The location of these shops is on the east side of the river, the iron work and painting being done on Water street.

normal load. This will make it easier for the existing coals to ignite the added wood quickly thus reducing the amount of unburned, creosote forming gases going up the chimney.

-Use a small number of large diameter logs when refilling your stove. Using large pieces means there will be less wood surface exposed to supply the fires combustible gases.

-It is best to use air dried wood: however, burning wood with a higher moisture content doesn't automatically mean a faster creosote build-up. Test results have shown that when the air inlet is opened up after the wood is added and then closed down to the desirable level after the fire is well established, the creosote build-up will be no greater than with air dried wood.

-Good woodburning practices will decrease the amount of creosote buildup in your chimney but this doesn't mean you can forget about cleaning the chimney. Inspect the chimney regularly, establish a cleaning schedule, and you will decrease the chance of a chimney fire.

# Manchester Schools On Mainstreet


