

JEFFERSON STUDIO AND "LITHOPHANIA"

Looking for an unusual gift for the holidays? Maybe this vear, Jefferson Art Studio on Lima Center Road near Pleasant Lake will make shopping a rewarding experience. The gift item is the lithophane, an exched thin porcelain picture that when lit from behind, reveals a stunningly beautiful representation of Victorian art.

Collector, creator, and collaborator David Jefferson is the one responsible for bringing this art form to the Manchester area. And he has does so in a way that makes his products affordable and collectible throughout the

These transparent pictures aren't large; they serve as candle screens, or nightlight covers, or small lamp shades. It is their big picture effect in miniature that make them so attractive. They tial to create the final porcelain can't help but draw attention.

The subject matter also adds to the effect. Most of these porcelain pieces represent 19th century children or young women, or nature in a state of tranquil repose, in three dimensional splendor. But not until looking closely, and with a gentle light source, does one gain the full effect of the artwork.

What makes this visual effect possible is the milky white color of the material. David Jefferson claims that bisque porcelain best allows light to sale. pass through the varying depths of the "etching", creating shadow and contour. But it was 19th Century European artists who discovered this.

As David explains, the first lithophanes date back to 1827. Artists were looking for a way to record people, other than by painting them, and found that porcelain served the same lasting purpose. These transparencies continued production until 1890, at which time photography became widespread.

David claims that the craft of making lithophanes may also have died out due to the war died among collectors.


When asked how a lithophane is cut, David described the way the masters used to do it. The artist took a piece of paraffin or beeswax roughly the same density as baked porcelain. Carving would begin by cutting out parts of the selected image to a depth that when held to light, created the desired effect. The process, a laborious one, often lasted for a month. The greater the detail, the longer it

At this point, the wax as a master model, would be readied for conversion to a plaster mold. This allowed the artist to invert the imprint of the model, essenstep. The much treasured wax carving was placed in a safe

Finally liquid porcelain was poured into the plaster mold, reversing the image to its original form. The excess was poured off and trimmed, and the drying process begun. Once air-cured, the piece would be popped out of its mold and baked in an oven at 2300 degrees Fahrenheit. Assuming that no flaws occurred anywhere along the process, the rant atmosphere. product would be readied for

Jefferson Studio has a collection of 60 master models all of which David has cast into the variety of sizes that comprise nightlights, candle stands. and lampshades. Because these pieces are small, the success rate in manufacturing ranks high. This allows the Studio to keep prices down.

Success decreases when David attempts to cast wall sconces and larger lampshades. This is when artistry comes out, and prices go up. 



To the Editor:

As an active member of the Iron Creek United Property Owners Association (ICU), I must respond to the description of our group in last week's issue of the Enterprise.

The ICU does not govern hunting in the area. Individual property owners govern whether or not they allow hunting. The ICU is a group of individuals who found it necessary to unite in order to maintain control of their property. It was formed in 1985 in response to unwanted hunting.

The ICU consists of thirty-three families who own over ,800 acres in the southwest corner of Manchester Township. Most of the members do allow some hunting. Written permission is required by anyone hunting on private property. ICU nembers have a uniform permission card which identifies egitimate hunters.

The ICU is a network of contiguous property owners who are on the alert for unauthorized hunting. We keep in touch with our neighbors and alert each other to suspicious activities. Trespassers and poachers have been and will continue to be prosecuted. Our ability to prosecute is often limited when response by the DNR or county sheriff is slow or unattainable.

We have had some success, but there is still far too much evidence of illegal and unethical hunting. We will maintain our vigilance for as long as there is a need.
