Local Residents Concerned About Dirt Bike Racing

On March 25th, the Manchester Township Board met to discuss the request of the Huron Valley Night Hawks (HVNH) for nineteen dirt bike races this year at their track at the south end of Sharon Hollow Road near U.S. 12. The HVNH was asked to reduce that number and return to the Board at a later date.

The HVNH comes to the Board every year to get permits for its races. Recently they have held about a half dozen races per year. Last year they held nine, though they had already had three races before meeting with the Board for their approval. This year they had one race, one of their biggest, before meeting with the Board.

Originally the HVNH was a private club. They are now part the Midwest Racing Association which sanctions most of the proposed races. These races are open to all MRA members in Michigan and neighboring states.

Local residents have been disturbed by the increased activity at the track, including loudspeakers playing music into Court House, Adrian, Michigan.

the early morning hours. Complaints to the township have brought no satisfaction. There is concern that the township and the HVNH do not understand how much disturbance these events create for scores of local residents.

For this reason a meeting was held on April 5th, to discuss what could be done to limit the noise and number of events. Information presented at the meeting showed there are not clear guidelines for the township to determine the number and size of events. The township noise ordinance appears to apply to the HVNH yet is not being enforced.

New England Clam Chowder

2 cans (6 1/2 oz. each) chopped clams

4 slices bacon, diced

1 medium onion, chopped (about 2/3 cup)

3 cups diced peeled potatoes

2 tablespoons Argo or Kingsford's corn starch 1 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1 1/2 cups heavy cream

1 1/2 cups milk

1/8 teaspoon hot pepper sauce or to taste

Drain clams; reserve liquid. Add enough additional clam juice or water to measure 2 cups. In 4-quart saucepot cook bacon until crisp. Remove bacon; drain on paper towels. Add onion to bacon drippings; saute 2 to 3 minutes or until tender. Stir in reserved clam liquid and potatoes. Cover and cook 10 to 15 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Stir corn starch, salt and pepper. Gradually stir in cream and milk until smooth. Stir into saucepot. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over mediumlow heat and boil 1 minute. Add clams and hot pepper sauce. Stirring occasionally, cook until heated through. Sprinkle bacon over chowder. Makes about 7 cups.

ORDINANCE No. 159 VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USE OF ALCOHOL AND DRUGS BY MINORS IN THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER.

WHEREAS, the Manchester Village Council finds that the unregulated use of alcohol and drugs by minors creates social problems in many communities throughout the United States, including the Village of Manchester; and

WHEREAS, the use of alcohol and drugs by minors can have devastating effects on not only the minors, but on the public at large, including, but not limited to, injuries and death caused by vehicles operated by persons under the influence of alcoholic beverages or drugs; and

WHEREAS, the Manchester Village Council further finds that persons who own, possess, or control premises in the Village of Manchester could significantly alleviate such alcohol and drug caused problems by assuming responsibility for the consumption or use of alcohol or drugs by minors on their premises.

NOW THEREFORE:

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS

Alcoholic Beverage: Alcoholic beverage is hereby defined as any beverage containing more than ½ of 1% of alcohol by weight. The percentage of alcohol by weight shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of Michigan Compiled Laws, Section 436.2, as the same may be amended

Control: Control is hereby defined as any form of regulation or dominion including a possessory or manage-

Drug: Drug is hereby defined as a controlled substance as defined now or hereafter by the Public Acts of the State of Michigan. Currently, such controlled substances are defined by Act No. 196 of the Public Acts of 1971, as amended, being Sections 335,301 to 335,367 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

Minor: Minor is hereby defined as a person not legally permitted by reason of age to possess alcoholic beverages pursuant to Michigan Compiled Laws, Section 436.33b, as the same may be amended from time to time.

SECTION 2. EXCEPTIONS

The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to a person related to a minor as a parent or guardian, or to a person placed in the position of a parent by a parent or guardian of the minor, or to legally protected religious observances, educational activities, or medical treatments.

SECTION 3. A person who has the ownership, possession, or control of any premises in the Village of Manchester and who permits the consumption or use of alcoholic beverages or drugs in any form by any minor on said premises, or who fails to make diligent inquiry as to whether such person is a minor, is guilty of a misdemeanor. In an action for violation of this section, proof that the defendant demanded and was shown, before permitting such minor to consume such alcoholic beverages, a motor vehicle operators license, or other bona fide documentary evidence that such person is not a minor, shall be a defense to an action under this section.

SECTION 4. A person who has the ownership, possession, or control of any premises in the Village of Manchester and who stores or displays, or allows to be stored or displayed, alcoholic beverages or drugs in any form on said premises shall take reasonable steps to prevent any minor on said premises from obtaining possession of such alcoholic beverages or drugs for any purpose whatsoever, and any such person who fails to take such reasonable steps shall be guil of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 5. PENALTY

The penalties for violation of this ordinance shall be as

A. For the first violation, a fine not exceeding \$300.00 or imprisonment in the county jail for a term not to exceed 30 days or by both such fine and imprisonment, and required attendance at a court approved substance abuse program at the expense of the defendant.

B. For subsequent violations, a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or imprisonment in the county jail for a term not to exceed 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment, and required attendance at a court approved substance abuse program at the expense of the defendant.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY

If any portion of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be found to be invalid by a court, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid portion or application, providing such remaining portions are not determined by the court to be inoperable, and to this and this ordinance is declared to be severable.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be published in the manner required by law and shall become effective 30 days after the date of publication. ADOPTION DATE: April 6, 1987
