooperation typical of Small Cities projects.



Deterioration Of County Roads

funds is contributing to deterioration of Michigan's primary county roads is revealed in a new survey just completed by the County Road Association of Michigan.

The survey shows the state's 83 county road commissions, faced with dwindling gas and weight tax revenues, have drastically cut back on resurfacing and basic maintenance programs.

"Severe reductions in recapping and sealcoating on Michigan's 25,980-mile county primary road system mean possible loss of our road bases," according to Earl F. Rogers, engineer-director of the County Road Association.

"Unfortunately, proliferation of potholes and cracked pavements produce added costs for motorists in terms of reduced gas mileage, greater tire wear, and damage to

"Our study shows at least 1,350 miles of county primary blacktop roads should be recapped every year just to protect the surface, but lack of funds forced counties to limit recapping to only 522 miles in 1980 and just 256 miles in 1981. Without periodic recapping we risk loss of the surface and road base itself.

"Sealcoating, which protects roads from cracking and deteriorating, should be done on at least 2,550 miles of county primaries every year, but funds are so tight that road commissions could afford to treat only 1.130 miles in 1980 and 890 miles in 1981."

Primary roads are main county arteries over which millions of motorists travel daily to reach freeways or major county communities.

Rogers warned that unless more adequate funds for roads and streets are found soon, the state will face a multimillion dollar cost to rebuild basic road

Noting that the county share of state gas and weight taxes had decreased from \$248 million in 1979 to 1238 million in 1980 and \$217 million in 1981, Rogers said the funding crisis has been crippling to county road administration.

"In addition, lack of funds has caused reductions in equipment replacement and maintenance. Counties normally should spend \$28 million annually to keep truck fleets and machinery at standard operating levels but in 1980 they spent only \$21 million and that was cut further to just \$11 million in 1981."


Rogers noted that local county revenue sources, such as special assessments, township fund-matching, and county appropriations, have steadily increased in recent years but the limit has been reached in ability of local units to shoulder road maintenance costs.

State motor fuel and license plate revenues have shrunk for several years as motorists shifted to lighter, more fuelefficient vehicles while at the same time costs of road construction and maintenance rose with inflation.

Rogers said the plight of county primary road upkeep is serious but even worse for county secondary roads which have been all but ignored due to fund shortages. Secondary roads serve subdivisions and rural areas, acting as feeders to the primary and state trunkline systems.
