The Cornerstone having been placed at a ceremony on July 9, 1882 at 2 p.m., the Sanctuary was subsequently officially dedicated on Sunday morning, December .10, 1882. The Pastor was then The Reverend George Schoettle, who ministered in Manchester from 1885 through 1906. In those days the German Lutheran Church was called "DEUTCHE EVANGELICHE GEMEINDE."

What's Cooking In Michigan by Margaret G. McCall

Michigan Department of Agriculture

This is going to be a sweet column, combining fresh creamery butter, eggs and sugar, all good things growing in Michigan.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture reports that dairies in our state produced almost 37 million pounds of butter last year, our hens provided 1.54 billion eggs, and our farmers harvested more than two million tons of sugar beets. Take a little of each product, put them together, and you have butter cream, that most delectable filling and frosting.

Reading one of Julia Child's cookbooks convinced me that anyone can make a cooked French butter cream. You need a little time and patience, but the smooth, creamy results are worth the extra effort. Best of all, you can freeze the finished product, thaw, beat in a little more soft butter and it's ready to use when you need it. It can be flavored with chocolate, vanilla, rum or any liqueur you choose. If you're like me, once you've mastered the recipe, you'll seldom use any other

Combine in small saucepan 2/3rds cup sugar and 3 tablespoons water. Bring to boil over high heat, then cover for a minute to dissolve any sugar crystals clinging to sides of pan. Uncover, boil to softball

stage, 238 degrees on candy thermometer. Meanwhile, in top of double boiler beat 1 large egg and 3 egg yolks just until well mixed. When syrup reaches softball stage, slowly dribble over the eggs while beating

Set double boiler over barely simmering water and beat slowly with wire whisk (about 20 minutes) until mixture has thickened enough to form a ribbon when lifted and dribbled off wires of whip. (Instead of using a wire whisk, I use a portable electric mixer and it seems to work as well with much less effort.) Remove from heat and beat until cool. Then beat in 2 sticks of softened butter, 2 tablespoons at a time. Add 1 teaspoon vanilia and 3 to 4 ounces of melted, cooled chocolate, if you like. Continue beating

for spreading consistency. For those of you who haven't time or patience, here's an easy butter cream from one of the pastry chefs at Marshall Field's in Chicago, who demonstrated filling and decorating small cakes with this recipe. Get out the electric mixer and start with

1/2 pound butter. Beat about 10 minutes until very creamy. Add 1/2 pound of margarine and continue beating another 5 minutes. Add, all at once, 1/2 pound of sifted confectioners' sugar. Continue beating while you add 1/2 cup half-and

For chocolate butter cream, beat in 4 to 6 ounces of melted and cooled semi-sweet hocolate. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and tablespoon of any other flavoring you desire. This can be covered tightly and stored in the refrigerator for up to a week Just bring to room temperature before



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Good Cooking In Manchester

by Lucy Foldkamp Christmas in Manchester gives town's bakers an excuse to exercise their skills to their heart's content. It is just as true that you can never have enough cookies on hand this time of year as that Santa will find out if you have been naughty or nice. Because many of us descend from German ancestors, a lot of these cookies come from German recipes. lehkucken, cinnamon stars, springerles.

Springeries have been my favorite ever since I can remember. My mother almost never made them, since no one in her family, which was not German, had ever taught her. When she did try, the results did not encourage her to try again. Springerles are notorious for turning out like little cakes of cement, unless the cook has been making them for years or is blessed with a white thumb, something akin to a gardener's green one. The recipe is like no other. Springerles start out like macaroons, go through a stage like bread dough, are rolled out like any cut-out cookie, get an air-drying treatment like pasta, and wind up like small soft white prownies. There are several crucial steps in the recipe, that if executed without care will result in tooth-chipping failure. On the other hand, a few notes of caution can enable anyone to produce very good

What follows is my favorite version the springerie recipe, which has as many variations as most classic cookie recipes. It comes from Rombaure and Becker's Juy of Ceeking, and is desirably modest in its ingredients, using regular granulated sugar where some call for confectioner's, and whole eggs where some require only egg whites, leaving the baker with naked yolks to use up somehow. This recipe is

1/2 tsp. baking powder l Tosp, anise seed Beat the eggs with an electric mixed until light-colored and foamy. This will take several minutes. Add the sugar gradually while still beating. The batter should be smooth and shiny, without obvious grains of sugar. Sift together and add the dry ingredients. The dough should be the consistency of any soft drop cookie dough. Sprinkle a pastry cloth or a clean non-terry dish towel with 1/2 cup flour. Turn the dough out onto this cloth and knead lightly a few minutes to stiffen the dough. This is one of the crucial stages; the dough should still be soft when you are done, definitely not as stiff as bread dough. Roll it out very thick, at least 1/2 of an inch. Be careful here too; springerles must be fat. Use a flat springerle mold or roller to make the traditional impressions in the springerles almost as easily as baking dough. A good substitute is a Rycraft type

cookie stamp. This is another tricky part; if you press too hard trying to get a good impression, you may flatten the dough too much. Cut out the cookies with a sharp knife and lay them out on waxed paper to air dry for 10-12 hours. This ensures that the impression you were just so careful to make does not bake out and produces the characteristic springerle hard crust with

Sprinkle greased cookie tins liberally with anise seed, place the cookies on them and bake at 325 degrees for 15-20 minutes. The bottoms should puff up and turn light yellow. Let cool a minute before removing from the pan.

When I was twelve or so, I gave my mother a springerle roller, hoping she When I grew up, I vowed to learn how to make springerles myself, and that roller has been used in my own kitchen more often than it ever was in my mother's.

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
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

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
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On Friday night we opened for 13 as Dave followed right behind basketball campaign by hosting the Aggies from Sand Creek and unfortunately they left with the victory.



School Board **Ratifies New Teacher Contract**

The Manchester Board of Education, in an early Monday Morning meeting, approved the two year settlement negotiated by Superintendent Eugene Thompson and Michigan Association of School Boards representative Rita Thomas with the Manchester teachers who are affiliated with the Washtenaw-Livingston Education Association.

The new pact calls for salary improvements of 5.9% in the current year and an anticipated increase of 4 percent for the 1983-84 school year. The 1983-84 settlement is based upon the increase in state equalized valuation of the school district. The actual salary increase will be equal to 80 percent of the percentage increase in SEV or 4 percent whichever is

Improvements at very minimal cost to the Board were made in the fringe benefit package. In addition to medical insurance, teachers will now also receive 60 percent dental coverage and limited vision insurance. Board of Education provided Term Life Insurance will also be included.

Superintendent Gene Thompson has indicated that the major contract language change now gives the Board of Education the right to reduce staff, if necessary, using experience and evaluations as criteria in addition to seniority. Thompson stated that as far as he was aware the right to use evaluations is a first for Boards of Education in Michigan. This means that the Board is no longer fully obligated to layoff only the least senior teachers as efforts are made to downsize the school district.

A two year contract had been a major goal of the Board of Education. With the ratification of the contract two more years of stability for the schools are assured.
