Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced-priced meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. Households should answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income AND the amount source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR the household's food stamp case or AFDC number if the household is on food stamps or receives AFDC; (2) names of all household members; (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older, or the word "none" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

FOOD STAMP/AFDA HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" (AFDC) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or AFDC case number, print your name and sign the application. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of

determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year. If children are approved for free or reduced-price meal or free milk benefits, the household must

report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently

eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time. In most cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a

household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced-priced meals or milk for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy Polly Brokaw will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. ## When Teenagers Work

teenagers will be adjusting school and a structured learning and work schedules. Many teens opportunity (ie. co-operative may seek their first part-time job education). Studies have consistently shown hours, and poorly trained that working students learn work skills, explore career areas, develop social skills and a work ethic, learn to manage time, and

teenagers suggests that the picture isn't all that positive. Working teenagers lose touch with other age groups, are often with their high school guidance exposed to numbing work activities and acquire bad work Service or call 428-8327 or 662instead of saving, sometimes of the consortium are available to making harmful choices. When a teenager decides to work it may not be best to take the first job that comes along. Some jobs related to vocational






