



Prevent Careless Snow Removal

Property owners piling snow high along roadways and shoulders or pushing it to the opposite side of the street can cause hazardous conditions for motorists, and the Michigan (MDOT) warns that it's also against the law.

State law (P-A- 82 of 1978) prohibits businesses and citizens from dumping snow on roadways and shoulders or piling it so high at driveway entrances that it obstructs the vision of motorists.

The department recommends

distance from the driveway in the direction of approaching traffic. "That way the view of a motorist entering the roadway

also clear snow for a short

from a driveway is not obstructed," explained Maury Witteveen, MDOT's chief of maintenance. "When clearing your driveway," he said, "push the

snow away from the roadway and to the sides of the driveway for its full length and the problem of the high snow banks blocking a driver's view will be eliminated."

Witteveen said large businesses should make special arrangements ahead of time to remove snow from their driveway entrances and driveways. In some cases it may be necessary to truck snow away from parking facilities.

Violators leave themselves open to fines and lawsuits for public liability and property damage. For a charge to be filed, a police officer must witness the violation or a citizen must file a complaint.

All property owners and persons hired to remove snow are responsible for maintaining safe traffic conditions and preventing careless snow-removal techniques.



"I don't think every taxpayer in the state should be responsible for paying off Wayne County's debts," O'Connor said. "This plan penalizes my constituents for problems they didn't create."

O'Connor said that this is the second time in four years that the county has asked for help from the state. Wayne County has a chronic budget problem, particularly in providing indigent health care.



No French Christmas celebration would be complete without a "buche de Noel," the traditional Christmas cake baked and deco rated to look like a Yule log:

6 egg whites — let egg whites 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa warm to room temperature. 6 egg yolks

112 teaspoons vanilla extract Confectioners' sugar

ing until stiff peaks form. With same beaters, beat egg yolks at high speed, adding remaining ½ cup sugar — again 2 tablespoons at a time. Beat until mixture is very thick - about 4 minutes. Beat in cocoa at low speed, add vanilla and salt. With a wire whisk or rubber scraper, gently fold the cocoa mixture into the beaten egg whites, just until they are blended. Grease bottom of a 151/2 by 101/2 by 1 inch jelly roll pan; line with waxed paper; grease paper lightly. Spread batter evenly in pan and bake in preheated 375 degree oven for about 15 minutes - just until surface springs back when gently pressed with fingertip. Sift confectioners' sugar, in a 15 by 10 inch rectangle on clean linen towel. Turn cake out on sugared towel; lift off pan; peel paper off cake. Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, starting with the short end - towel and all. Cool completely on rack, seam side down for at least ½ hour. Now make the filling:

In a large electric-mixer bowl, at high speed, beat egg whites until

soft peaks form. Add 14 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beat-

11/2 cups heavy cream, chilled ½ cup confectioners' sugar

2 teaspoons instant coffee 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Combine the ingredients in medium bowl. Beat with electric mixer until thick—if you make it ahead—refrigerate. Now unroll cake. spread with filling to 1 inch from edge; reroll. Place seam side down on plate - cover loosely with foil. Refrigerate 1 hour before serving. To serve: sprinkle with confectioners' sugar and decorate with angelica and cherries. Serves 10. You make the chocolate log a week ahead, then freeze it, wrapped in foil. Let stand at room temperature to thaw for about 1 hour before serving.





Proper Snow Shoveling Can Reduce Back Pain And Injury

Have you ever heaved a shovel full of wet snow only to suddenly feel a stabbing pain in the back?

A heaping shovel of snow improperly lifted can exert an estimated 100 to 200 pounds of additional pressure on the vital lumbosacral disc, leading to possible excruciating lowback pain and sciatica. The disc - the lowest one in the spinal column -- carries most of the body's weight and is often the primary site of disc protrusion.

This winter incorrect shoveling practices will again cause pain and injury to the low back and limbs, warns Stanley Gilbert, D.C. of Manchester Chiropractic Clinic.

To help avoid or aggravate back and limb pain this winter, Gilbert recommends these 10 safety tips:

1. Don't shovel if you've had serious spinal, lung or cardiovascular conditions or are older and out of shape.

2. Do simple warm up exercises first to limber up.

3. Dress warmly; wear an extra-long garment to protect the

4. Always stand erect and bend from the knees, not from the waist; handle small-to-moderate loads at a time. 5. Push rather than lift the snow where possible; deposit it

close by instead of twisting and throwing it over a wide area. 6. Use your arms, legs, feet and thighs in a smooth, co-

ordinated motion to deposit the snow near you. 7. Change grip and stance often to avoid overusing the stronger side of your body.

8. Pace yourself, don't overexert, and rest frequently.

9. Don't shovel in extremely frigid weather. 10. If your health is a risk factor, don't take a chance; ask your neighborhood youngsters to shovel for you.

Lifting a heaping shovel of snow without bending the knees can be a major factor in contributing to severe stress in the spine, cautions Dr. Gilbert. A shovel of wet snow weighing 10 to 15 pounds held in front of the body can increase the pressure on the lumbosacral disc by 15 times the weight

Other causes of shoveling-related pain and injury are lifting and throwing too much snow at a time, twisting and bending from the waist and overexertion, according to Dr. Gilbert.

In addition to low- and upper-back pain, poor shoveling echniques can trigger sciatica (a shooting pain and sensation in the leg), and brachial neuralgia (a burning, tingling, numbness or pain down the neck, shoulder and arm.)

The heart also handles a big load while shoveling. Exertion and frigid air can put a burden on the cardiovascular system.





If you're like many Americans, you're not getting the calcium you need each day. About 50 percent of men over 35 don't measure up to their 800 required milligrams of calcium daily. Half of 15 to 18-year-old teenage girls get less than 600 of their 1200 required milligrams of calcium daily. And fewer than 25 percent of women over 35 years of age have adequate calcium intakes. Two glasses of milk and an ounce of cheese satisfy an adult's daily calcium requirements.

State Complies With 55 MPH

Michigan continues compliance with the national 55miles-per-hour speed limit law, State Transportation Director James P. Pitz reports.

Pitz said that 49.7 percent of vehicles on all highways and roads signed for 55 mph exceeded the speed limit in the 12-month period ended last September 30. The total in 1986 was 49.9 percent. barely below the 50 percent ceiling set by the U.S. Transportation Department before federal penalties are imposed. They would total about \$12.6 million in

Pitz said Michigan stayed in compliance this year mainly because the volume of traffic on rural major collector highways increased as a portion of total highway traffic. Motorists on those highways generally drive slower than those on freeways.

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) monitors speeds year-around at 44 stations established on all types of highways signed for 55 mph.

"About 90 percent of motorists on rural Interstate freeways drove over 55 mph, about the same as last year, and on urban Interstates the proportion of speeders actually increased," Pitz said. "However, more drivers on lesser highways observed the speed limit.

Michigan's 720 miles of rural interstates will be excluded from the 1987-88 monitoring for 55 mph because the speed limit on those routes went up to 65 mph on November 29.

Pitz said a campaign in late summer to persuade drivers to slow down apparently had some



Now, as for Aunt Edna's desserts, polyunsaturated oils and margarines and low-fat or no-fat milk products are readily available as substitutions for other fats and whole milk products.

To lower the fat in the stuffing mixture, saute celery, onion and other ingredients in polyunsaturated margarine. additional moisture, use chicken broth that has been de-fatted.

Desserts should be lower in fat; fruits, sorbets and sherbets could replace the traditional heavy after-dinner dessert. You'll help your heart and, with reasonable portions, may help your waistline, To reduce the fat, cholesterol

and calorie content of your family recipes, the American Heart Association Cookbook (Fourth Edition) suggests the following

When your recipe calls for sour cream, use cottage cheese blended until smooth, or cottage cheese plus low-fat yogurt for flavor.

Chocolate, which is high in fat, can be replaced with a mixture of cocoa and margarine or polyunsaturated or monounsaturated vegetable oil such as corn, cottonseed, safflower, olive, sesame seed, soybean, sunflower seed or rapeseed. For every one-ounce square of chocolate that the recipe calls for, substitute three tablespoons of cocoa mixed with one tablespoon of oil or margarine.

Instead of butter, use one of the margarines or oils listed

Buttermilk can be replaced with one cup of lukewarm nonfat milk, plus one tablespoon of lemon juice. This equals one cup of buttermilk. Let the mixture stand for five minutes and beat briskly before using. You can use this mixture in making buttermilk biscuits.

By lowering fat and cholesterol in family recipes and experimenting with spices other than salt, you may improve even the most cherished family recipe.

State Representative Margaret O'Connor (R-Ann Arbor) said the anti-crime bills are a "first step' in helping law enforcement officials. The package includes provisions from the House Republican Task Force Report on Crime Reduction issued last May.

The major bills in the package

--require consecutive terms for anyone who commits a felony while on bond for another felony.

-allow prosecutors the right to appeal any issue which would not subject the defendant to double

--provide rights to victims of eight specific misdemeanor crimes crimes committed by and

--enhance penalties for selling and distributing drugs on school property and for using minors to deliver drugs.

"These bills will help police officers, prosecutors and judges administer justice, but they are only a beginning," O'Connor said.

The lawmaker said that the

package fails to address the issue of repeat offenders. A bill in the package would reduce the minimum terms of

mid-level drug dealers. Our first goal should be to enact this package and provide the tools needed by our law enforcement officials," O'Connor concluded.
