

Manchester Community Fair July 10-11-12-13-14

"The Year of the Country Fair" will serve as the theme of the 46th annual Manchester community Fair, July 10-14.

The fair parade on July 10 at 6:30 p.m. will kick off the festivities. Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Jenter of Manchester will be the parade marshals this year, riding through town to the fairgrounds at the corner of Wolverine and Vernon Streets. The fair queen will be chosen from a field of 12 contestants following the parade.

On Wednesday, July 11, T.J. Thomas and the Diamond Back will perform in the fair pavilion at-8:00 p.m. The following day, senior citizens 62 years of age and older will be admitted to the fairgrounds free until 5:00 p.m. The pet show is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. on Thursday with a talent show at 7:00 p.m.

Friday is Children's Day at the fair, while Tracey Lynne and the Mountain Express will provide musical entertainment beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Saturday is Ladies' Day, complete with speakers, demonstrations, entertainment, and door prizes. A horseshoe pitching contest is set for 1:30 p.m., while a pedal pull for children kicks off at 3:00 p.m. Tracey Lynne and the Mountain Express return to the fair Saturday evening at 8:00 p.m.

Fair officials have scheduled daily pulling contests, beginning with the ATV pull at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday. On Thursday, the compact tractor pull is set for 7:00, while on Friday, the classic tractor pull begins at noon, followed by the antique tractor pull at 5:00 p.m., and the pony pull at 6:30 p.m. The large tractor pull begins at noon on Saturday, resuming at 7:00.

The Chicken Broil - How It All Began

If you were born in the 1950's, you won't remember the first be used to buy the fence for the Manchester Chicken Broil, but athletic field. Thus, in 1954 the you probably grew up thinking it Manchester Chicken Broil was was one of those things that has born. always been-like Christmas.

Now we all have a pretty good idea about just when and where Christmas got started, but what about this famous Chicken Broil? Why did it begin? Who started it? Just who is responsible anyway? Why is all this planning done year after year? Is it just so people can get out and enjoy a delicious meal? Well, that's one reason, but here's they way it got started.

It seems the Manchester Optimist (Exchange) Club used to sell tickets at Manchester High School football games. This proved somewhat difficult because there was no fence around the athletic field and people could wander in anywhere. As a result, the Optimist Club volunteered to provide money to build a fence. Great! No objections there, but where would they get the money?

Members of the Optimist Club had for sometime been having cookouts in various members' backyards - nothing too large, you understand, just small groups of 50-70 people. They would broil steaks, chicken, or anything else that they had a taste for. Someone had the bright idea to hold one of these cookouts and sell tickets. The money earned would

But hesides the tradition of fun and good food that has continued over the years, the tradition of donations for various community improvements has continued as well.

The Manchester Chicken Broil profits have totaled over \$170,000 over the last 36 years. Most of these profits have gone back into the community. Besides the fence around the old athletic field, the Chicken Broil profits provided the field score board; the lights and poles; bleachers; the announcer's booth; the mobile bleachers; the buildings on the athletic field, including the concession stand, storage buildings, and the ticket booth; a new fence; new lights and rewiring; and a press box.

Profits also paid for the purchase and development of the new athletic field behind the Methodist Church. The track field and the girls softball diamond, as well as the press box and fence there, come from Chicken Broil funds.

Approximately \$7,000 has been invested in Carr Park (rest rooms, playground equipment), \$10,000 in Kirk Park, and \$17,000 into Char-Broil Park. The Historical Society received money from the





Once you determine the number of personal and rental days, add them together to find the amount of total use. To calculate the percentage of deductible operating expenses (such as maintenance, utilities and depreciation), simply multiply all expenses by the number of rental days, then divide that sum by the total use figure. The result is your tax deductible amount - subject to the passive loss rules noted previously. For example, if your operating expenses were \$5,000 and you rented your property for 90 days and the total use figure came to 100, your deductible amount would be \$4,500 (\$5,000 times 90, divided by 100).

Some CPAs recommend that you figure the amount of deductible mortgage interest and property tax separately from operating expenses. To do this, multiply the amount of mortgage interest and property tax by the fraction of rental days to the total

If you have a loss from renting property, that loss is considered passive and thus can be deducted only from passive income. However, if you actively participate in renting your property, and your adjusted gross income (AGI) is \$150,000 or less, you can deduct rental losses of up to \$25,000 from your regular income. If your AGI is over \$100,000, the \$25,000 supporting documents whenever active rental loss allowance is reduced by 50 cents for every dollar of income above \$100,000. Once your AGI exceeds \$150,000, the allowance is totally phased

> However, if you rented your home before the new law was enacted (October 22, 1986) and you exceed AGI limits, you can still deduct 10 percent in 1990, but none thereafter.







Citizens Could **Vote on Lottery** Money

Michigan citizens could vote on a constitutional amendment to dedicate lottery money to education under a resolution, passed unanimously by the State House Tuesday, co-sponsored by an area lawmaker.

Representative O'Connor (R-Lodi Township) said proceeds from State Lottery were intended to benefit education, a goal that never should waver.

"Michigan citizens have been told from day one that Lottery money would go to schools,' O'Connor said. "I think that's important enough that we ought to guarantee it in our Constitution."

House Joint Resolution Q requires all net revenue and interest earned on net revenue except for interest used for paying prizes - from the Lottery to be deposited in the State School Aid Fund beginning October 1, 1991.

O'Connor noted that currently only Lottery revenue, not interest on revenue, is earmarked for the School Aid Fund.

"By adding interest from Lottery revenues, this amendment will mean an additional \$3 million a year will benefit K-12 education in Michigan," she said. "And by including this in the Constitution. rather than mandating it by statute, we ensure that Lottery money can never be taken by this or future legislatures."

O'Connor cautioned, however, that even this constitutional amendment won't solve the "shift-shaft" problem that has plagued the Lottery since it was created in 1972.

"While I support this resolution for increasing and guaranteeing the money that will go in the front door of the School Aid Fund," Rep. O'Connor said, "it still does nothing about money leaving through the back door as a result of reductions in General Fund contributions to schools."

If HJR Q is passed by the Senate, the constitutional amendment would go before voters in the general election this November.

Summer Salad

- 2 cups torn iceberg lettuce 2 cups curly endive (optional)

Boating Safety

The Coast Guard Begins Enforcing Boating While Intoxicated Law

Boating while intoxicated could cost you your life, says the U.S. Coast Guard. At the very least, it could mean a fine of up to \$5000 and/or up to one year in jail under the new federal boating-while-intoxi-

In 1988, 946 people lost their lives in boating accidents. Studies conducted by the Coast Guard and the National Transportation Safety Board indicate that up to half of those deaths may have been alcoholrelated. Accidents on U.S. waterways among the nation's 70 million boaters are second only to those on U.S. highways as the cause of transportation deaths in this country.

Intoxication poses dangers to the boating public, both directly and indirectly. It can cause a lack of stability, shorten a person's survival time if he or she is dumped into cold water, and interfere with an individual's ability to swim or cooperate in his or her own rescue. Even one drink can affect a person's balance.

This summer, the U.S. Coast Guard began enforcement of the new federal boating-while-intoxicated law in 12 Gulf Coast and mid-At-






lantic states. The law applies to drugs as well as alcohol. Intoxicated boat operators face a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 or a criminal fine of up to \$5,000 and/or one year in jail. Boat operators are considered to be intoxicated if their blood alcohol concentration (BAC) is .10 or higher. The Coast Guard will enforce the law during routine law enforcement boardings and in response

to sightings or reports of boaters operating in a reckless or unsafe manner. Intoxication will be determined using "breathalizer" tests and/or a field sobriety test.

The Coast Guard will work with state and local law enforcement officers. Normally, Coast Guard personnel will detain the intoxicated boater until local authorities assume responsibility.


