Good Cooking In Manchester

Pinwheel cookies are as appropriate to 1/2 cup chopped nuts Christmas as a red flannel suit trimmed with white fur. Both are a little out of the especially elegant and often disappear nuts. Cool before using. first. Their looks attract the fingers even though the other cookies may taste as good, which you cannot after all tell until

you have actually eaten one. Pinwheels look like they take a little trick and extra time to make, which is true, but the trick is not too hard and the time needed is not so

Pinwheels come in a variety of styles, all variations on one technique, rolling out the cookie dough, spreading a filling or another dough on top, and rolling the whole thing up. The dough is then cooled in the refrigerator and later aliced and baked. This is the easy part, the pleasing part, when you can see the curled up pattern in the dough and pride yourself on the beautiful things you are putting in the

Here are two different pinwheel recipes which could appear together on the same cookie tray without clashing, or without one besting the other in either looks or

DATE-NUT PINWHEELS

1/4 cup margarine 1/2 cup shortening i cup brown sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1/2 tsp. soda

Mix margarine, shortening, and brown sugar, stir in the egg and vanilla. Blend in the dry ingredients. Divide the dough in two and roll each half out into a 7" x 11" rectangle. Spread with Date-Nut Filling (recipe follows) and roll up tightly from the wide side. Wrap in waxed paper and chill several hours. When ready to bake, preheat oven to 400 degrees and slice dough into 1/4" pieces. Place on a lightly greased cookie tin and bake for 8-10 minutes. The cookies should be very lightly

DATE-NUT FILLING

3/4 lb. (3 cups) chopped, pitted dates 1/3 cup sugar

CHOCOLATE PINWHEELS

1/2 cup margarine 1/4 cup shortening CUD SUGAL 2 eggs 1 tsp. vanilla

Blend the margarine, shortening, and sugar. Stir in the eggs and vanilla. Add the dry ingredients. Divide the dough in two and add the chocolate to one half. Roll each out on waxed paper until it is about 9" x 12". Here is the tricky part. Flip the chocolate dough onto the white, trying your best to get it to land right on target. If the two doughs do not match perfectly, do not despair, just continue. Roll the two doughs together with a rolling pin. This will help the two stick together. Then roll the dough up from the wide side, wrap in waxed paper, and chill several hours.

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees, slice the dough in 1/4" pieces, and bake on a lightly greased cookie pan for 8-10 minutes.

Tax Legislation Changes IRS Interest Rates

All interest payable to taxpayers or overpaid taxes or by taxpayers on inderpaid taxes will be compounded daily after December 31, 1982, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Beginning January 1, 1963, the rate of interest on overpayments or underpayments will be redetermined twice a year, based on the average adjusted prime rate during the six-month period ending September 30 and March 31.

The rate based on the six-month period ending September 30 will go into effect on January 1 of the next calendar year, and the rate based on the six months ending March 31 will go into effect on July 1 of the same calendar year.

Previously, the rate was set annually by October 15 and was based on 100 percent of the average prime interest rate for the proceeding month. Under this procedure the rate was 20 percent for the period February 1 to December 31, 1982.

No-Cost Weatherization

Would you like to keep your home warm in the winter and cool in the summer at a lower cost?

If you have a lower income you may qualify for a no-cost weatherization of your home. These are your tax dollars at work and you deserve the break.

This is the message given by Washtenaw County Community Services Agency who s now looking for homes owned or rented by senior citizens and limited-income folks. "We need to figure out how to stop using so much fuel during the winter. With the rising cost of fuel the only solution is to

The program to help reduce the use of such fuel is called Home Weatherization. It s very simple: Home Weatherization involves putting more attic insulation in homes, installing storm windows, putting caulking around windows and doors to keep out the cold, and other small procedures to reduce the amount of fuel installation are offered at no cost to qualified residents in Washtenaw County.

Who is qualified can be determined in a very simple way. Anyone who is on some kind of assistance is usually qualified. The family income should not exceed \$11,625 for a family of four. For a family of two, the maximum income is \$7.775.

The way to get your home weatherized is really very simple. All you have to do is call the Washtenaw County Community

Saline Services Agency at 994-2570 and find out whether your income qualifies you. You will be asked a few questions such as: To show some proof of income, whether you Hospital own your own home or rent, the kind of fuel that you use, the number of people in your family, your social security number, and the amount of your fuel bills. Then the staff person will arrange to visit your home and an appointment will be set. Usually this can be done within a two-week period. If you are found to qualify for the free home weatherization you will be put on a

within one month. The crew will either be equaty employees or private contractors.

The funds for this program are from the Department of Energy. They are your tax deliars and therefore no one should feel sky about having a free weatherization to their home if they are eligible. The money is regulated at the State level by the Department of Labor through the Bureau f Community Services. The Bureau of Community Services then contracts with the Washtenaw County Community Services Agency to implement the program at the local level.

The Home Weatherization program in Washtenaw County has been in operation since 1975. At one time the program utilized only CETA crew who were in training to learn the weatherization trade. This made the program very attractive for nonskilled workers, but resulted in fewer homes being weatherized each month. The weatherization of about twenty homes per month in Washtenaw County. Priority is given to senior citizens and persons who

The Washtenaw County Community Services Agency is now assured of receiving a good sum of funds to continue the program into and through 1983. For this reason, they are urging everyone who thinks they might be eligible to call them and set up an appointment early. The earlier, the better.

Over the past three years, 85% of the patients accepted for treatment have reviously been rejected for therapy at mother institution.

At Saline Community Hospital, rehabilitation therapy is a joint threephased program including Physical Therapy. Speech Therapy and Occupational Therapy. Chief Physical Therapist and Director of Rehabilitation Services is John Ivanoff, R.P.T. Marilyn Koster, M.A., C.C.C.-Speech Pathology, heads the Speech Therapy program and Cynthia Bruhnsen, O.T.R., is the Chief Occupational Therapist. The Hospital's Board of Directors and Administration have been extremely supportive of the program which has allowed for the development of innovative techniques which are unique to the Head Trauma Program at Saline Community Hospital.

"The far-reaching implications of this rogram include the ease with which such a program could be established within other institutions, opening the way for advances in the treatment of Head Trauma patients," states Saline Community Hospital Administrator, William J. Lavery

HOLIDAY DRINKING

Alcoholic drinks play an important role in many of our holiday social events. Used moderation, they pose no serious problem. But when people drink too many

alone kills mere than 1,000 people each year, injures another 38,000, and costs some \$580 million economic losses. Unfortunately, a lisproportunate share of accidents and eaths occur over the holiday season.

Part of this may be attributed to the frequency of holiday parties where alcohol is served. Sometimes, it seems that you can't participate in a party or enjoy it fully unless you drink. Yet the fact is that about a third of our drinking-age population are abstainers or have only a drink or two each year. So holiday party planners should realize that their guests will include a number of people who don't drink. For these people, attractive non-alcoholic beverages should be available.

Other guests may tend to drink too much. These people create more difficult oblems. A concerned party host will have an advance plan of action for dealing with them. Such a plan should offer alternative transportation or even accommodations. Often an intoxicated person may insist that he is able to drive - but if the host has made his plan clear at the beginning, the drunk person may accept being driven home or staying overnight.

High protein snacks served with drinks slows down absorption of alcohol, but only time will allow the body to rid itself of alcohols effects. And remember, black coffee does NOT sober up a person. If possible, limit drinks to one per hour anyone exceeding that limit for very long poses a driving risk.

Alcoholic beverages, in moderation, may serve as a social lubricant - but when they are not the main attraction, parties will usually be more successful.

Tax Planning Questions And Answers

Budgeting, economizing and planning are good, sensible ways to save money. The Internal Revenue Service wants taxpayers to realize that, while there are no bargains or discounts on taxes, there are legal ways to cut down on taxes, and the secret to "A penny saved" on taxes is good planning. The IRS has prepared this question and answer column to alert taxpayers to the money-saving benefits of good tax

Question If you had to sum up in just a few words how all taxpayers could get the most tax "breaks" what would you say? Answer KEEP GOOD RECORDS ALL YEAR! Even if you've always filed the 1040A, or short form, and have never been required to have more than your W-2 at tax time, your circumstances could change during the year and you might want to itemize deductions, for example.

Question I've never had bookkeeping - I don't know how to begin to keep good records. Do I have to keep ledgers and records like that?

Answer A good recordkeeping system is one that works for you. To be good, a system need not be formal or in a ledger, although for some people, that is a good system. A manila envelope or shoe box set aside in January for receipts and records, marked "Taxes" and the year, and kept for at least four years, is a good system for

Question Where do I begin? I don't know the first thing about tax planning.

Answer If you have large investments stocks, bonds, real estate holdings, for example, you might want to look into a professional investment or tax counselor. In that case, be as choosey as you would in

selecting a dector or other professional.

Question How can I figure how much tax I have to pay?

Answer Tax is based on taxable income that is, all of your income, minus such things as moving expenses, dividend advantage of allowable tax credits, which directly reduce the amount of tax owed. Question What are some of the tax

redits available to reduce my taxes? Answer There are a number of credits but of course, not everyone qualifies for every credit. Among those available are Child and Dependent Care, Earned Income, Credit for the Elderly, Political Contributions, Residential Energy, and overpaid Social Security Tax.

Question How can I get information on these credits and adjustive ats to income to see if I qualify?


Answer You can write to the Internal Revenue Service and ask any one of their 90 free publication arrious tax topics. Your tax instr ...on booklet will list many of the publications by topic and

Question Is it really legal for me to try to pay less tax?

Answer Generally, yes. While there are rules about paying taxes, there are also alternatives for paying less tax. Much depends on your motives and methods. Those who are devious and set out to defraud the government are not acting legally, and the penalties for this are severe. The right idea is to plan your affairs so as to result in the lowest tax allowed under the law.

Question Why must I prove I'm right? Does the IRS automatically think I cheat?

Answer The IRS does not automatically assume that taxpayers cheat. IRS does expect taxpayers to fulfill their legal obligation of keeping adequate records to Continued on page 24

Drunk Driving Law Pending

Although Michigan's new drunk driving law does not go into effect until April, 1983, Secretary of State Richard H. Austin is appealing to all motorists to drive over the year-end holidays as if the new law was in effect now.

Among other provisions, the new law permits roadside breath tests on suspects and makes it illegal to operate a vehicle with a .10 percent blood alcohol level or more. Refusal to take a breath test can result in the suspension of a driver's license for six months and six points on the offender's driving record. Repeat offender's face license suspensions of up to five years.


Of the 53,000 drivers involved in accidents in Michigan, in December, 1981, 4,900 had been drinking. In addition, 4,777 arrests for drunk driving were made that month. Under the new law, arrests are expected to increase substantially.


