## **Chicken Broil Uses Tons Of Supplies**

by Lucy Feldkamp annual Chicken Broil is big, starting with the number of people served, 12,000 to 14,000. That many dinners requires a lot have to make sure there is enough napkins to radishes to potato chips.

Ron Mann, chairman of the supplies committee, is in charge of ordering everything for the Broil except the chickens. That means 5 tons of charcoal for the barbecue pits, 250 pounds of butter to baste the chickens, 12,000-14,000 rolls, 1,000 pounds of radishes, and 68 crates of cabbabe for the coleslaw. Besides all that cabbage, the Broil's secret coleslaw recipe calls for 40 gallons of vegetable oil, 100 pounds of sugar, 24 cans of salt, 18 gallons of vinegar, and 50 pounds of onions, along with pepper, celery seed, and mustard for seasoning. Mann also has to arrange the delivery of 2100 chairs and 200 tables which are rented for the occasion. Then there are all the supplies needed by the 500 to 600 workers themselves: 600 paper caps, 600 pairs of gloves, 500 rented aprons, and 2000 paper cups for the lemonade and iced tea that helps keep the Broil volunteers cool at their hot jobs. That is enough to supply a small army, which is close to what the Chicken Broil

Gene Bentschneider, the overall Everything about Manchester's chairman of the Broil, takes care of ordering the chickens, which come packed on ice in a big semi truck from Morren Poultry, in Galesburg. This year, of supplies, and Broil planners Bentschneider is planning to order 15,000 pounds of chicken. of everything to go around, from The chicken is timed to arrive around noon on Broil day, just when the first charcoal fires are being lighted. About 12:30, the crews carry the first batch of chickens to the pits, so that at 4:00, when the first dinners are served, the meat is thoroughly done, tender and juicy after a long slow roast.

Chicken Broil organizers and the county health department cooperate closely, insuring that all this food is handled and prepared. safely. This involves meetings both before and after the Broil to go over new regulations and possible improvements. The day of the Broil, at least one inspector checks things out, to make sure that everyone is following the

15,000 pounds of chicken is a lot to cook and serve in one day, and each dinner includes potato chips, roll and butter, radishes, coleslaw, and milk or coffee. The Chicken Broil volunteers have worked out a system to handle all this food successfully. The fact that this year's Broil is the 31st running proves that the results of all this labor taste good enough to get people back year after year.

#### People of Manchester Area:

We are all fortunate that the very large black cat that has been seen in our area has exhibited no aggressive tendencies toward humans so far. This does not mean, however, that we can become complacent about its presence. The fact is that it is an extremely dangerous and unpredictable animal--this one perhaps more so because we know nothing about its history.

"Panther" seems to be the most accurate term to describe this size cat. Without closer examination, authorities are not able to identify it more specifically, although most suspect that it is a

There is evidence that the animal is still in the wooded area be for fulfillment of hobby or around Adrian, Furnace, Territorial, Schleweis, and Boetner Roads and points south and east. It has a range of many miles. Panthers are nocturnal, doing their hunting at night and sleeping during the day. This animal has been seen as early as 9

There are some common-sense precautions everyone should

Being a "lazy" hunter, the panther prefers small, helpless creatures. Please watch your children closely.

Although there is an abundance of small game in the area, a favorite food of panthers is dog. No matter how large or fierce your dog is, he cannot protect you--or himself, for that matter-from a panther. We urge you not to walk your dog in the area. especially in the evening.

Watch your dog for peculiar behavior--unusual barking. nervousness, etc. We recommend that you not venture outside to investigate suspicious activity.

Report sightings of the cat or unusual cat screams to the police immediately. Also, report suspicious loss of domestic animals. dogs, cats, chickens, ducks, etc.

The cat prefers to hole up in barns and abandoned buildings. Keep doors closed on all garages and out-buildings at all times. Would-be hunters and the just curious are seriously hampering our efforts to capture the cat. For your own safety, as well as ours, please do not enter the area previously described. tablespoon all purpose flour
