To the Voters of Manchester,

We, and all voters of the State of Michigan, have the right and privilege to exercise a certain amount of direct control over law making in the state through actions known as initiative and referendum. Often the results of these actions are in the form of ballot proposals. As seen by the number of proposals on the November 2nd ballot, Michigan citizens are taking advantage of this opportunity.

One proposal, in particular, will affect not only the citizens of Michigan, but all Americans, in fact, all peoples and all life that inhabit this earth. It speaks of our concern for their health, safety, lives, and futures. It is proposal E, the Nuclear Weapons Freeze proposal.

This initiative petition would direct the State Legislature to submit a text to the United States President, Secretary of Defense, Secretary of State and all Congress members by December 31, 1982. The text in essense would urge the U.S. government to propose to the Soviet Union a mutual, verifiable and immediate freeze on the production and deployment of nuclear weapons.

The Freeze is an agreement to stop. It is the first of a long series of steps that must be taken to assure us of a world free from the fear and/or reality of a nuclear

Today, parity in nuclear weaponry exists between the USA and USSR: that is we are roughly equal in strategic nuclear power. A mutual freeze - now - would hold constant the existing nuclear parity. Niether side would gain the advantage. At present, the United States and Soviet

Union possess 50,000 nuclear weapons. In a half an hour a fraction of these weapons can destroy all cities in the northern hemisphere. Yet, over the next decade, the USA and USSR plan to build over 20,000 more nuclear weapons, along with a new generation of nuclear missiles and aircraft. This new generation of weapons will improve their ability to attack opponent's nuclear forces in what is termed a "limited nuclear exchange." Having such capabilities will undermine the sense of parity, spur further weapons developments and increase the pressure on both sides to use their weapons in a crisis rather than risk losing them in a first strike. On both sides of the ocean, these developments will lead to hair trigger readiness for a massive nuclear exchange.

Soon, other countries may acquire enough nuclear weapons to become additional threats in this situation. The Freeze would increase the incentive of these countries to renounce acquisition of their own nuclear weapons.

Children kept their jackets and hats at their own desks rather than on coat racks. 4.) Parents were invited to hear Dr. LaMont Okey talk at PTO about preventing the spread of head lice. Dr. Okey explained that lice is a nuisance but does not cause health problems. Itching is often the presenting complaint. Numerous nits (eggs) are attached by the louse (a tiny bug) to hair shafts. These tiny white eggs are attached to the hair and do not brush off (unlike dandruff). The treatment involves washing the hair with Kwell or Rid shampoo and washing, at high temperatures, all bedding and clothing. The treatment should not be done more

than once a week. A check of all children last week revealed no new cases. The Klager staff wishes to thank parents who quickly

### **Bloodmobile News**

A Manchester Red Cross Bloodmobile helps anyone who needs blood. For years Red Cross blood has been free to patients in all Michigan and most U.S. hospitals -any charges are by the hospital only and for their giving of the blood to a patient. Manchester is noted for doing its share to help keep the supply at a safe level. Lifewise, many Manchester area people have been helped when that unexpected need occured.

It takes lots of people to run a successful Bloodmobile. First and foremost are the donors. 190 people came to the October 18th clinic at the Knights of Columbus Hall, and 178 pints of blood were collected. The other 12 donors were deferred for temporary or permanent medical reasons which were explained by the Red Cross

nurse in charge of the clinic. In the 31 years, Manchester has held regular Red Cross Bloodmobiles - at first once a year and since 1970 twice a year -gallon donor records have been kept. There are 244 gallon donors on the Honor Roll and they range from 1 gallon (when the name is added) to 5 gallon donors. Next time there will be a 6 gallon donor!

Arnold secretary-treasurer of the Michigan State Building and Construction Trades Council, are working together with Citizens for Michigan Jobs and Energy to fight Proposal D. WELLWOOD ROAD

Wellwood Road, cutting across the very southwest corner of Manchester township and hence of the county also, took its name from an Irish imigrant family who came to the area in 1873. A widow, Margaret Fisher Wellwood, from Geashill, near Athlone, in central Ireland settled first with her seven children (aged ten to twenty-five) on Ely Road just north of the Reynolds Corners' cemetery. There, shortly after they arrived, nineteen-yearold Mary died of Typhoid fever. in the autumn of 1877 the family purchased and moved to a farm on what is now the northeast corner of Wellwood and Mull roads. Here Robert, a bachelor, two maiden sisters, Sarah and Anne and their mother lived out their lives. Two brothers, J. (Joseph) William and Thomas, eventually purchased farms on either side of the homestead; J. William to the west at the corner of Noggles road and Tom to the east with the house on the south side of

Wellwood road. There are today no living descendents of this large family. Eleanor Wellwood, whom some readers may remember was the last to survive. She sold the homestead in 1941 and moved into Clinton. (Rumor has it that she gave the proceeds from the sale of the farm to a church in Brooklyn.) She died in the Rebecca Home in Jackson in 1967. Her mother, Ella, youngest of the widow's children, married Charles McMahon but died two weeks after Eleanor was born. The process insures the safety of all students who ride buses. Inspectors have the authority to red tag buses which means they may not be used until corrections have been made. Yellow tags mean that a deficiency has been noted but that the school district may continue to utilize the bus until corrections have been made.


