Manchester Plastics will build major improvements to its pipe dam and install a new septic tank to the west of the detention pond, according to plans approved by the Manchester Village Council at its January 21 meeting.

A persistent, low-volume flow of oil has been trickling into the stormwater detention pond since shortly after completion of the company's expansion program. Some is runoff from the large parking lot, and some is suspected to be flowing from the ground underneath the building.

The stormwater pond uses a pipe dam to separate oily flow from the stormwater which runs to the Village storm drain and to the River Raisin. Village and Michigan Department of Natural Resources officials have agreed that a pipe dam is a good means of dealing with the situation, but recommended that it be reconstructed of concrete.

The original system has repeatedly failed in wet weather, allowing oily material to reach the. open storm drain and sometimes to flow into the river. the improvement project.







STYES

A stye is a red lump or swelling on the edge of the eyelid. This is caused by infection of a gland at the root of an eyelash. Some people seem to be more susceptible to styes and may have this annoying, some-

Usually a stye will resche by using warm compresses, although sometimes antibiotics are necessary. Persons with frequent recurrence of styes may have to use preventive measures to avoid repeated episodes of infection. A similar appearing condition of the eyelids is a chalazion. This is actually a more common problem than styes. A chalazion is an inflamed cyst deep within the eyelid. appearing as a red lump, usually pointing toward the inside of the eyelid. A chalazion is usually not infected, but rather is a reaction to oi-

ly secretions retained in one of the oil glands of the evelid. Often chalazia will resolve spontaneously, but occasionally they can be very large, painful, and cause the entire eyelid to be red and swollen. Warm compresses are helpful in reducing the inflammation and helping the cyst to drain, but sometimes injection of steroid drugs or surgical incision and drain-

Styes and chalazia are generally harmless, but very bothersome. Hopefully you won't be troubled with these "lumps and bumps".

Tax Brochure Available

The 1991 edition of the Michigan Consumers Council's popular "How to Review and Appeal Your Property Tax Assessment" brochure is now available. The one-page pamphlet provides important information on Michigan's property tax appeal procedures, including summer tax collections.

Prepared in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Treasury, the brochure details how an individual property tax bill is computed using the state equalized valuation (SEV) rate. It also provides insight on how assessments are made and how property owners can determine if their property appraisal was done correctly.

The Council advises property owners to review the appraisal records in their assessor's office for accuracy. Common assessment errors include such false assumptions as a house having a finished basement or fireplace when it doesn't. years of age and has acquired a fortune within the past two years which he is the owner.


