

His sponsor is the Optimist Club of Manchester. Boys State will be held June 14-19 at Michigan State University in East Lansing.

Ron is a junior at Manchester High School, ranking third in his

class. He has been on the honor roll during all three years in high school and has received academic awards for each of those years. He is a member of the National Honor Society and is the newly elected secretary-treasurer of the student council for next year. Manchester Enterprise January 9, 1868

[From the Tecumseh Record] Manchester, Mich

A recent visit to our sister village of Manchester, has impressed us with the conviction that it is destined at no late day to become a place of considerable importance, in a business point of view. Mr. Goodyear is just completing a three story brick block, which in point of architectural beauty and finish would do credit to much larger towns. It contains on the first floor two beautiful and capacious stores, one hundred feet from front to rear, one of which is being fitted up for our former townsman, Arthur Miller, Esq., who has taken for his partner a Mr. Webb, of Saline, and engaged in a general hardware, tin, and sheet iron business. The other is to be occupied by the Wastell Bros., as a dry goods establishment. On the second floor, there are various offices, and among them that of the Enterprise, Manchester conducted by our old friend Geo. S. Spafford. The third story contains a magnificent public hall, freely proportioned, admirably arranged, well lighted, and comfortably seated with chairs. The Manchesterians may well be excused for manifesting a little pride in their new Hall, and pointing the visitor to it, as an

indication of the business

enterprise and energy of the

But the achievement of which they seem to be proudest, is their new Union School building, which was not commenced until April last, but is now completely finished and occupied from top to bottom. It is constructed of brick, the same size and style of arrangement of our own central building. Well may they be proud of it, for previous to its erection, the facilities offered to the young people of Manchester for a school education, were of the most meager character. It is no wonder that the children, old and young, all attend the Union School. But from what we learned during our brief visit, we are inclined to the opinion that they are carrying the joke a little too far. It is well enough to have all the children go to school. We have no criticism to offer on the propriety of this arrangement. Indeed, we are decidely in favor of making our schools free to all children, regardless of age, size or color. But when in their zeal to make education to everybody and everything, they open the doors of their Union School to the very pigs in the street, we think they manifest an inclination to cut it a little too thick. At least, we are doubtful if such an idea would go down here in our more refined Tecumseh society. We believe in swine, but we don't believe in educating them in the same room,

Thursday morning, May 31st, Manchester Police Department made an effort to track and capture the panther that has been stalking this area for over a week.





were driving along the road between Minneapolis and Red Wing when they came upon a series of 3' 24" signs each with expansion one word on them spaced along the road some two or three hundred feet apart. These signs read "Gas," "Oil," "Restrooms," etc., and ended up at a gas station with a big sign out in front saying "This is the place."

Odell thought about these signs and came up with the idea that this was indeed, a novel and foolproof way of getting the auto driver's attention and so he went out and rustled up some \$200 with which to buy second hand lumber and posts and proceeded to compose, with the help of his sense of humor, the first Burma-Shave signs. The first ones weren't humorous but soon they became poetical and attracted the attention of most every driver on Minnesota highways and Burma-Shave sales began to soar. By 1926 the company set up a sign shop and hired crews to erect their signs which were successful because they were all light hearted and easily remembered. For instance one of the first ones read "He played a sax/had no B.O.,/but his whiskers scratched/ so she let him go." and the one which read "His face was smoothas cool as ice/and Oh Louise/he smelled so nice.'

These signs were placed 100 paces apart on the roadways and boundary fences in groups of five Pacific coasts. By 1930 they had with usually two words to a sign shown up from Canada to the

lady/tried a jar/she's now a/ One day Odell and a compnaion famous/movie star. The signature on all of these ads was, of course, Burma-Shave.

After several years and an which program extended into more than 40 states the supply of jingles dwindled so an annual contest was developed with \$100 paid for every one used. This rejuvenated the Burma-Shave jingle. Some of the contests drew more than fifty thousand entries.

Most of these entries were clean out but now and then one had to be tossed out like the one which read: Bachelor's quarters/ dog on the rug/whiskers to blame/no one to hug; and then the classic among the boy-girl jingles: He had the ring/he had the flat/but she felt his chin/and that was that."

The jingles also contributed to safety campaigns and were awarded many commendations for public service like this one: "Remember this/if you'd be spared/trains don't whistle/ scared." because they're "Hardly a driver/is now alive/who passed on a hill/at 75." "Drove too long/driver snoozing/what happened next/is not amusing." "He saw the train/and tried to duck it/kicked first the gas/and then the bucket." "The midnight ride/Paul for beer/led to a warmer/atmosphere."

By 1929 and an annual budget for them of \$65,000 the first signs had reached the Atlantic and

southern border.

Then several states passed taxes on each sign. In the 1930's many signs near college towns disappeared in the dark of the night and on the rapidly developing highways fewer good locations for signs were available.

Among other fads and fancies which Burma-Shave anticipated was the coupon craze which they anticipated with the verse, "Free offer, free offer/Rip a fender off your car/Mail it in for half pound

In 1963 it was announced that Burma-Shave had been sold to Phillip Morris. The last of the original founders was gone.

The new owners decided to gradually phase out the roadside signs in favor of more modern advertising procedures and so the signs were gradually picked up, a group was given to and accepted by the Smithsonian Museum, and another way of life departed from the face of the earth. But they exist in thousands of memories and as one of the last ones said:

If you don't know Whose signs these are You can't have driven Very far. Farewell the verse along the road How sad to know you're out of mode Burma-Shave.
