#### School Days Safety Tips to Prevent Head Injuries

The summer is coming to an end and the school year has begun. To students this means new teachers, new friends, new activities and for some, maybe even a new school. The New Medico Head Injury System has some safety tips to help make all those new experiences as safe as possible for

your school-bound youngster.
According to the National Head
Injury Foundation, an estimated one
million children sustain head injuries each year, with an injury occurring every 16 seconds. A head injury is any level of damage to the brain caused by an impact to the skull. Fifty percent of these injuries are caused by traffic accidents and 21 percent by falls. Everyday activities that we take for granted often provide the potential for head injuries to occur. "We can't expect our youngsters to know which situations and circumstances are potentially dangerous.'

Take the time to discuss the follow-

- ing tips with your child and help pre-vent head and other injuries: Carry books, lunch, gym clothes and other belongings in a sturdy carry-all bag or, better yet, knap-sack to keep hands free.
- Use caution when crossing streets and obey all traffic signs and signals — look both ways for oncom-
- ing cars.

   When riding bikes or skateboards to school, wear a helmet at all times. Use a knapsack or bike rack to carry belongings. Trying to juggle books can cause an acci-dent. Also, if you take a spill, your hands will be free to break the fall. Always walk your bike or skateboard across intersections. · At recess, wear a helmet while playing football, baseball, and

other sports. • When riding a school bus, obey the bus driver and remain seated facing forward at all times. If seatbelts are provided, buckle up. When crossing the street in front of the bus, first check to be sure all

cars have stopped.

Because of the Manchester Superintendent of Schools' apparent desire to "negotiate" a settlement with the district's professional employees through the media, the Association feels it has no choice but to respond to Mr. Niedzwiecki's August 23, 1988 press release.

The Association is pleased to be able to report that some progress was made through mediation last Friday. However, at the same time and in all fairness, it must also be reported that there is still a long way to go before a successor contract agreement is secured.

As it is in most public sector negotiations, major issues preventing settlement of a contract for 1988-89 continue to be salary and insurance coverage. The Superintendent's office is cirtical of the Association's proposal for a 9% increase in wages, and at the same time attempts to project the impression that their 4% offer is something the teachers should be happy with. The Association feels Elementary justified with the requested wage increase because (a) it is consistent with wage increases which have been negotiated in other WLEA districts in the county, as shown in Chart 1 below, and (b) four of the five administrators employed in the district have already received wage increases considerably in excess of what is being offered to the teachers, as increment since they are at the shown in Chart 2 below.
