Under those guidelines, an individual must apply through his or her local bank. Through the bank, the individual then applies to the FFDA (Family Farm Development Authority). If the applicant meets the requirements, the bank then purchases bonds from the FFDA and administers the loan. Current plans call for separate bonds for each

Buying A Wood Stove?

It's estimated that five million Americans now own wood stoves. The number is growing annually, as the cost of heating fuel steadily increases. And while in many cases burning wood has saved money for homeowners, a wood stove is not for everyone.

An adequate supply of wood--its availability--is one necessary condition. Its price is another. Today, it's estimated that if the home owner can buy wood at less than a hundred dollars a cord, wood heat is economical. But if one must pay--as some in cities must--\$150 and \$200 a cord, there probably isn't any saving.

And handling wood is a much more demanding job than using oil, electricity, or gas. A wood stove takes constant feeding and someone must haul the wood to it regularly. That would not be feasible for many elderly people, or for the infirm or for many females.

There are also dangers involved. Fires are more likely with wood stoves. A major danger is a buildup of creosote in flues and chimneys--which can ignite under very hot temperatures. So not only must ashes be taken out regularly, but chimneys and flues should be cleaned periodically--or chemicals used when burning wood to prevent buildup.

What many are doing is putting in a wood stove for supplementary or emergency heating. They use the wood stove only in the coldest months, or in cold spells. They have it available, also, when and if power is cut off, or if gas or oil supplies run out. Remember that with wood stoves utilizing fans, when the electricity goes out, the fan won't function, and that kind of wood stove will not heat properly in an emergency.

Since there are more than 400 wood stove manufacturers today, producers having sprung up fast in all parts of the country as many sensed a good thing in the wind, the buyer should learn something about the various locally-available models and question peo-ple who own them, before installing one. And when doing so, buy a fire extingusher, a smoke detector and a metal ash bucket, as part of your program.

Food Costs

The Department of Agriculture offers some helpful advice for those who wish to keep food bills down. First, eat out less. Despite the convenience and apparent cheapness of restaurant food, in most cases families can save considerable money eating at home. Second, avoid imported foods. They are high in price and are going higher. They must come quite a distance

and are usually not as fresh as U.S.-produced food. Buy when foods are at their seasonal low. Pork, for example, is always lower in fall. Chicken also is often cheaper in the fall.

Also in certain areas, tomatoes and certain greens can be grown in the Sunshine Belt and in other areas certain foods can be grown in green houses or inside the home.





Surveys size up heating bills Gas heat still cheapest

With the arrival of winter, Effective Buying Dollars many Michigan residents are keeping one wary eye on the weather and the other on their heating bills. Whether they see good or bad news depends largely on which heating fuel they use, and who their fuel supplier is.

Natural gas heats more Michigan homes—about 70 percent than any other fuel. It also is the cheapest of the conventional heating fuels.

For example, Consumers Power Company estimates that the total 1982 gas heating bill will be about \$570 for the typical size single-family home in its service area. Heating that same house with oil would cost about \$1,080, or 89 percent more. Using propane would cost about \$1,110, or 95 percent more. Unless insulation is greatly increased, an electric heating system would cost \$1,260, more than twice the cost of heating with natural gas.

In Michigan, natural gas is provided by 10 utility companies. An October survey that compared rates from nine of the firms shows that at most consumption levels, Consumers Power's residential gas customers have the lowest heating bills in the state.

Most of Consumers Power's commercial and industrial customers are also paying less than they would for comparable gas volumes purchased from any of the other eight utilities, according to the survey.

The company's typical customer also is paying less to keep warm than he would in any of the country's 25 largest cities, ac- income. Effective buying income cording to a survey completed this month. The survey compares bills for 25 Mcf of natural gas.

Consumers Power's bill is almost 11 percent cheeper than the cost in Memphis, the least expensive large city. It is 85

Even though it is still the cheapest conventional heating fuel, natural gas hasn't escaped the same inflationary push that has caught hold of most other products. Nonetheless, many natural gas users are paying smaller portions of their incomes to keep warm than they were 20

In 1981, for example, Consumers Power says its average residential heating customer spent 2.06 percent of his or her household's effective buying income on natural gas. In 1962, that natural gas bill accounted for 2.73 percent of the household's is a family's total personal income minus federal, state and local



RESPIRATORY DISEASES

Shakespeare's King Richard III spoke of the winters of our discontent. Here in Michigan we might refer to the winters of our respiratory distress. Because along with cold weather come colds, the flu, and pneumonia. No one knows exactly why these occur most often in winter, but we suspect it's because that's when people congregate more closely indoors with less ventilation and dryer air. This, in turn, encourages infection and its spread.

A cold and influenza are similar. But the flu is usually more severe and more often associated with fever and body aches. Also. while there are hundreds of cold viruses, there are two major types of flu viruses -Types A and B. Type A is generally more severe than Type B. Both types, or strains, undergo minor variations. When there is a major variation, world-wide outbreaks may occur as with Asian Flu, Hong Kong Flu, etc. These strains of viruses are named after the place where the variant was first

Pneumonia is a possible complication of severe colds or the flu. It is a distinct and separate disease usually caused by a bacterium. Colds and flu can lead to pneumonia because lung tissue is more readily infected by the bacteria during the illness, especially among those over age 65 or with chronic lung disease. That's why influenza vaccine is recommended for the people in these high risk groups.

Prevention is, of course, the wisest practice. Unfortunately, there's no sure way to avoid catching cold. Recent studies indicate that cold viruses are more readily transmitted by direct contact, especially the hands, than through the air. So good personal hygiene, especially handwashing, may help prevent infection. Keeping fit, eating well, and avoiding unnecessary stress will also help keep up your body's

If all this fails, and you eatch a cold anyway, the main thing is to make yourself as comfortable as possible. Get plenty of rest, eat simple foods, and drink plenty of liquids. Don't overdo, because you're more susceptible to other infections. If the symptoms are severe or prolonged, see your doctor. Try to stay away from work, if possible, so you don't expose fellow workers. In general, a cold is most communicable during the first few days but you can spread it as long as you have

Ask The Governor

Question: My husband has purchased a snowmobile this year. We need to know whether it's legal for our 10 and 13 year old children to operate it?

Governor: Youngsters between 12 and 16 may operate a snowmobile in Michigan inder only two circumstances: if they have in their possession a snowmobile safety certificate or if they are under the direct upervision of a person 18 or older. Operators between 12 and 16 may cross highways or streets only if they have a alid snowmobile safety certificate. Youngsters under 12 may not cross streets and highways and may drive snowmobiles only under the direct supervision of an

Sefety education classes are offered by volunteer instructors and by some local sheriff's departments. Your Department of Natural Resources district office will have a list of available classes. Although a certificate is required only of operators Meeting between 12 and 16, safety education classes are recommended for individuals of

any age who are new to snowmobiling. There were 20 deaths involving snowmobiles during the 1981-82 snow season, 20 during the 1980-81 season and 28 during the 1979-80 season. Last winter four of the deaths occurred when snowmobiles went through the ice.

Other deaths occurred in accidents involving cars or trucks on the highway. Snowmobiles may be operated on the right-of-way of state highways but not on the plowed shoulder except to cross a river on a bridge. State law provides for counties to allow snowmobile operation on the right-of-way of county roads if the

county chooses to do so. All snowmobiles must be registered except those operated exclusively on lands owned or under control of the snowmobile owner or those used entirely in safety education and training programs conducted by certified snowmobile safety instructors. Machines used in special events of limited duration also are excluded from registration requirements, but these events must be prearranged and held under permits issued by the Department of

Natural Resources. Registrations, which can be acquired at your local Secretary of State office, are \$15 and are valid for three years from the date of purchase.
