Road To Recovery Needs Drivers

The American Cancer Society's Washtenaw County Unit needs more members for its Road to Recovery program. This is a group of volunteers who drive cancer patients to and from local medical centers for treatment.

Transportation is a major problem for many Michigan cancer patients. For instance, one cancer patient requiring radiation therapy could need anywhere from 20 to 30 trips in six weeks. A patient receiving chemotherapy might report for treatment weekly for up to a year. In many cases, a patient is driven to hospitals or clinics by relatives or friends. But even they must occasionally seek alternative transportation. That's where Road to Recovery comes in. These volunteers drive patients to medical facilities for life-saving treatments. The schedules are flexible. If you have a car and can spare as little as one morning or afternoon a month to help somebody along the road to recovery, call the local American Cancer Society office at 971-4300.





personally welcome, even when their wares are not wanted. But some of these amenities are apt to be forgotten by dealers who are shut up within the walls of their stores the year round, and have many petty perplexities to contend against. Some men are so constituted that it seems almost impossible to make themselves agreeable. But such have it within their means to hire those who can and thereby enhance their interest.

There are many stores in large and small places where people drop in to leave their orders because the talking is well done in them; and there are others which they go out of their way to avoid, because the proprietors and clerks make a bungling job of their entertainment.

No one can measure the power of personal magnetism in trade, as compared with advantageous location, extensive advertising, and other accessories. There are clerks who, in changing from one store to another, carry nearly all their trade with them. And there are city merchants who visit their branch stores in the country regularly, almost wholly for the purpose of keeping acquainted with the customers, many of whom take pains to do their trading on the days when they can meet the head of the concern. It takes a long time to build up a first-class reputation for affability, just as it does for number one goods and sterling honesty. And when such a reputation is established, a few slips on the part of the clerks may weaken it sadly. How often do we hear it said, "I wish always to trade with
