



MANCHESTER GRAVEL AND CONCRETE PRODUCTS, INC. **SUE THE VILLAGE**

On October 2nd, 1992 an ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE was filed in the Circuit Court for the County of Washtenaw. Honorable Melinda Morris presiding. The Writ states:

"Upon reading Plaintiff's (Manchester Gravel) Verified Complaint and it appearing that Plaintiff will suffer immediate and irreparable injury, loss and/or damage unless this Court grants Plaintiff the relief it seeks:

A. This Court should not issue a Preliminary Injunction against Defendant, Village of Manchester, enjoining Defendant from impairing or impeding the use of Hibbard Road as an access route between Manchester Gravel and Concrete Products, Inc.'s operations and Highway M-52 pending a trial on the

B. This court should not grant relief in the form of compelling the Village to impose reasonable requirements on Plaintiff's Application for Long Term Permit and in so doing allow Plaintiff to comply and upon compliance be granted a permit to conduct its business as it always had, over Hibbard Road to M-52.

C. An immediate trial should not be scheduled."



Wilcox! In the evening, however, there must needs be a row of some kind to close a day which of course had not been

without excitement and Political enthusiasm. So a crowd of rowdies from all over the brigade "rallied" on the Sutters of the 2nd Michigan and the Col. was promptly on hand with a dozen Provost Guard with loaded pieces; they carried off two or three hundred dollars worth of his goods and chattels. I know it was a piece of wanton disregard of law and order but as far as the Sutter was concerned I didn't care a copper, tempting us with dainties on which they can't be satisfied with anything less than double or triple profit and I've no doubt it was this feeling that saved many of the culprits from deserved punish-

shortened, placing the viewer directly in the center of the road, looking straight ahead. An old mailbox is left open to signify the relaxed country atmosphere.

Another painting entitled "Caught On Guard" was recently selected by the New York State Council of the Arts for the International Fine Art Exhibition sponsored by the Oil Pastel Association/United Pastelists of America held in April, 1992 in Watchung, New Jersey. Only 75 paintings were accepted. It was also chosen for the cover of the hard-bound limited edition book entitled, "The Great Pyrenees Annual" published by Hoflin Publishing, Wheat Ridge, Colorado when it was first painted in 1991.

"Caught On Guard" depicts a Great Pyrenees sheep dog guarding sheep on a farm in Manchester (Dave and Darlene Scovell's on English Road). They purchased the original painting after the April Exhibition. It is now available as a

limited edition print. A new painting, "Dog & Butterfly" will be entered this year in the Art Show at the Dog Show, the largest Canine Art Show of its kind. The painting was inspired by the photos Suzanne took of her own dog (German Shepherd) in her four acre frontyard clover, alfalfa, wildflower field on Sharon Hol-

low Road. A photo taken in 1990 was chosen for the 1990 Canine Art Show. She now hopes the large pastel painting will be accepted for next year's show. First place award is\$1,000 for the purchase of the painting that will hang in the Dog Museum in Wichita,

KS. She will also enter "Playmates" a pastel painting of the same dog in "Caught On Guard" but as a puppy. He is shown playing with a lamb in a barnyard scene (socialization process necessary for sheep protection training).

Suzanne believes people everywhere appreciate and admire the Manchester way of life and beautiful countryside.

Though she has had to recently move from Manchester (her husband is a critical care pediatrician), she and her family miss the area and visit relatives and friends when possible.

Another painting of Manchester (meadow scene) is planned.

Payne stated that the Road commission had requested a bond of \$325,000 to use the northerly route. "At one time I tried to get a route directly west from the pit to M-52. Hansen had a quarter of a mile of the land and one other owner had the rest. The State Highway Department wanted acceleration and deceleration lanes on 52 and for the size of our operations it just wasn't worth the cost. We got permission from Bill Zsenyuk, Village Manager to use Hibbard Street for 2 concrete trucks. We only asked for one but they gave us two."

Payne further stated, "I sold the pit to Manchester Gravel in

Problems with using Hibbard Street have compounded since the construction of Manchester Manor, Mobile Home Park. The owners of the park have placed water and sewer lines down Hibbard and have reconstructed the road base and bituminous surface for automobile traffic. The re-paved portion of the roadway has six inches of gravel and three and one-half inches of bituminous with gravel shoulders. That portion of Hibbard north to Geiske traverses an old swampy area. When the sewer line was installed silt, muck, and soft clay was encountered. The old roadway was constantly

winter frost heave caused a very rough surface to travel.

Heavy truck traffic would quickly turn this type road and new construction into a quag-

With the new Mobile Home Park auto traffic and children walking to and from school could rapidly become a problem if exposed to heavy truck traffic. Additionally there are apartments and single family residences along Hibbard.

The bone of contention and

position of Manchester Gravel Company seems to be: They should be allowed to come and go as they please, public and traffic be damned. It does not appear that Manchester Gravel Company did their homework before purchasing the pit. They have not applied for a conditional use permit from the Township. They did not research the possibility that the Mobile Home Park could or would be built. They apparently did not consider the poor condition of the roads to and from the Pit.

On the night this writer attended a Village Council meeting it appeared the owners had little fore knowledge of what problems might arise. Now Manchester Gravel Company is appealing to the Circuit Court and Judge Melinda Morris to grant them injunctive relief to do as they so desire. Let us hope that Judge Morris can see that Manchester Gravel Company is still operating by using the northerly route.

daughter was driving home from Manchester, we were blessed with another stone in the windshield. This makes the fourth time in two years that we have had to put a new windshield in our vehicles, and every time it was a passing gravel train. I'm happy that we have a Tarp Law in Michigan, but it doesn't seem to be working. The whole idea behind this law was to keep the load on the truck and allow our insurance costs to lower. This doesn't seem to be working either.

Prior to this, I drove Austin and Pleasant Lake Roads for 20 years without a mishap. Is this iust bad luck or are there other cases that I don't know about?

In a recent article in the Ann Arbor News, dated October 25, 1992, the header read, "Between a Rock & a Hard Place." The article dealt with another gravel company trying to set up business in the Pleasant Lake area, and the plight of the residents in the area. One resident stated that 250 gravel trains passed his home a single day, while another said: I"Some of those cowboys don't care how they drive".

Well let me tell you, neighbor, it's just as bad on the west side of Pleasant Lake. Here are some things that I now do. When following a gravel train, and the rear trailer is swerving from side to side, don't try to pass, you're already doing over 55 miles per hour. The State of Michigan has had laws on the books for years to govern the use of public highways, why can't we sue them? The gravel pit owners have stated that "We can't have a multi-million dollar operation if we don't have a 20- to 30-year supply of stone". One suggestion that has never been brought up: we had in

this area a railroad running from Manchester, east to Saline, and then eastward towards Detroit. If these people are going to be here for the next 30 years or so, why not a railroad to transport the gravel out, the roadbed is still

I know the answer already the cost. My reply, in my case alone, would be: two windshields per year times thirty years equals one top notch railroad.

The Manchester Optimist Emergency Medical Technician Club heard from the University of Michigan Women's Gymnastics coach, Bev Plocki, on October 12. Bev came to Michigan in 1988, with the gymnastics program in last place saving defibulator. The in the Big Ten conference (7th place - 3 schools do not support Women's Gymnastics).

This was not the case, since Kim feels very good about her year, and has had many opportunities and experiences not available to most 15-year-olds.

The Michigan gymnastics program has progressed under Bev Plocki due to the efforts and commitments from the coaches, the University, and the athletes Bev has over seen and participated in the renovation of the practice facility. Gymnasts at Michigan practice year-round The practices are open to the public and take place Monday to Friday from 2:30 to 6:00 PM at the Michigan Sports Coliseum on Hill at Fifth Ave in Ann Arbor. The competition starts on January 15, 1993 and continues through the Winter academic term, ending with the Nationals on April 15-17 in Corvalis, Oregon. Michigan home gymnastics meets take place in Keen Arena at the corner of State and

Hoover in Ann Arbor. The practice and competition schedule, along with the coaching policies, enables the gymnasts to be outstanding competitors in academics as well as athletics. Bev believes in the recent NCAA rule restricting team activities to 20 hours per week. Often, during road trips, the academics occupies a very significant portion of the time.




High School Girls' Basketball Happenings —by Jon




