A Promise Kept

On a cold winter day in February, 1982, a contract was signed to purchase a long closed blacksmith shop on East Main Street to be used as a museum and public building for the community. The blacksmith shop was built in 1877 and remained in continuous operation until 1952 when John F. Schneider, the last blacksmith in Manchester retired. John F. Schneider died in 1953, and the blacksmith shop was closed. The original tools were still in the building twenty years later.

It was planned that the old forge would be preserved to demonstrate how the blacksmith trade was conducted in the 19th Century. It was hoped that the curious children of today could enjoy watching a blacksmith labor at the forge much as their grandparents would have many years ago.

Now in September, 1984, over two and a half years later, these plans have come to fruition through the continued and generous support of Manchester Chicken Broil. Through its support over a twoyear period, the Manchester Chicken Broil has made the acquisition and preservation of the John F. Schneider Blacksmith Shop a reality.

At 9:30 a.m., on this past Saturday morning, September 15, 1984, Mr. Ron Mann and Mr. Eugene Bentschneider arrived at the Blacksmith Shop with a check for \$4,100 to be used by the

This brings to over \$12,000 the amount of money that the Manchester Chicken Broil has contributed to the purchase and restoration of the John F. Schneider Blacksmith Shop as an official State of Michigan Historical site, and the only building in the village of Manchester to be so designated with a historical marker affixed to the building.

John B. Swainson, President of the Manchester Area Historical Society, commented; "We are indeed fortunate to have available to us a building dating from 1877, that has not been converted to It remains a another use. blacksmith shop together with a forge and the tools and equipment of a by-gone age. It is the last remaining blacksmith shop on a main street in a village in Michigan and it is right here in Manchester. We deeply appreciate the generous support provided by the Manchester Chicken Broil."

President McKinley's Funeral

MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE September 19, 1901

Seen At Buffalo By A Citizen of Manchester Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 16, 1901

EDITOR ENTERPRISE: - My trip to Buffalo and the sad event at the time will never be wiped from the tablets of my memory. Upon reaching Cleveland on Monday, the general topic was the president's condition, and the fate of his assassin. Everyone was anxious to get the reports and as they reported him on the gain and out of danger, it seemed like taking a burden from their hearts, yet in the big parade of Wednesday I noticed a different spirit than in the great parade at Chicago a year ago.

Thursday morning at 8 o'clock we left Cleveland on the steamer City of Buffalo with 3,000 on board, and a more beautiful day I never spent on the lake. We had

hardly gone 25 miles when one of the engines became disabled and caused us to be three and a half hours late in Buffalo and just in time to catch a severe rain storm while landing. This caused some excitement because on account of the storm street cars were not running near the dock and people had to walk to Main street to take

Friday morning a report was spread that President McKinley was dying, and soon after came one that he was better. In the afternoon in company with a friend I went to Delaware avenue, one of the most beautiful in the city, to get a view of Milburn house, in which the president lay, but ropes were stretched across the streets two blocks from the house each way and police are on guard. No one excepting newspaper reporters and those having business at the house are allowed near. A company of

In an effort to reduce the federal deficit, close up some tax loopholes and make the rules more equitable, Congress enacted the most complex and cumbersome tax act in history. The 1984 Deficit Reduction Act (or Tax Reform Act) is the third major tax act in five years and probably not the last one. Its 1450 pages add tremendous complexity to an already complex system and

affects everyone in some way. Here are just a few of the changes that may affect you. according to the Michigan Association of CPAs.

If you are an investor, you only have to hold an investment for six months (and a day) to qualify for long-term capital gains tax treatment. Only 40 percent of a long-term capital gain is added to your income. For investors in the 50 percent tax bracket, the maximum tax paid is 20 percent of the gain. These new capital gains rules apply to all assets acquired after June 22, 1984.

If you purchased a luxury car for business use after June 18, 1984, you can no longer write-off its full cost using a three-year depreciation formula. Now, the depreciation of all cars will be limited to a \$4,000 deduction in the first year the car is in service and a \$6,000 deduction in all subsequent years.

Divorced people will find that the law tightens a patchwork of rules on property settlements and alimony payments. The new language also dispels some confusion surrounding employee fringe benefits.

Real estate investors must now depreciate property over 18 years instead of 15, which allows smaller deductions over longer periods.

The tax on a gallon of diesel fuel went from nine to 15 cents a gallon as of August 1. The tax on To Begin distilled spirits goes up \$2, to \$12.50 a gallon, on October 1. And the Act puts a bite on sport fishermen who must pay a 10 percent excise tax on an expanded list of fishing gear beginning October 1.

Additionally, to write-off up to percent of the time or less for business must be written-off under a 12-year depreciation formula, and will not qualify for an investment tax credit.

Not all the changes in the tax law hurt: some breaks are offered. For instance, if you drive a car for charitable reasons, such as picking up clothing for a local charity, you can deduct 12 cents a mile beginning in 1985 instead of nine cents a mile. So, if you drive 5,000 miles for your local charity, you will be eligible for an additional \$150 deduction.

Another change in the tax law,

brought about by changing patterns in the way Americans receive medical treatment, affects medical deductions. Specifically, the new law allows you to travel to an outpatient clinic, such as the Mayo Clinic, and deduct as much hotel for the period of treatment. The program is free, but preregistration is requested at Can You Pass The Test?

A Construction zone can be dangerous-both on the road and on a test.

And if you know the speed limit in a highway construction zone is 45 miles an hour and that alcohol is involved in more than 50 percent of fatal highway crashes. you should be able to get through any construction zone—and test safely.

But, if you don't know that a small amount of alcohol affects the judgment of most people, or that you are most likely to see a pedestrian crossing sign near an intersection, you could make a couple of wrong moves-both on the road and on a test.

According to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin. these four questions are the most missed on the 15-question, multiple choice license each year.

The most controversial question on the test asks about the effects alcohol on judgment. The proper answer is that alcohol affects the judgment of most However, many individuals who do not use alcohol complain that they have no way of knowing this. The Department continues to ask this question with the rationale that everyone should know alcohol can affect the judgment of another driver.

Austin said that the test questions are frequently changed to reflect changes in driving and the law. One new question involves use of infant restraints. The law, effective April 1, 1982, requires all children under four must be carried in safety seats, but children between one and four carried in the back seat may be secured with a safety belt.

To help prepare drivers for their renewal test, the Department of State sends a pamphlet entitled, "What Every Driver Must Know to Renew a License," with the license renewal applications. License renewal applications are sent 45 days before expiration.

Michigan has approximately 6.2 million licensed drivers. Most driver licenses expire every four vears.







Seventy of Manchester's oungest students started the school year right along with their older brothers and sisters this month as Manchester Cooperative Preschool opened its doors for the twentieth consecutive year.

The idea for the school began in 1963 when a small group of Manchester mothers decided they wanted a preschool program here for their own children. Classes first began in January of 1964 with a total membership of just five children.

Now enrollment averages round seventy children, who attend one of five classes for two and one-half to four-year-olds held in the Emanuel Church basement. The school employs two certified teachers-Mrs. Karen Meyer and Mrs. Eloise Kemner. scholarship program is available for families who are unable to

meet the tuition fee. A cooperative preschool can't be successful without parents willing

to volunteer time and effort to keep outside costs down. Parents work as teacher's assistants once or twice each month. bring snacks, do laundry, prepare educational materials, buy supplies-even clean the nursery fish tank.

All classes for the 1984-85 academic year are full now, but anyone with general questions about the program can call Sara Laskowski, President of Manchester Cooperative Preschool at 428-7355.




