# **Annual School Election** Monday, June 13th

The annual school election will be held Monday, June 13th at the Manchester High School from 7 am until 8 pm. There will be three miliage propositions; one renewal and two additional. There will also be an election of two board members for full terms of four years. Those running are Paul DuFreene and Joanne Okey, incumbents, both unopposed. Listed below are the three propositions:

#### I. MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSITION

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be essed against all property in Manchester Comm Schools, Washtenew and Jackson Counties, Michigan, be increased by 18.78 mills (\$18.78 on each \$1.000.00) on state equalized valuation for a period of 3 years, 1983, 1984, and 1985, for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes (this being a renewal of 18.78 mills for operating purposes which expired with the 1982 tax levy)?

#### **II. ADDITIONAL MILLAGE PROPOSITION**



Before one votes additional funds, take into account this type of subterfuge and also high pay raises of administration.


