Farmers May Get Reprieve

Farmers will apparently get a reprieve from a U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) ruling that would have made anhydrous ammonia, a widely-used fertilizer, prohibitively expensive and difficult to get. Under a pending House funding measure, lawmakers have urged the department to drop its bid to reclassify anhydrous ammonia from a nonflammable to a poisonous gas.

Farm Bureau had opposed the proposal, saying it would cost agriculture millions of dollars and possibly make the fertilizer unavailable. The U.S. Department of Agriculture joined with Farm Bureau in opposing the proposal.

According to Al Almy, director of public affairs for the Michigan Farm Bureau, reclassification of anhydrous ammonia would have caused higher transportation "The current cost of shipping anhydrous ammonia within the U.S. is 53% above the railroad's cost of providing the service. In contrast, the premium paid for shipping poisonous materials by rail is 136% above a railroad's cost," Almy said. "All anhydrous ammonia moving by truck to farm communities would come to a halt if it were classified as a poisonous gas."

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Some studies suggest that persons infected with the AIDS virus show mild impairment of function before their disease is diagnosed. In one study, subjects harboring the AIDS virus without exhibiting clinical symptoms were found to reasoning, reduced speed of information processing and mild difficulties in learning and remembering.

Other studies conflict with those findings. The World Health Organization says that on the weight of available data, otherwise healthy AIDS-virus-infected individuals are no more likely to be functionally imparied than noninfected persons.


AIDS-RELATED SUICIDE MAY HAVE BIOLOGICAL CAUSE

The AIDS death toll includes many victims who have committed suicide after diagnosis. In the New York City area, men with AIDS are 66 times more likely to commit suicide than the general population. The increased suicide rates, which are comparable with those observed in major psychiatric disorders, suggest a possible role for a biological mechanism contributing to suicide in persons with AIDS.

In a study of AIDS-related suicides in New York City in 1985, none of the victims was suffering from an advanced stage of the disease. In fact, all committed suicide within nine months of receiving their AIDS diagnosis. and most within six months. A high proportion of the suicides took place in hospitals and were sudden and impulsive, raising the possibility that delirium may have precipitated them.

The suicide rate for AIDS victims remained high in 1986 and 1987, according to preliminary follow-up information presented at the recent American Psych-Association's annual meeting. The researchers said complaints of its victims are thalamus, as well as the brain that biological factors-including the effect of the AIDS virus on certain brain neurotransmittersare at least partically to blame for the high suicide rate. In recent years, studies have found links between violent suicidal behavior and altered neurotransmitter functioning.

Toxoplasmic encephalitis is the redominant cause of brain sions in patients with AIDS and probably the most common opportunistic infection of the central nervous system. study suggests that by 1991 as many as 40,000 cases of AIDSrelated toxoplasmic encephalitis will be seen in the U.S. alone. Toxoplasmosis is caused by parasitic protozoans and is characterized by a wide range of symptoms including-but not limited toblindness, personality changes and severe headaches.

fungus, Cryptococcu neoformans, is another common opportunistic central nervous system infection in AIDS patients. The resulting cryptococcal meningitis is one of the most important neurological manifestations of AIDS. It may occur at any time during the course of the disease, either as the initial opportunistic infection seen or as a later complication. Symptoms of cryptococcal meningitis include fever, headache, nausea and vomiting.



POSES CURE PROBLEMS Scientists seeking a cure for AIDS will have to contend with the virus' presence in the central nervous system if they hope to succeed. The natural barriers that block most large molecules in the blood from infiltrating brain tissues and cerebral spinal fluid also could prevent drugs from entering the central nervous system. In fact, given the difficulty in finding drugs that cross those barriers, the central nervous system may even become a reservior for infection, much as provides a sanctuary for leukemic cells.

While research into vaccines and possible curative agents continues, prevention is the only way to stop the spread of the virus. The World Health Organization (WHO) notes that people who abstain from sex or maintain a monogamous relationship with a faithful, noninfected partner are not at risk of contracting the virus. Other means of preventing the sexual transmission of AIDS include reducing the number of sexual partners, avoiding sex with those who may have had many sexual partners, and always using a condom.

Needles, syringes and instruments that pierce the skin are other sources of infection. Intravenous drug users who share needles are at high risk for acquiring the AIDS virus. WHO recommends that all injections and any other cutting or piercing of the skin be done only with equipment that is sterile.

WHO also recommends that women infected with the AIDS virus avoid pregnancy. Pregnancy may be dangerous to the mother, and the baby has about a one-in-two chance of getting the virus from the mother.

Drought Will Cause Minor Price Increase

Fears of drastically increased food prices because of the drought are unfounded, according to Michigan Farm Bureau's agricultural economist Bob Craig.

"The current drought will affect food prices, both long-term and short-term, but those effects in terms of overall prices will be minimal." Craig said. "Prices of some foods, such as bread, cereals and products containing soybean oil, for example, have already risen to consumers. However, many foods are produced in areas where production is not affected by the drought at this time. Fruits and vegetables are grown largely in the south and west, many of them irrigated so the

drought has little affect." Craig said many products, such as green peas and sweet corn grown in the Great Lakes states and fruits produced in Michigan and Wisconsin, are also grown in other areas so the impact of the drought will be tempered.

"In many foods, the cost of the raw ingredient is only a small portion of the total cost. The raw ingredients in a loaf of bread, for example, account for only 8% of the total retail price. Reduced meat prices, due to liquidation of livestock herds over the next several months because of the drought, could largely offset higher crop prices," he said.

Craig said that during 1988, the consumer price index (CPI) will probably only rise by ½ to 1 percentage point as a result of the drought. "The long-term impact could be

greater, perhaps as much as 5% to 8% in 1989, compared to the normal increase of 3% to 5%. This will largely be the result of higher prices for meat because of forced liquidations this year, and higher feed costs which will also discourage livestock and dairy production," he said.

The fear that food price increases will force up the inflation rate is also unfounded, Craig said, because a 10% increase in food prices would only result in a 1% increase in the consumer price

On a more positive note, any capital improvement you make regardless of the method of payment - increases the cost basis of your residence and decreases your taxable profit when you sell your home. Note that capital improvements are not the same as repair or maintenance activities, such as painting walls or fixing a broken window pane. To qualify as a capital improvement, a project must add to the property's value, prolong its life or adapt it to a new use. Repairs just maintain the home in acceptable condition.

To substantiate your homeimprovement expenses, keep a file of canceled checks, credit card bills. contractor invoices, receipts for materials, before and after photographs and loan agreements. Don't foreget to document the small, do-it-yourself projects, such as installing a new mailbox.



by Becky Doyle Mayor Kallewaard showed him the proposed new routes, his letter was read opposing the change at the July 17 meeting. Officials say that the increase in noise and traffic in the area will

be outweighed by the benefits to the community when the plant expands. Village Trustee Bill Kwolek said, "It's a fact of life," when speaking of the hazards and disadvantages of trucking through residential neighborhoods. But the homeowners don't see

that the expansion and new route are necessarily tied together and believe that there are other alternatives available. One such alternative is to use the present route down Elton Street, improving that area to allow the increased traffic. When the rezoning for the expansion was recommended by Planning Commission in June, Jonas stated that he planned another route that would not touch residential areas, and residents wonder what happened to that plan.
