
Well there was some reconnoitering while Jack Cathey held him in conversation and Phil finally "pinched" him fair enough and he was in due form placed in the village bastile.



State Rep. Margaret O'Connor voted against the key bill in the Governor's tax shift package "because it is part of an illadvised plan to increase taxes on many individuals and businesses to pay for taken property tax credits for some homeowners."

The bill, House Bill 4613, would provide a maximum of \$100 to homeowners with household income of less than \$50,000. It would raise taxes on retirees, lottery winners, members of the armed forces, financial institutions, utilities and Michigan-based insurance companies. It was passed by the House on a vote of

Against Bill

"This plan is a weak attempt to deceive Michigan property owners who are demanding significant relief. It also sends the wrong signal to job providers, who will not be encouraged to bring capital and jobs to Michigan, nor to retain what is Charlotte Major 517-455-7449 or here now," Rep. O'Connor commented.

There are several groups in the Legislature and state government working on major plans to reduce the reliance on the property tax, she said. Some of those studies will also address the key issue of school finance, which the Governor's plan ignores, she

"We can do better, much better, than this." Rep. O'Connor explained. My vote will be there when a genuine property tax relief measure is brought before the House. But I cannot pass off a charade like this to my constituents as my answer to this serious problem."

"Generally, water between uses on different food should be kept hot, cold, or food products. Do not let not at all." Salmonella, the most common

cause of food-borne illness, thrives thoroughly washed. in moist, high-protein foods which are stored in warm temperatures. temperatures between 110-140 serving. degrees and can survive in salmonellosis are improper and improper cooking of foods. Salmonella bacteria are most

commonly found in meat, poultry, salads, and dairy products. usually appear 12-36 hours after three hours.

According to Heffron, the risk of salmonella poisoning can be greatly reduced if consumers: * Thoroughly cook all meat






