





#### **Boy Dies**

November 19, 1868 It becomes our duty to record a sad accident, which cast a gloom over the village on Saturday last. Bertie Doty, a frank, generous and open-hearted lad, born and raised in this village, a son of Geo. W. Doty, and about twelve years of age. joined his companions in their Saturday or Holiday sports. It appears they proceeded to the cider-mill where they enjoyed themselves a short time and proceeded, with a son of Mr. Pulemus, to his residence. Bertie proposed they should go to East Manchester and meet the freight train from the south. The engineer slacked speed, as usual. to cross the bridge, and Bertie succeeded in boarding the train, and laughed at his companions, who were obliged to walk home. The train arrived and was switching a car, and Bertie was jumping from the top of one car to another, not being aware that the train was broken, he precitated at the break. The breaksman saw the falling boy and endeavored to catch him, but failed, and the wheels passed over the body, severed one leg and shocklingly mangled the other. He freed his body from the track and conversed rationally with those who went to his assistance. His father was apprised of the accident and soon arrived to see his unfortunate boy. He spoke his name, "Bertie," and as soon as the downed Memphis 15-9, 15-4. The boy saw his father he exclaimed,

"O. Pa. will you forgive me." Kind friends prepared a stretcher and conveyed him home. Dr. Selfe was called, and the engine brought Dr. Chittock from Jackson, but they could give consolation to the bereaved parents. He retained his senses and asked forgiveness of his mother. He lingered until 7 o'clock, entirely free from pain, and expired in a sweet sleep. Everyone feel that they have lost a young, but noble friend, and deeply sympathise with his parents. The funeral sermon was preached at the M.E. Church, by Rev. J.C. Wortley. A large procession of citizens paid a last

#### **Proper Snow Shoveling Can Reduce Back Pain And Injury**

Have you ever heaved a shovel full of wet snow only to suddenly feel a stabbing pain in the back? A heaping shovel of snow improperly lifted can exert an

estimated 100 to 200 pounds of additional pressure on the vital lumbosacral disc, leading to possible excruciating lowback pain and sciatica. The disc - the lowest one in the spinal column -- carries most of the body's weight and is often the primary site of disc protrusion.

This winter incorrect shoveling practices will again cause pain and injury to the low back and limbs, warns Stanley Gilbert, D.C. of Manchester Chiropractic Clinic.

To help avoid or aggravate back and limb pain this winter, Gilbert recommends these 10 safety tips:

- 1. Don't shovel if you've had serious spinal, lung or cardiovascular conditions or are older and out of shape.
- 2. Do simple warm up exercises first to limber up. 3. Dress warmly; wear an extra-long garment to protect the
- low-back muscles from cold air. 4. Always stand erect and bend from the knees, not from
- the waist; handle small-to-moderate loads at a time.
- 5. Push rather than lift the snow where possible; deposit it close by instead of twisting and throwing it over a wide area. 6. Use your arms, legs, feet and thighs in a smooth, co-
- ordinated motion to deposit the snow near you. 7. Change grip and stance often to avoid overusing the
- stronger side of your body.
- 9. Don't shovel in extremely frigid weather.

10. If your health is a risk factor, don't take a chance; ask your neighborhood youngsters to shovel for you.

Lifting a heaping shovel of snow without bending the knees can be a major factor in contributing to severe stress in the spine, cautions Dr. Gilbert. A shovel of wet snow weighing 10 to 15 pounds held in front of the body can increase the pressure on the lumbosacral disc by 15 times the weight lifted, he added.

Other causes of shoveling-related pain and injury are lifting and throwing too much snow at a time, twisting and bending from the waist and overexertion, according to Dr. Gilbert.

In addition to low- and upper-back pain, poor shoveling techniques can trigger sciatica (a shooting pain and sensation in the leg), and brachial neuralgia (a burning, tingling, numbness or pain down the neck, shoulder and arm.)

The heart also handles a big load while shoveling. Exertion and frigid air can put a burden on the cardiovascular system.

#### An Average Farmer

There is no way to describe an average farmer any more than vou can describe an average doctor, lawyer, school teacher. welder or minister. The Lord made us all equal, but most folks don't stay that way. There are good and bad, weak and strong. smart and not-so-smart folks in all professions.

However, someone has taken all the farms in this country and divided them into all the agricultural production acreage farmed and come up with these figures for an "average" farmer.

Farms divided into acreage comes up with an average farm of 438 acres. Assuming this acreage had just the proper amounts of sunshine and rain in a year, it would produce about 60 tons of hay, 50 tons of feed corn, 41 tons of silage corn and 31 tons of wheat. Most of the hay and corn would be used to feed the livestock. The wheat would be used primarily for milling into flour to provide us with bread, pastries and other bakery goods.

The 438 acres would also raise 20 tons of soybeans, 12 tons of sugarcane, 9 tons of sugarbeets, 12 tons of fruit and 9 tons of

During the past year, I've written a number of columns aimed at improving the health of older Americans. All of the columns have carried a common, important theme: Older people can do many things to maintain or im-

More than 49 million people in this country are 55 or older. In the next four decades, that number is expected to more than double. While most older Americans consider themselves to be in good health, nearly 80 percent have at least one chronic health condition, such as heart disease, diabetes or arthritis. The good news for older adults

which I hope my columns have been spreading, is that older people can prevent or better manage chronic health conditions by adopting healthier lifestyles. To benefit, all you have to do is follow some simple, healthy habits, like eating right, exercising regularly, quitting smoking, using medicines safely and preventing injuries. Let's review some of the key points of these important behaviors. Eating Right. Eating nutritious, well-

balanced meals can lower your risk of cancer, heart disease and other chronic conditions. It can help you reach and maintain your proper weight and help you look and feel better. Eat a variety of healthy foods-fresh fruits, and vegetables, low-fat dairy products, wholegrain breads and cereals and lean meats. Remember, too, that calcium is important for strong bones and fiber is needed for healthy digestive tracts.

Exercise Regularly. No matter what age you are or what shape you're in, there's an exercise that's right for you. Regular exercise can improve your mental health and physical appearance. It may also help you sleep better and make it easier for you to lose weight. Vigorous, regular exercise appears to have a overall cardiovascular health. There is better life.

also some evidence that it helps reduce high blood pressure, stress and strokes. A recent study, however, found that many older people believe there is no

need for them to exercise and that exercise can even prove harmful. The fact is that exercise, if done properly, benefits older people just as it does other age groups.

Quit Smoking. It's never too late to quit. New research shows that no matter what your age, or no matter how long you've been smoking, if you stop now, you'll reduce your risk of cancer, chronic bronchitis, emphysema and even heart attacks.

The evidence is overwhelming. A recent study showed that the effects of smoking are at least partly reversible within one to five years of quittingeven among people who have smoked for decades. Another revealed a decline in the death rate for men over the age of 50 who stopped smoking. Quitting smoking is not easy and many people may need a program to help them quit, but more than 35 million Americans have done it. And there are more good reasons to quit every day.

Use Medicines Safely. Medicines can ease pain and discomfort and improve the way you feel. They can help speed recovery when you're ill. But medicines work only when used as directed and when coordinated properly with what you eat and drink and the other drugs you take. Because older people generally take more medicines than other problems complying with their medicine schedules. Make sure you, your doctor and your pharmacist know as much as possible about all the different medications—prescription and nonprescription—that you take.

Prevent Injuries. As people get older ries. Many injuries can be prevented by practicing proper safety habits and maintaining good physical health. The Centers for Disease Control estimate ventable. The most common causes of related accidents and burns. Safetyquate lighting and removing obstacles that might cause a fall. Install devices like handrails, grab bars and nonskid rugs. Be careful when cooking to avoid burns. Drive during the time of day when you feel most confident, with your safety belt fastened.




