For the uninitiated, your home equity is the appraised market value of your house less the amount of any outstanding mortgages. A home equity loan, then, is basically a loan or line of credit, secured by a mortgage on your home. You may use a home equity loan for any purpose - to 1990. Generally, lenders will allow you to borrow from 75 percent to consumer credit more expensive. 80 percent of your equity. Once your loan is approved, you can borrow against your line of credit by writing a check or presenting a special credit card. You can borrow as often as you like, as long as you don't go over your credit limit. Interest is charged only on the amount borrowed.

But why, you ask, has the home equity loan suddenly taken on a new importance as a financing tool? Easy...Since this kind of borrowing is secured by your home, the interest you pay is fully deductible, as opposed to consumer credit interest which is only partially deductible. So an equity loan can provide substantial amounts of low cost, tax-deductible credit. The new tax law allows you to deduct, as mortgage interest expense, any interest paid on home equity loans up to the original purchase price

of your house less the amount you owe on your mortgage, plus the cost of all improvements you have made. In mathematical terms: MORTGAGE BALANCE +

HOME IMPROVEMENT COSTS = AMOUNT OF ADDITIONAL WOULD BE

An example: If you bought your house for \$100,000, have a mortgage balance of \$70,000 and made \$10,000 worth of improvements, you would be able to deduct the interest payments on a home equity loan of up to \$40,000.

Put another way, you may deduct all of the interest paid on your mortgage and your equity loan, provided that the total amount owed doesn't exceed the purchase price of your home plus the cost of improvements made. Note: The tax treatment for

amounts borrowed above these limits is dependent on how the proceeds are used. If the amount is used for medical or educational expenses, the interest cost are

fully deductible. It is important to keep in mind that, since you're borrowing against the equity in your home, you run the risk of losing your nome if you cannot repay. But if you're confident that you are borrowing within your means and can meet the lender's repayment schedule, a home equity loan can

be a wise choice. Keep in mind that at some point in the future, Congress may change the rules on home equity line of credit tax deductiblity.

CPAs advise that there are many variables to be considered and factors to be weighed in deciding how you might best finance your debt. Because everyone's borrowing needs and circumstances are different, you might want to consider getting

Put very simply, personal financial planning is a process in which a person takes financial control of his or her life. Instead of drifting along, making a financial decision here and there along the way, a person with a financial plan becomes educated about finances and able to focus and take control of the financial aspects of his life.

Although the financial planning process has many components and involves many steps, it may be thought of in terms of three simple questions.

Where do I [or we] stand now? Where do I want to go? How am I going to get there? If you think of

While the actual planning process is unique for each individual, the elements are standard. The first step involves the gathering of all relevant financial data which provides the background for the process.

Next, the financial planner will work with you to identify your financial goals and objectives. This decision must be well the foundation upon which your plan is formulated. Do you need to plan for your children's college education? Are you concerned about your retirement income?

After an analysis of your financial data, your attitudes toward money, and your goals and objectives, the financial planner is in a position to develop recommendations on how you can accomplish your financial goals.

Once the financial plan is complete and agreed to by all parties involved, it is time to coordinate the implementation of the plan. Together, you and your financial planner can determine who should execute the various recommendations in your plan. If your plan calls for more life insurance, an agent can be contacted, while a securities broker may be called upon to help select recommended investments. If your will needs to be updated, an attorney may be required.

Next, you'll want to give serious thought to the payment arrangement you will feel most comfortable with. There are basically three ways financial planners charge: fee-only. commission-only and fee-plus-

Commission-only planners produce a plan free of charge but collect a sales commission on many of the products they recommend you but, with this method you may never feel quite certain whether the suggested recommendations are in the best interests of you or the planner.

On the other hand, fee-only planners, such as CPAs, charge may be the most objective since they charge a flat fee usually based on an hourly rate and receive no commissions.

A hybrid, the fee-plus-commission planner charges a set amount commission some or all of the products the plan recommends.





Michigan has always been a favorite resort for birds, or was up to about 40 years ago, when not only our people but poachers from other states came here and made havoc in the roosting and nesting places of pigeons, prairie chickens and other game birds. completely annihilating the pigeons and perhaps would have wiped out other birds had not our legislature seen the wisdom of enacting protective laws before it was too late.

Those who have made a study of migratory birds declare that there is a gradual increase in the number of birds in the state during the past 10 years or more.

Approximately 100 varieties of birds are common in Michigan. the greater number of them being according to James Smith of half are some species of warblers. The list does not include countless other varieties that come here but numbers of which are so small as

Mr. Smith announces himself as a friend of all birds because of their economic value to the farmer directly and to the city dweller indirectly. He estimates that each bird of certain varieties, chiefly the martins and swallows, destroy as many as 2,000 insects to them. daily as they are almost harmful worms and hugs daily, he

has learned through personal observation. "When one considers the rapidity with which insects multiply the value of the birds in killing the adult pests and thus apparent,"

keeping down the numbers ornithologist said. "The world would become untenable for humans because of the insects if it were not for the work of the birds." Mr. Smith is a friend of the English sparrow and declares that he does much good in

We are glad to see the great increase in bob-whites, or quail, in Michigan. They are particularly plentiful in this section. An attempt has been made to increase the number of pheasants. They are a beautiful bird but hunters can't seem to resist the temptation to shoot them when an

opportunity presents itself. Among the birds living in Michigan throughout the year are: Quail, ruffled grouse. blue-jays, meadow larks, flickers, downy and hairy woodpeckers, song sparrows, goldfinches, chikadees. Some of them remain hidden during the winter.

Some hardy birds that spend the summer far north and come here during the winter are tree and white-throated sparrows, pine grosbeak, crossbills, creepers; but some of these do not visit the

lower peninsula of Michigan. Many birds that migrate as far as South America to spend the winter are lost when crossing the Gulf of Mexico on their return in the spring. The winds carry them far out of their course and sweep them into the sea. But scores of birds go no farther than the southern states and some change their plumage so that they are scarcely reconized by northern people wintering there. We have heard several mention this fact.

Everybody should be a friend of the birds, but the farmers should protect them as much as possible, as they surely are a great benefit
