The Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Michigan Department of Treasury received a special commendation from the state's largest farm organization at the Michigan Farm Bureau's annual banquet. About 1,000 people watched the directors of the two state agencies accept honors for outstanding administration of P.A. 116, Michigan's Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act.

"Nearly 11 years ago, a bill was adopted by the Michigan Legislature which has had a profound impact on the farmers of this state," said Jack Laurie, president of the Michigan Farm Bureau. "The bill became what is common-

ly known as P.A. 116. Since then, over 4.4 million acres have been enrolled into the program. It goes without saying that P.A. 116 has accomplished its original purpose of preserving one of Michigan's most important natural resources.

"Passage of this law was an important achievement for the Farm Bureau organization and all of agriculture. But that was only the first step toward the development of this very successful program. Just as critical has been the administration of the law. The departments of natural resources and treasury have had the priimary responsibility for the implementation and day-to-day operation of P.A. 116. Michigan Farm Bureau is pleased to publicly commend them for their efforts toward preserving more than 4 million acres of Michigan farmland through outstanding administration of the program," he said.

DNR Director David Hales and Treasury Department Director Robert Bowman accepted the special commendations. Staff members of the DNR's special land programs section and the treasury's farmland preservation unit were given special recognition by Laurie for their service to P.A. 116.



Technical School in Lyndon Township, State Senator Lana Pollack announced that the prison camp would be fenced to deter walk aways. "According to Department of Correction statistics, 45 prisoners escaped from the Cassidy Lake Technical School between January 1 and December 15 of 1988. I am here today with the Director of the Department of Corrections. Bob Brown, to announce that this facility will be fenced as a means of deterring this walk away problem."

Just prior to the press conference, Pollack walked portions of the camp's perimeter. Accompanied by representatives of the Department of Corrections and the Department of Management and Budget, Pollack surveyed the hilly and wooded terrain that will be fenced in the next six to eight months. "The funds have been appropriated by the legislature. The plan will be finalized in the next few weeks and then the will begin. I have been advised that the fence will be in place by mid-to late summer."

"The fence will improve the security of the camp by preventing inmates from casually walking away. While the fence will not be a cure all, it should make a significant difference for the people in this area," Pollack stated. "Comparing the incidence of 9 escapees from Camp Waterloo (a fenced facility) to Cassidy Lake Technical School's 45 escapees over the same time period, we can anticipate that the fence will make a real difference."

Pursell Calls For Reforming Pay Process

One day after a 51 percent pay increase was voted down by members of Congress, U.S. Rep. Carl D.Pursell again called for changing the process for consid-

"Although we successfully blocked the raise from taking place yesterday, members of Congress should use this opportunity to reform the process for dealing with pay raises," Pursell said.

"If the Speaker of the House hadn't changed his mind at the last minute, the proposed \$45,000 raise for members of Congress would have gone into effect without a vote.

"While I'm pleased to have had the chance to record my opposition to the raise. I also realize we need to take action to prevent the same scenario from happening

"It is my hope the leadership will allow the House to consider a measure such as the Tauke Bill (named after sponsor Tom Tauke, R-Iowa), which, I co-sponsored," Pursell said.

"This bill would reform the process for considering Congressional pay raises. Specifically, it would require recorded votes, would disallow tying pay legisla-tion to other bills, and would delay any increases from one session of Congress to the next.

"This would allow for an election between the time of a pay vote and when a raise would go into effect," Pursell said. "My personal feeling is Con-

gress should not even consider a pay raise until the budget deficit is brought under control.

Avoid Last Minute Rush

"Don't put off filing your income tax return," said IRS District Director John Hummel. "The rush of last minute preparation could mean missed deductions or credits, and mistakes that could cause delays in processing and slower refunds."

Hummel said that as of the end of January, approximately 146,000 federal income tax returns had been filed by Michigan residents. 1.000 of those were filed through the new Electronic Filing Program, available in Michigan for the first time this year. Using computers, participating tax return preparers transmit federal tax returns over telephone lines directly to the Cincinnati Service Center. This results in fewer errors and faster refunds. The refund can also be deposited directly into a checking or savings account, eliminating the chance of a refund check being lost, stolen or misdirected.

Hummel emphasized that the IRS wants to help Michigan taxpayers. "In addition to our regular toll-free information line. 1-800-424-1040, and the walk-in assistance we provide at our 22 offices statewide, we also have speakers available to address a variety of tax topics, as well as other IRS procedural or policy related issues," he said. "Prolessional associations or other groups may request one of our speakers by calling our Taxpayer Education Coordinator at 1-800-424-1040, extension 3674," Hummel said.

WILL YOU BE THE TARGET OF AN AUDIT

You open your mail box. There, under the gas bill, you find a letter that makes your heart skip a beat: an Internal Revenue Service notice. The letter may be a simple request for additional information, but you fear the worst-an IRS audit. Relax. Your chances of being

audited are fairly slim. During 1987, only 1.09 percent of the 101.8 million individual tax returns filed were actually subject to an audit. But according to the Michigan Association of CPAs. the percentage may increase slightly this year. Tax reform has eliminated many tax shelters that formerly occupied much of the Internal Revenue Services audit efforts. As a result, the IRS may start focusing more attention on the average tax return.

How can you be sure that you will not be the unlucky winner of prepared scrupulously, you may be subject to a Taxpayer Compliance Measurement Program of 10,000 similar returns. (TCMP) audit. Conducted every

50,000 randomly selected returns. On the other hand, several

factors may improve or lessen the odds of your being selected for an audit. Where you live, for instance, can increase or lower the risk of an audit. In Anchorage, Alaska, the percentage of returns audited is 2.56 percent, whereas in Boston. Massachusetts, the figure drops two points to .56 percent. According to the IRS, the difference in percentages between geographic areas is sheer coincidence. But experts explain that the variation reflects, in part, the proportion of filers in that area with higher or lower income
