One of the Finest public buildings in the city is Girard College

This edifice, in the corinthian style, is the finest specimen of Grecian architecture in the United States, if not of modern times. It was begun in 1833, and opened in 1848, having cost in its construction over \$1,930,000. The building is named after Stephen Girard, an eminent American philanthropist. He was a seafaring man during his youth, and rose to master and co-partner in an American coaster. In 1769 he retired from sea life and commenced business in a small way as a trader in Philadelphia, and ultimately realized a large

fortune. He then became a banker and in 1812 advanced a loan of \$5,000,000 to government. He was a liberal benefactor to the city. subscribing to its charities, and adorning it with many elegant buildings. He died in 1831, bequeathing the bulk of his property, amounting to about \$9,000,000, besides the proceeds of a certain portion of his estate (out of which some legacies were to be deducted), together with a building lot in Philadelphia, for the erection and establishment of a college for orphans. A marble statue in the lower vestibule covers the remains of the founder. By a clause in the founders' will, no ecclesiastic, missionary, or minister of any sect whatever, is allowed to have any connection with Girard College, or even to be

admitted as a visitor therein; but the officers are instructed to train up the pupils in the truest principles of morality, leaving them to choose their own religious opinions upon arriving at years of. discretion. There is a register kept at the outer gate, where all visitors are required to have their names recorded. The college grounds are surrounded by a high stone fence, which gives the place the appearance of a penitentiary, from the outside. The edifice is built of marble and stone, even the floors, stairways and roof. A fine view of the city and a portion of Fairmount Park is obtained from the roof, as the building towers above all others. Only a few blocks to the south is seen

Logan Square, one of the four parks laid out and reserved in the original plat of the city, by Wm. Penn. It was there that the great Sanitary Fair was held in 1865. When it was roofed over, the trunks of the trees served as supports, while the tops waved far above.




Village Primary **Election Results**

Manchester High Loses In Quiz Bowl

Manchester High was among the 16 schools eliminated in the second round of the 1984 Alma College High School Quiz Bowl on February 11. Of the 49 schools that competed in the first two rounds, only 16 (8 each in A-B and C-D division) have survived.

Competing in the C-D Division single-elimination

tournament. Manchester received a first round bye (automatic win) then lost 235-145 to St. Mary's Preparatory (Orchard Lake) in

Manchester's team members, coached by Richard Parsons, are seniors Katie Miller and Jav Wilde, junior Betsy Royle and sophomore Renee Yeutter, with freshman Brad Myers as alternate.

Called the "varsity sport of the mind." Quiz Bowl is a fast-moving question and answer game played between two four-member teams. It is a game of quick recall and fast response, with points awarded to the team giving the correct answer first. Contestants have three seconds to answer toss-up questions (worth 10 points each) and five seconds to answer bonus questions (worth a prestated number of points from 20 to 35, depending upon complexity and degree of difficulty.)

Both toss-up and bonus questions cover a broad range of chemistry, geography, movies, television shows, Olympic competitions, sports, music, and Nobel. Pulitizer and Academy Award winners.

In Alma's Quiz Bowl, there are two divisions of competition. determined by school size and corresponding to the class level of sports competition set by the Michigan High School athletic Association. Class A and B schools compete and Class C and D compete. Each division will have a champion and a runner-up.

This year, the fourth year that Alma has sponsored a state-wide Quiz Bowl competition, 49 high schools - 24 in A-B and 25 in C-D are participating. The two championship matches are March

NEWS From the office of THE GOVERNOR

Governor James Blanchard announced specifics of his program to limit college tuition costs for Michigan resident undergraduate students attending the state's 13 public colleges and universities. "We're downsizing state government and targeting state spending on only the highest priority needs," said Governor Blanchard. "I challenge our colleges and universities to also tighten their belts, so that families can afford tuition for their children."

As a financial incentive, Blanchard offered a 10% increase in state funding next year for higher education institutions which adopted no tuition increase for resident undergraduates. Those colleges and universities which refused to freeze tuitions would receive less than the full 10% increase, based on a sliding scale, but would get a minimum six percent state funding increase.

The Governor made the following statement on a recent federal district court decision for injunction against the continued construction of ELF pending updated an environmental study. "I am very pleased with the decision of Judge Crabb. I would note that in addition to the environmental and health concerns, the ELF project is a tremendous waste of taxpayer dollars. You will recall that the state Natural Resources Commission approved the Michigan right of way on this

am pleased that the project has the UAW and Ford. "This been halted," said the Governor. cooperative training project offers

Governor Blanchard called for greater cooperation inside the Capitol and said he will work to bring to state government the kind of cooperation he has been able to build between government and the private sector. "As Governor I want to be one of those people who pioneers this unprecedented cooperation for Michigan's future, and I know that all of you agree we should do everything we can to encourage cooperation at all levels -including inside the Capitol, where we desperately need it this year," the Governor said.

Governor Blanchard began a series of special meetings in the metropolitan Detroit area last week which are designed to foster greater public understanding of the state's successful fiscal recovery program. The meetings, which will be held over the next several months, will involve citizens and community leaders in discussions on the state's tax structure and the public services it supports.

A \$1.5 million grant from the Governor's Office for Job Training will help fund a project of the UAW-Ford National Development Training Center, a joint employee training and development effort of

the UAW and Ford. "This cooperative training project offers new hope to long-term unemployed workers at a time when rapidly changing technology and shifting economic forces have posed major obstacles to finding work," the Governor said.

The project will establish three Re-employment Assistance Centers to counsel and train at least 2,000 persons from among the 13,000 laid off Ford workers in southeastern Michigan. The centers will serve the Detroit, Macomb-Oakland, and Wayne-Monroe-Washtenaw regions. Training will focus on high job areas, such as demand licènsed practical nurses, respiratory therapists, operating room technicians, automated machine technicians, or computer aided drafting.

Governor Blanchard announced that Michigan will conduct a one-year study of homelessness and mental illness in the Detroit area. "I have asked the Michigan Department of Mental Health to conduct this study in response to growing concern that significant numbers within the total homeless population may be long-term mentally disabled," the Governor said. The study is one of only four nationwide funded by a \$60,000 grant from the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH).

Governor Blanchard issued calls for special elections to fill vacancies on township boards in Royal Oak Township, Oakland County; and Berrien Township, Berrien County. The Governor is required to call a special election when a vacancy has existed for a period in excess of 45 days without action by the township board to fill the vacancy. Berrien Township election is scheduled for April 3, and the Royal Oak Township election is scheduled for April 10.

In Home Helper Training

A four session course is being offered to train helpers to assist elderly and disabled persons living in their own homes. The course is being sponsored by Chelsea Community Hospital to establish a list of screened and trained, affordable in home helpers. Session topics include: Basic Care; Emotional Aspects of Disability; Mobility; Daily Activities and Commonly Encountered Illnesses. Persons completing the course will receive a certificate of attendance and become part of a resource pool serving local residents. Two training courses will be offered: March 6, 8, 13, 15 from 3:30 - 5:00 p.m. and April 10, 12, 17, 19 from 10:00 - 11:30 a.m. Sessions will be held at Chelsea Community Hospital. To arrange for interview or receive more information, call 475-1311 Ext. 262.

Report PIK Wheat Acreage To Agent

Wheat crop insurance policyholders will have the opportunity to revise the acreage insured if a portion of the crop is

placed in the PIK program. Barbara Cranson, District Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, announced that farmers will also have their premiums reduced with PIK participation.

Farmers are encouraged to report the amount of acreage placed in PIK to their crop insurance agent by March 1, the deadline for reporting.

PCIC increases the policy guarantee for wheat, when the PIK acreage is reported. This is done, according to Cranson, to encourage participation in PIK and to reflect the probability that the producer will increase his efforts to maximize yields on the remaining acres.

Farmers, Fishers Must File Tax Return Soon

Certain farmers and commercial fishers must file their 1983 Federal income tax returns and pay any tax due by March 1, 1984, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1982 or 1983 gross income from farming or fishing and did not pay estimated tax by January 17, 1984, (or who paid by that date and underestimated their tax liability) must file their returns and pay all tax due by March 1, 1984, to avoid paying a penalty.

Free IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," Publication 595, "Tax Guide for Commercial Fishermen," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," provide additional information.

To order these publications, the IRS said taxpayers should write the IRS address found in their tax package.
