Manchester School Superintendent Resigns

The Board of Education of the Manchester Public Schools has accepted the resignation of Dr. Eugene Thompson as Superintendent effective 2-14-86. The resignation is a result of differences of opinion regarding the operation of the school district between Dr. Thompson and several school board members. Attempts to reconcile differences have not successful.

Dr. Thompson has chosen to resign rather than have these personal differences interfere with the effective operation of the school district. The school board wishes to emphasize that this action in no way reflects on Dr. administrative Thompson's abilities or dedication to his position.





Department of Corrections Report

State Corrections Director Robert Brown, Jr. today issued a report which concluded that at least \$74 million dollars would be needed annually to comply with many recommendations of the House Corrections Committee.

The report, prepared by the Department Corrections, said at least 1,732 new prison beds, or the equivalent of about three new prisons, and \$36 million in capital outlay also would be needed.

The estimates are in response to recommendations made late in 1985 by the House committee, which had investigated the department's release policies and practices.

"The purpose of our response is simply to give Michigan lawmakers and citizens information on the costs and consequences of these recommendations, so far as these can be anticipated. Once law makers have this information they will be able to determine whether such changes are in one best interest of the state," said

Brown said the department was unable to provide information on the financial impact of some of the House recommendations because the full implication of some recommendations is not yet known. He cited, as examples, the House committee's recommendation that all prisoners participate in the department's haifway house program for the last one-third of their sentences not to exceed one year, and the recommendation that sentencing guidelines be enacted that would eliminate the

Parole Board. Brown said the mandatory participation in the half-way house program would require several changes in state law, one of which would require prisoners serving for sex crimes to go into the program, something not permitted now. In reacting to this recommendation, Brown said, "It appears to us that the most serious impact of this recommendation would be a strong and predictable reaction from law enforcement officials and citizens of local communities to the fact that persons placed in community residential programs would no longer be screened in any way." He said such a policy might

"Only Lunatic Fringe Vote **Against Seat** Belts"

The American Association for Automotive Medicine (AAAM), praised the British Parliament's recent decision to make the national seat belt law permanent percent. three years.

The House of Commons met recently to debate the issue and voted overwhelmingly (217 to 25) to retain the law. The House of Lords had approved the measure

by a 2 to 1 margin a week earlier. Since the British law was originally passed, seat belt use has risen to over 90 percent, and has resulted in a 23 percent reduction in deaths and 26 percent fewer serious injuries from vehicles crashes.

George Robertson, member of Parliament (M.P.), described the law as "the most successful road safety message Britain has ever Robertson reported that the law has saved "at least 130 million pounds" in medical costs. During further testimony,

Austin Mitchell, M.P., said that "the only arguments that have advanced against the proposal have been made by the provisional wing of the lunatic fringe of the Libertarian lobby." He went on to add, "Thanks to the three-year trial period, 1,000 people who would be dead if we had not made seat belt wearing compulsory are alive today ... and some 18,000 serious injuries have been avoided....

When reviewing the evidence to support the retention of the law by the British Parliament, voted to hold Annual Meeting on Barry Sheerman, M.P., said, other authority, including...London University, the British Medical Association, the Royal College of Surgeons, and everyone who has monitored the situation agree."

Elaine Petrucelli, executive director of the AAAM, hoped that acceptance of American seat belt laws would be as widespread as in Britain. "The fledging laws in the first seventeen states here can have the same impact in reducing serious and fatal injuries if we can get people to comply like the

State's Top Young Swimmers To Compete



Sulfite Regulation Extended

emergency regulation, due to expire on February 3, has been extended by Governor James J. Blanchard for an additional six months. The regulation was requested by the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) last July, in response to tests conducted by the department's laboratory. which found detectable amounts of more than 10 parts per million (ppm) of sulfites in samples of ome products.

The regulation clarifies the authority of MDA's Food Division to require that placards be

displayed on bulk products containing certain amounts of sulfiting agents. Michigan already has a labeling law requiring that ingredients, including additives, contained in processed food products be listed on the container label.

Sulfiting agents are additives used to prevent spoilage and browning of foods. In the past few years, there have been reports of hypersensitive reactions, primarily among asthmatics, after consuming food containing sulfites, and several deaths have been linked to the consumption of sulfite-treated


Since the emergency regulation was filed, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has announced three additional deaths attributed to a sulfite reaction, and has proposed to ban the application of sulfites to fresh fruits and vegetables, excluding potatoes.

MDA's Food Division is currently working with industry representatives to draft a permanent regulation. The department's laboratory will continue to routinely sample products for sulfite content.
