misunderstanding exists in regard to the terms "approved" schools and "accredited" schools. Approved schools are schools approved by the department of public instruction for the acceptance of tuition pupils paid by their home districts. Such schools become approved by favorable reports made by state inspectors who approve of the buildings, course of study and quality of instruction. Such schools must have two qualified teachers devoting their entire time to the 9th, 10th, 11th

and 12th grades.
An accredited school must be reported on favorably by an

The term "Smith-Hughes school" is not generally understood, it would seem. By an act of the federal congress an amount of money aggregating \$3,000,000 was made available to the 48 states for instruction in agriculture, the industrial arts, and home economics. Again certain requirements as to buildings, laboratory and library facilities, as well as the quality and mehtod of instruction and type of administration are demanded. The number of this type of schools will ever be limited by the amount of money available, it being the object of the state administration to keep this amount per school not lower than about \$1,000.

Michigan now has about 110 of the Smith-Hughes schools in operation. Of this number 82 are receiving federal aid. This is an average of one school for each county of the state. Washtenaw county has three of these schools: Ypsilanti, Milan and Manchester.

"Opinion"

It all started last year in Brighton.

Somebody sued the City of Brighton over an injury resulting from the 4th of July fireworks celebration.

Manchester Township reacted to the Brighton incident by refusing fire protection and manpower to set off our fireworks unless the sponsoring organization produced a \$5 million liability insurance policy a demand which is not only too costly at \$2,000, but which is not available. A \$500,000 policy was purchased last year and the Men's Club offered a \$1 million policy for 1987, but the Township stood firm.

So the buck passed to the Village Council, who checked with the village attorney (in Chelsea). The village attorney agreed that \$5 million was minimal protection. In fact, that probably wouldn't even be

The Council agreed with the Township that fireworks just shouldn't be held this year and refused to have them in Carr Park without the \$5 million policy.

Fireworks do certainly carry a certain amount of risk. It is probably right in there with taking a bath, crossing the street or eating sushi.

Lawsuit fever seems to affect more people every day. Fear of being sued leads to exorbitant fees, shortages of some medical services and cancellations of some public events that are meaningful and an important part of our lives.

The fireworks aren't the only events in Manchester that may suffer from increased demands for insurance coverage. The Chicken Broil has potential for at least as much disaster as fireworks produce. And what about the Fair, with its carnival rides, the Street Fair with the beer tent and potential for resultant drunk driving? What about the beer tent that is planned for whatever is left of our 4th of July celebration? All these things probably have more potential for disaster than a well-planned and carefully monitored fireworks display.

It seems that Manchester has taken the safe route. But when do the benefits outweigh the risks? If we are to cover ourselves with layers of protection by taking away entertaining events that bring more people in to appreciate our village, how can we justify presenting ourselves as a progressive community? When our local governments take away one of the few events that we all look forward to how can we expect increases in local taxes to be accepted without a fight?

When a community loses something like the fireworks, it loses something more. When the local governments shy away from any risks they begin to lose credibility. You can't build a community by taking parts of it away. When the fireworks, the Chicken Broil, the Fair, Street Fair and all the ice cream socials are gone, what do our local governments plan to replace them with? Have they offered the Men's Club any alternatives? It is easier to just say no. The alternatives they have left to you and me, and there is precious little time to look into

We have been told that fireworks can probably still be purchased. and that there are people here willing to set them off. We have also been told that nobody went to the Village Council meeting June 1, to summer reading program at their protest the cancellation. Should we just lose this event in the year of local participating public library. the 150th anniversary of our statehood? Or should we tell our Most programs begin in June. government, elected by us and working in our interests, that we want fireworks this year?

The Village Council works for you. Talk to them - John Hinkley, Ted Tapping, Terry Harris, Don Limpert, Wendell Reinhardt or Joe Marshall. They're almost all in the telephone book. If you want fireworks, tell them. If you can think of anything that would replace them in our 4th of July celebration, tell them that, too.







Michigan's mild spring weather should help propel camping activity to even greater heights than in 1986 when 40 percent of the state's private campgrounds established revenue records,

reports AAA Michigan. State park reservations are 18 percent above last year while advance bookings at private facilities also are up through the first quarter of 1987.

AAA Michigan's 1987 private campground guide includes 388 facilities which have between 30 and 2.400 sites. Most of the 39,871 campsites listed have direct access to a pool or a lake and nearly all facilities accept telephone reservations.

The average daily cost for campsite with electricity is \$9.51 84 cents higher than last year. Daily prices run from \$2 for electricity-only sites to \$20 for sites offering such amenities as showers, flush toilets, trailer sanitation disposals and at-site

Approximately 60 percent of all Michigan campsites are in private

Seventy of the 89 state parks offer camping, with 14,423 campsites available, a slight

the spaces at each facility are available for campers on a firstcome, first-serve basis. The minimum number of nights needed to reserve a campsite is two in the Lower Peninsula and

Nightly state park fees, unchanged from last year, are: \$8 for a site with electricity; \$6, semi-modern site; \$4, rustic site; \$4 reservation fee; \$2 daily park entrance; and a \$10 annual park

Michigan **Department Of Transportation**

Michigan Air Travel Soars To New Record

The volume of travel on scheduled airlines serving Michigan moved up sharply in 1986 for the fourth straight year and set a new record, the Michigan Department Transportation (MDOT) reports.

State Transportation Director James P. Pitz said 1987 should be another year of growth for the State of Michigan as a whole.

Boarding and de-planing passengers at Michigan's 23 airports with scheduled air serivce totaled 20.3 million during 1986. Passenger volumes were up 11.5 percent over the 18.2 million total in 1985, the previous high. the state of Michigan.

"Reports in the first three airports," Pitz said.

The five busiest airports at Kupecky's. accounted for 96.1 percent of the are Detroit Metropolitan, with 84.1 percent of total traffic; Kent County International at Grand Rapids, 6.1 percent; Capital City at Lansing, 1.9 percent; Tri-County near Saginaw, 2 Kalamazoo percent. Municipal, 2 percent.

"This trend has generally been observed throughout Country," Pitz said. "As one of tl: impacts of air service deregulation, the larger, busier airports are handling a larger share of the market and smaller airports are experiencing a decline in service and passenger levels."

"This is especially true at Detroit Metropolitan Airport which set an all-time record of 18 million total passengers in 1986.

"Much of the increase stems from three main factors-Detroit was designated and is utilized as a hub by Northwest Airlines; the economic climate has improved in Michigan; and there is the tendency of many residents in lower Michigan to use the Detroit airport rather than use their local

> Two other findings of this statistical evaluation are:

-Eleven of the airports showed increases in 1986 over 1985, while twelve suffered decreases.

-The airports showing the largest increases in 1986 over 1985 were Ironwood (28 percent), Detroit Metropolitan (13.0 and Pellston (12.9 percent)

SesquiTrain '87 Travels 150 Miles In 13 Days

Led by a prairie schooner replica, a nearly three-mile-long horse-powered SesquiTrain will travel 150 miles through Southern Michigan during a 13-day celebration in mid-June, reports AAA Michigan.

Nearly 100 wagons, carriages and coaches representing Michigan, Iowa, Indiana, Georgia, Ohio and Canada will travel about four miles per hour, giving spectators an opportunity to see how settlers traveled Michigan.

SesquiTrain '87 will begin its loop trip in Lansing June 15. It will camp at Charlotte, June 15; Olivet, June 16; Marshall, June 17; Albion, June 18; Jackson, June 19-21: Munith, June 22; Pinckney, June 23; Brighton, June 24; Fowlerville, June 25; Williamston, June 26; and returns to the state capital June 27.

Sponsored by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, the train will be accompained by more than 136 outriders and Pony Express teams. Nearly 500 persons and 365 horses will be part of the train.

Participants may join the train at any time and stay as long as they wish. There is no fee, but advance registration is required Sesquicentennial 517-482-1987.

Spectators cannot ride in the train, but they can talk to the participants when the train stops or watch it as it travels. When the train makes camp, spectators can get a close-up look at the wagons, including the prairie

built by an Arkansas carriagemaker in the early 1970s. It represented Michigan in the 1976 Bicentennial Wagon Train Pilgrimage to Valley Forge and is on loan from the Michigan State Historical Museum where it has been on display since 1980.

At each encampment in host towns, a group of local youths will perform "Make Mine Michigan," a musical history of the state written by two music teachers. Local entertainment will follow.

While in Charlotte, the Mini-Theatre of Charlotte will perform "Sesqui-What?," a spoof of the state's 150th year of statehood, followed by square dancing and a western sing-a-long.

For children, the Girl Scout troop at Parkview School will have a display of pioneer life at Kardel all at the fairgrounds, where the train will set up camp.

A chicken dinner will be served by the Lions Club, and the Future Farmers of America will provide breakfast before the train leaves in the morning.

Pigs donated by area farmers will be roasted to feed the wagon train participants at the Starr Commonwealth Schools in Albion.

When the train enters Albion, it will be greeted by an equestrian team which will escort the wagons to the campground site behind Albion Senior High School. Local church groups will provide breakfast and dinner for the wagon train while in Albion.

Build Manchester

For the past 33 years money from the annual Charcoal Chicken Broil has helped renew and improve the village. By its 30th year, in 1983, funds raised by the Chicken Broil totaled more than \$110,000.

The service groups involved in the planning of the Broil have financed projects mostly for the youth in Manchester, putting lights on the playing fields, purchasing and improving the parks and recreational facilities.


